## SAVING BAY WETLANDS

At the March meeting in Asilomar of all the western Audubon Chapters, one subject was chosen for top priority -- wetlands preservation. Whether we consider it a challenge or a privilege, our chapter is one with the highest number of acres of those precious lands at risk. In keeping with that goal, our Environmental Action Committee continues its efforts on behalf of the Citizens Committee to Complete the San Francisco Bay National Wildlife Refuge.

Well over 1000 names have been obtained on petitions urging acquisition of these lands by the public. 800 of those were gathered during 5 days at a booth at the popular Sportsmen's Exposition at the San Mateo County Fairgrounds. Often the young hunters and fishermen lectured us about their observations of shocking declines in waterfowl and fisheries, and demonstrated a remarkable understanding of the role of the loss of wetlands in those declines. Their enthusiasm and support will be an asset to this campaign.

First goal for acquisition is Mayhew's Landing, an important seasonal wetland in Newark. It is adjacent to the Refuge, and its 125 acres provide critical feeding and nesting sites for dozens of species of birds and mammals. This beautiful piece of open space is in imminent danger of permanent loss.

If wetlands preservation is important to you, please join in. We need people who would like to help do any of the following: plan publicity for radio, newspapers, TV; educate political figures to wetland values; address envelopes or lick stamps; place a bumper strip on your car; carry around petitions (well, how about signing one at least?); help plan our next brochure; organize files; and search public records (for land owners, development plans, etc.).



# FIELD NOTES - David Suddjian

When most of us think of spring vagrant "Eastern" passerines, places like Point Reyes and various desert oases with a history of vagrant sightings come to mind. However, the records show that vagrants can appear almost anywhere. At dawn most migrants simply land where they are. A migrant finding itself over the desert heads for the nearest oasis where it can rest and feed. Similarly, many individuals that find themselves over the ocean at dawn head for the nearest land. Thus, the birds are concentrated at such sites. Local birders should be aware that Santa Clara Co. has 12 reported spring sightings involving 7 species of vagrant "Eastern" migrants. The records are summarized in the graph below by assigning each to a 7 day period between 1 May and 2 July. In two cases individuals present for more than 7 days have been graphed for the entire period they were present. Most records are of individuals seen on only one day. A 9 April record of a Black and White Warbler was omitted as it does not fit the pattern of occurrence of "Eastern" vagrants. The species represented on the graph and the number of sightings of each are: Tennessee Warbler (2), Magnolia Warbler (1), Black and White Warbler (2), Ovenbird (1), Scarlet Tanager (1), Rose-breasted Grosbeak (2) and Indigo Bunting (2).



The graph shows that sightings of "Eastern" vagrants primarily occur from early May through late June, with the most from mid-May to early June. This matches the trend for the whole of California. In contrast, the bulk of "normal" migration of these species and other "Eastern" vagrants occurs in the East from mid-April through mid-May. The causes behind spring occurrences of "Eastern" species in the West have been little studied and remain unclear. In his Rare Birds of the West Coast Don Roberson cites two theories that attempt to explain the causes of spring misorientation. A number of species migrate north through the Eastern half of the country and then reorient north-westwards to reach breeding sites in Central and Western Canada (as is true for 5 of the 7 species dealt with here). According to one theory, a number of individuals turn north-west too early and wind up in California and other Western sites, far south of their goal. The other theory claims that many sightings of "Eastern" vagrants represent birds that are late in leaving their wintering grounds. When they do migrate north, the stars (thought to be the stimulus for migration in many species) have shifted to the west. Thus the birds reorient to the north-west too soon and end up someplace like California. This theory would explain the seasonally late occurrence of many vagrants.

Birders hoping to find such vagrants in Santa Clara Co. are advised to look everywhere, and track down all unfamiliar calls and songs. A number of sightings have occurred in the suburbs, so maybe your backyard is a good place to start. This is especially true if you live near a creek, oaks, or flowering exotic plants such as eucalyptus. Other

likely spots to search include riparian areas and forested ridge areas, both of which have proven

popular stops for migrants.

