WHAT'S SMEW? IT'S A DUCK THAT STANDS IN THE WAY OF A DIKE

It seems the Dutch cabinet is now faced with the decision to build one more great polder - the Markerwaard Polder, a \$550 million, 100,000 acre project. The dike would surround a lake near Amsterdam, but 90% of the smews of the world live here. As usual, Dutch farmers and developers want it, environmentalists and fishermen among others oppose it. As Richard Hudson put it, "So the next few weeks may see the last hurrah of Dutch dike building."

AUDUBON ADVENTURES

If you would like to help with the dinner, please call Lynn Tennefoss at (415)329-1811. She would love to have some assistance before and on December 16.



FIELD NOTES - Bill Bousman

Two problems in field identification sit conveniently on our doorstep each winter. Many a birder must envy our opportunities to work through the gull flocks and secretive sparrows. Typically, nine species of gulls winter in the South Bay: Bonaparte's, Mew, Ring-billed, California, Herring, Thayer's, Western, Glaucous-winged, and Glaucous. How many hybrids winter here is another different question. In adult plumage some of these are relatively easy to separate out. A few will always cause difficulty no matter what plumage they are in. Normally, we have most of our trouble with the large, pink-legged gulls. The best way to learn them is to pick a spot where they congregate and start to study them and learn the distinguishing characters. The Palo Alto Duck Pond, the Palo Alto dump, and Charleston Slough are all good spots. Each attracts a different group of gulls. Time of day sometimes has an effect on the mix. A scope is a great assist in looking at the fine detail of some of the gulls, but binoculars work well too. Head shape, bill size and wing coloration in flight all become important in separating the difficult species and sometimes a scope is a hindrance here. The two most difficult species are Thayer's Gull and Glaucous Gull. Thayer's is much like a Herring Gull (it was considered a subspecies until recently) and if it was just a question of eye color (Herring has a strawcolored eye, Thayer's is normally dark) life would be easy. But Glaucous-winged X Western hybrids also have a dark eye and wing patterns similar to Thayer's. The smaller bill and head of Thayer's should separate it from hybrids in this case, but this requires experience with the other gulls. Glaucous Gull is by far our rarest resident gull and usually appears in first or second winter plumage. The problem is with second winter Glaucous-winged Gulls who also appear very light and who are developing a pink base to their bills. Usually, the Glaucous-winged show some bleeding between the black tip of the bill and the pink base, and show some gray mantle feathers. It is best to be cautious in separating these two until you have some experience with the plumage transitions in Glaucous-winged.

The winter sparrows found at the bay's edge can also provide hours of enjoyable study. In a good winter we'll have nine: Savannah, Sharp-tailed, Fox (eastern race), Song, Lincoln's, Swamp, Golden-crowned, White-crowned, and Harris'. The problem is going through the thousands of common sparrows looking for the rare ones. Once familiar with the differences in the Savannah, Fox, Song and Lincoln's we are prepared to notice and quickly pick up the field marks of Swamp and Sharp-tailed Sparrows. Practice with the Lincoln's which typically pops up for five seconds in response to "pishing" - that is

often as long as we get with others.

The first winter report of Cattle Egret was of two along Adobe Creek on 12 Oct (Phyllis Browning-PB). Three Blue-winged Teal were also seen along Adobe Creek on 21 Oct (Paul Noble-PN, Ginny Becchine-GB). We should be seeing more as the ducks come out of eclipse plumage. An Osprey was seen over Anderson Reservoir 26 Sept (Barry Breckling-BB) and appears to have been there since the 15th. More west side Golden Eagle reports include an immature near Stevens Creek and Wolfe 28 Sept (Audrey Stoye) and another in Mountain View on 2 Oct (Cathy Gill, Roland Franz). A Prairie Falcon turned up in Rancho San Antonio OSP 28 Sept for a SCVAS trip -- a pleasant surprise (Leslie Morrissey fide Don Starks). Two Lesser Yellowlegs were found in the settling ponds behind the El Camino Dog Kennel 30 Sept (David Suddjian-DS, PN). What is attractive habitat to the rarer shorebirds in unclear. No Pectoral Sandpipers have been reported from the

Mountain View Forebay since it was constructed. This fall things changed with a vengeance. The first report was of one on 23 Sept (Al Eisner) and by the 25th numbers had built up to eight (Derek Currall). Derek visited the Forebay from then on nearly every day to document these visitors and his careful notes show that numbers decreased after the 25th, but that from 1-3 birds were seen until 11 Oct (also Dick Stovel and PB). The biggest surprise of the fall was when two Sharp-tailed Sandpipers were also briefly in the Forebay. Phillis Browning found them on the afternoon of 6 Oct and after obtaining a good description went for a telescope and other people, but the birds could not be found again. In adjacent Charleston Slough a dark morph jaeger was seen 11 Sept (PB,GB), but was not identified as to species. All identified jaegers to date in the county have been Parasitic. Another fall surprise was a Townsend's Solitaire seen on a SCVAS trip to Foothills Park on 24 Oct (Dolores Norton). They tend to have irruptive years and sometimes stay in the vicinity of fruit-bearing shrubs for days at a time. Pete LaTourette found the plumbeous race of the Solitary Vireo for the second year in a row along Coyote Creek across from the San Jose Municipal Golf Course on 13 Oct. Despite the extensive razing of vegetation in this area some good habitat for winter warblers remains. He also saw a Wilson's Warbler there that day. Three Grasshopper Sparrows were still in Monte Bello OSP 30 Sept (PN, DS). It seems likely that they bred there this year. A Whitethroated Sparrow returned to a feeder in Menlo Park 29 Oct. Red Crossbills continue to be found on both sides of the valley. Two were heard at Castle Rock SP 6 Oct (Don Starks) and about 10 were along the Middle Fork of Coyote Creek in Henry Coe SP 14 Oct (BB). Some records of winter arrivals: Red-breasted Sapsucker, Monte Bello OSP, 30 Sept; Say's Phoebe, Moffett Field, 3 Oct; Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Palo Alto, 30 Sept; Hermit Thrush, Foothills Park, 30 Sept; Varied Thrush, Monte Bello OSP, 30 Sept; Water Pipit, Moffett Field, 17 Oct; Cedar Waxwing, Palo Alto, 30 Sept; and Yellow-rumped Warbler, Matadero Creek, 30 Sept (all 30 Sept records PN, DS).
