

FIELD NOTES -- Bill Bousman

The Christmas Bird Counts are a marvelous idea. Each year we try to count as many birds as we can in one 15-mi diameter circle during a 24-hour period. Fortunately, we can choose the day in a two to three week period and therefore we can participate in more than one count if we wish. Part of the attraction of the CBCs is the competition, part is related to the social aspect, and part is hearing about the really exceptional birds that always turn up. However, the long-term value of the CBCs is not in the rarities that are found or the maximum species count, but rather in providing a set of data that can give us some idea of the status of winter bird populations in our local communities. We need to be careful in using these data, however, in that the number of participants will affect how many birds are recorded. We must use some sort of normalizing factor such as the number of parties, or number of observers, or the party-hours in the field to remove this effect. Another concern is the quality of the observations and this is almost impossible to determine. It is sometimes difficult to convince a CBC counter that the 75th junco of the day, or the 150th waxwing is just as important as the oriole that was found by somebody else in a flowering eucalyptus. Don't miss the chance of doing one of the local Christmas Bird Counts this year. If you life in one of the count circles check your neighborhood out before count day. Look for flowering shrubs and trees and see if any unusual insectivorous or tropical species have stayed on. If you have a fruit tree that is popular see if any unusual birds are attracted. If you have a bird feeder, check it for the occasional rarity.

Brown Pelicans have tapered off as we expect them to in October. Unexpected was the second fall report of a bird away from the bay habitat. A bird was seen on 21 and 23 Oct at Vasona Res. (Jean DuBois - JDuB). A Green-backed Heron was found in the Matadero riparian on 26 Sep (Clark Blake - CB) and 25 Oct (Rich Jeffers - RJ). A single male Blue-winged Teal was along Adobe Creek 30 Sep and a pair was seen in the same vicinity 14 Oct (both Mike Rogers - MRo). A Eurasian Wigeon along Adobe Creek in the Palo Alto FCB 25 and 29 Oct is the first found this season (Mike Mammoser). Twenty-five Common Mergansers on Almaden Res. 27 Oct is a good concentration for winter (Gerald Anderson). A few Golden Eagles were reported at the edge of the Santa Cruz Mountains as we have come to expect: two at Monte Bello OSP 6 Sep (Briana Lindh), one at Deer Creek Rd. and I-280 17 Oct (Grant Hoyt - GHo), and one over Ranch San Antonio OSP 25 Oct (Jim & Sue Liskovec). Lesser Yellowlegs taper off in October in their favored spots and this month was normal with two in Charleston Slough 26 Sep (CB), two at the forebay 30 Sep (MR0), and one still there on 11 Oct (MRo). Three Ruddy Turnstones on the San Francisquito Creek delta 12 Oct (Bill Bousman - WGB) were in an area where they have been found a number of times before. Nine Red Knots were there the same day as well. Pectoral Sandpipers are usually the last of the rare migrant shorebirds that come through the South Bay. One was found 4 Sep in the Mountain View Forebay (PLN) and then between 24 and 30 Sep one to six were found there (MRo). At the Sunnyvale sewage ponds two to four were seen between 24 and 29 Sep (April Sapsford), suggesting a slightly better flight year than we normally see. The juv. Sabine's Gull noted last month stayed through 5 Oct (RJ, MRo) at the Palo Alto Duck Pond. Good pictures of this first county record were obtained by Alan Walther. Many Lewis' Woodpeckers were found on a Big Day visit to San Antonio Valley 26 Sep (CB). a Red-breasted Nuthatch at Coyote Hills RP 3 Oct (GHo) is the only report of fall movement this year. Last October six reports were received in the local area. The Coyote Creek Riparian Station continues their fall of true rarities with another first county record. An adult Brown Thrasher in worn plumage was netted on 3 Oct (fide Dick Mewaldt). This eastern species averages about six records a year in California, largely at the vagrant traps. Unlike many of the rare flycatchers and warblers banded at the station the Brown Thrasher is readily identifiable if well seen. A Phainopepla in San Antonio Valley 26 Sep (CB) is from an area where they are sometimes found.

I REMEMBER MISS EMILY

Miss Emily Smith of Saratoga was one of the most beloved and knowledgeable members of the Santa Clara Valley Audubon Society. At its Charter Meeting at the Saratoga Inn on 8 January 1925, Miss Emily (as we called her in the 1950s and 1960s) was elected Corresponding Secretary by the 45 members present. An excerpt from meeting minutes of 7 October 1926 states in part "An excellent meal, for the insignificant sum of twenty-five cents, was prepared and served by a committee of our younger members under the very capable leadership of Miss Emily Smith."

At the membership meeting 20 April 1931, Miss Emily presented the program titled "Swifts, Especially Black Swifts". This was based in part on her paper "Black Swifts nesting behind a waterfall" which appeared in The Condor for March-April in 1926. In that article is a photograph of Berry Creek Falls with coordinates pinpointing the locations of three nests. Berry Creek Falls is in Big Basin Redwood State Park near a grove which has since been dedicated as the Emily Smith Redwood Grove. Many of us are also familiar with the Emily Smith Overlook on the main trail in Castle Rock Park.

I remember well a SCVAS field trip led by Miss Emily in the mid-1950s to a Black Swift nest in a sea cave on the coast north of Santa Cruz. Even though we entered the cave at low tide, we had to time our entry and exit to come between waves washing into the entrance of the cave. The single gray downy young in a damp moss edged nest on a ledge was clearly visible to the few of us over six feet tall. The others took advantage of the long-handled mirror furnished by Miss Emily. For many years she was the leader behind the scenes for the SCVAS Wednesday Field Trips.

A graduate of Vassar College in New York, Miss Emily worked as a part-time instructor and assistant in the then Department of Natural Sciences at San Jose State in the 1930s and 1940s. In cooperation with faculty members, including the well known ornithologist Dr. Gale Pickwell, she helped produce a series of booklets on nature used for many years in Science Education. In the early 1950s Miss Emily worked closely with Dr. Charles G. Sibley, then ornithologist at San Jose State, and who is now President of the American Ornithologists' Union.

A note in The Avocet for April 1961 states in part, "The training course for field trip leaders that was so successful in the fall will be offered again this spring by Dr. Tom Harvey of San Jose State College and Miss Emily Smith, former teacher there....For more details and registration, please call Dr. Evelyn Case...(CH 3-2467)."

In the late 1960's Miss Emily suffered from an Alzheimerlike disease. In that difficult period, I helped her sister, Miss Betty Smith, with the mechanics of donating Miss Emily's fine natural history library to San Jose State and to the then young Point Reyes Bird Observatory.

Lynn Tennefoss was recently informed that the SCVAS has received a substantial bequest from the estates of Miss Emily Smith and Miss Betty Smith. Miss Emily died in the early 1970s. Miss Betty, who was more interested in literature and the fine arts, died this past summer. They had arranged that their estates would go to probate only when both were deceased.

I remember Miss Emily as a scholarly, warm-hearted, gentle teacher-leader who from the 1920s to the 1960s enriched the lives of generations of college students and persons of all ages especially in the Santa Clara Valley Audubon Society.

Choose an area to your liking and call the section leader ASAP. As sections fill up, we may ask people to count in other areas. If you have not done a Christmas Bird Count before, on-the-job training will be provided!

We need feeder watchers, too. This information is just as valuable as the data obtained in the field. If you (1) live within the count circle, (2) will be home all or part of the day on December 21, and (3) are willing to watch your feeder(s), then call us before the count and we can work out the details. Rarities such as wintering Northern Orioles and White-throated Sparrows are possible.