A Pelagic Cormorant was found off Ravenswood Point on 23 Feb (Maryann Danielson-MD, Jean-Marie Spoelman-JMS). This species is very rare this far down the Bay. A pair of Wood Ducks returned to last year's nesting site on San Francisquito Ck. in Menlo Park on 6 Mar (Betty Groce-BG). This winter's only reported White-winged Scoter was present with 3 Surf Scoters on Mountain View's Shoreline Lake on 9 Mar (David Suddjian-DS). An Osprey with a broken wing was found in a San Jose backyard on 19 Mar. The bird was captured and taken for care to Wildlife Rescue. It's not known how the bird was injured or how it ended up in the backyard. Two Red-shouldered Hawks were reported from Los Altos on 11 Mar (Sister Helen Gilsdorf). The imm. Rough-legged Hawk first reported from Monte Bello OSP in January was still present on 9 Mar (Paul Noble-PN). This is the latest date for the species in Santa Clara Co. A Merlin was stirring up the sandpipers at Charleston Slough on 26 Feb (April Durran). A Peregrine Falcon was at Shoreline Lake on 14 Mar (PN). A Spotted Sandpiper wintering along Los Gatos Ck. was seen on 3 Mar and again on 16 Mar, and was noted to be molting into breeding plumage (Gary McCurdy-GMcC). The Glaucous Gull was last seen on 2 Mar at the Palo Alto FCB, representing one of our few March records (Phyllis Browning). Northern Pygmy-Owls were reported from two sites with one along Hick's Rd near Almaden Reservoir on 6 and 7 Feb (John Mariani-JM), and 1 at Monte Bello OSP on 2 Mar (PN). A belated report of a Long-eared Owl along Hick's Rd on 11 Jan is one of the few recent county records. A Short-eared Owl was present at Menlo Park's Bay Front Park on 21 Feb (MD, JMS). Northern Saw-whet Owls were well reported with 2 along Hick's Rd on 7 Feb and one noted on 13 Feb 1(JM). One was also found at Monte Bello OSP on 27 Feb, where two were noted on 2 Mar, and one on 5 and 24 Mar (all PN). A Common Poorwill heard along Hick's Rd during unseasonably warm weather on 21, 26 and 27 Feb was probably a wintering individual (JM, Mike Danzenbaker). These records are among the few bits of evidence that suggest this species winters in the county. A male Costa's Hummingbird was reported visiting a feeder at a residence in the Santa Cruz Mountains between Bear Ck Rd and Skyline Blvd on 12-14 Mar (Louise Madrid). This is the second Santa Cruz County record of this species. The first Rufous Hummingbird of the season was at a

feeder in San Jose on 25 Feb (JM). The Red-naped Sapsucker found in November at Jasper Ridge Preserve was still present on 26 Feb (Carol Zabel). The first Western Flycatcher of the season was noted in Palo Alto on 22 Mar, about two weeks earlier than most years (DS). Returning swallows were reported as follows: Violet-green Swallows in Mountain View on 8 Mar (DS), Northern Rough-winged Swallows in Los Gatos on 8 Mar (GMcC), Cliff Swallows in Los Altos Hills on 7 Mar (Bob Will), and Barn Swallows in Mountain View on 2 Mar (William G. Bousman-WGB). Ever notice how the swallows are reported to return to Capistrano about two weeks after they reach the Bay Area? One Red-breasted Nuthatch was in Mountain View on 24 Feb and another was in Los Altos on 6 Mar (both PN). Three early returning House Wrens were at Monte Bello OSP on 26 Mar, almost a month ahead of last year's arrival at this site (DS). A singing Winter Wren along Steven's Ck in Los Altos on 1 Mar was in an area where they've not been seen before (Jim and Sue Liskovec). An American Dipper was still present along Los Gatos Ck on 8 and 16 Mar (GMcC). They are not known to nest here. One was present on 17 Mar (Al Eisner) along Steven's Ck above the Eden Canyon Rd turnoff, where they have nested. The first Blue-gray Gnatcatcher of the season was noted in Woodside on 20 Mar (Winke Lennihan fide PN). The first Warbling Vireo of the season was a very early individual at Monte Bello OSP on 9 Mar (PN). Orangecrowned Warblers returned on schedule to Monte Bello OSP on 27 Feb (PN). The first Black-throated Gray Warbler at Monte Bello OSP on 26 Mar was early, while the first Wilson's Warbler, same date and site, was perhaps more typical (both DS). The Whitethroated Sparrow wintering near a Menlo Park feeder was still present as of 6 Mar (BG). The Lapland Longspurs found on the Palo Alto CBC last December have remained at Menlo Park's Bay Front Park with 6 on 22 Feb (MD, JMS), 6 on 9 Mar and 4 on 22 Mar (both DS). Most wintering longspurs leave for the north in late March, so it would be of interest if these birds are seen past 22 Mar. Another Lapland Longspur was found on 15 Mar at Redwood Shores, east of Belmont (WGB). The first Hooded Oriole of the season was one in Los Altos on 24 Mar (PN). The first Northern Oriole was reported form Menlo Park on 23 Mar (WGB). These are typical arrival dates for our two orioles.


