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



Focus: "Bird Gardening"

Prior to 2007...

- •Landscaping: exotic plants
 - Boxwood hedge
 - •Lavendar
 - Pittosporum
 - •Backyard fence lined with privet, Italian buckthorn, feijoa

Then: Very little variety of birds seen Crows, Robins, Black Phoebe, Anna's Hummingbird...

2007: started Native Plants gardening


Opportunistic gardening:

- Replaced dead/dying plants; removed plants
- Large Coast Live Oak split in a storm
- But: Long-Island-raised husband
 - eye is attuned to exotic plants
 - barbered landscape that requires watering
- We still have a lawn!



Black-headed Grosbeak


Now: Large variety of birds visiting and nesting in the yard Crows, Robins, Black Phoebe, Anna's Hummingbird... but now also: Spotted Towhee and California Towhee Western Bluebird White-Breasted Nuthatch Chestnut-backed Chickadee Hermit Thrush >45 species in the yard

What do Birds Need?

Food

Food – depends on the bird

- Berries
- Nectar
- Seed
- Insects

Backyard Birds need insects, caterpillars, etc. to feed their babies

Coffeeberry, <i>Frangula</i> californica	evergreen shrub	low water; sun to part shade	grows to about 8 feet tall and 5 feet wide	subtle small white flowers in the spring	berries that range in color from reddish to black
Red Flowering Currant, <i>Ribes</i> <i>sanguineum</i>	Deciduous shrub (but it often doesn't remember that)	Appreciates some water and some shade in the Valley	grows approximately 4 feet wide and 4 feet tall or higher, but may be pruned	beautiful pink clusters of flowers from January through March	Blue/purple berries in the summer
Toyon, Heteromeles arbutifolia	small evergreen tree	low water; sun to part shade	grows to about 13 feet tall		red berries in the fall and winter
Twinberry, Lonicera involucrata	Deciduous shrub	Part shade to full sun. Appreciates some water.	Chaotic growth to 4 feet wide and tall (but it's willing to grow taller!)	Orange flowers	Black berries in May/June

Red Flowering Currant, <i>Ribes</i> <i>sanguineum</i>	Deciduous shrub (but it often doesn't remember that)	Appreciates some water and some shade in the Valley	grows approximately 4 feet wide and 4 feet tall or higher, but may be pruned		Nectar	
Island Snapdragon, <i>Gambelia</i> speciosa	Evergreen shrub	Shade to sun; appreciates part sun and some water	Chaotic growth of pretty green leaves	Red tubular flowers all year	Nectar

Coast Live Oak, Quercus agrifolia	Large, evergreen tree	Low water (don't plant in the lawn!)	Can grow 35 feet wide and 80 feet tall	Male flowers are catkins; female flowers are small	Acorns
California Buckwheat, <i>Eriogonum</i> fascicalatum	Perennial	Sun to part shade, low water	Grows 3 feet wide and 3 to 6 feet tall	White flowers, summer through fall	Flowers form rust-colored seed heads

Name	Туре	Cultivation	Growth	Flowers	Food for birds
Rosemary Rosmarinus officinalis	Perennial	Sun; low water	Bush form 4 feet wide and tall	Small purple flowers	Finches love the seeds that form
Sunflower, Helianthus annuus	Annual	Sun; needs water	Depending on the variety, stalk can grow 6 feet tall!	Depending on the variety, large yellow flowers	Seeds (Lesser Goldfinches snack on the leaves)

Coast Live Oak, <i>Quercus</i> <i>agrifolia</i>	Large, evergreen tree	Low water (don't plant in the lawn!)	Can grow 35 feet wide and 80 feet tall	Male flowers are catkins; female flowers are small	Hosts caterpillars and insects
Mountain Lilac, <i>Ceanothus</i> <i>griseus</i> Ray Hartman	Evergreen tree	No water, sun	Grows to 25 feet and 8 feet wide	Small purple flowers cover the tree in spring	Hosts insects

Who eats insects? Bushtit, Black Phoebe Everyone feeds insects to their babies: Anna's Hummingbird, Bewick's Wren, Western Bluebird, Oak Titmouse



Cavity-nesters need a note: Bewick's Wren, Oak Titmouse, Chestnut-backed Chickadee, White-breasted Nuthatch, Western




Salvia - Nonnative
