# **Field Notes**

### Waterfowl

A Common Loon seen flying over the Palo Alto Flood Control Basin (FCB) 18 Oct (MRo) is the earliest county record I am aware of. A Horned Grebe on Mississippi Lake, Henry Coe SP 14 Oct (JY, AL) is one of our few records for the small reservoirs in the Diablo Range. Brown Pelicans have been scarce this fall. One at Charleston

Slough 13 Oct [ (MRo) was the only report for the month. *Wood Duck* have been found along Coyote Creek at Burnett on

20 Sep (DLSu) and again in the area of the Los Gatos Creek ponds on 15 Oct (AV) and 2 Nov (MLB, RH). A pair of Blue-winged Teal in the Palo Alto FCB 9 Oct (PJM) are from an area where they are typically found. A Eurasian Wigeon from Charleston Slough 13 Oct (PJM) is also from a typical area, but a male found in the vicinity of the Oka and Los Gatos Creek ponds and seen on 15 Oct (AV), 2 Nov (MLB, RH), and 5 Nov (BR) is from an area where they are only rarely found. Twenty-two Common Merganser on Chesbro Res. 28 Oct (JG) is an apparent winter movement as none were seen there the week before (DLSu).

### Raptors

A Rough-legged Hawk at the Sunnyvale Water Pollution Control Plant (WPCP) on 22 Oct (PJM) is early by at least a month. West side Golden Eagle reports include one over Santa Clara 6 Oct (CW) and a pair at Calero Dam 20 Oct (DLSu). A good early movement of Merlin has been recorded with individuals at Coyote Creek at Burnett 12 Sep (DLSu, our earliest record ever), Los Gatos 15 Oct (DLSu), the Palo Alto FCB on 20 Oct (PJM) and 28 Oct (GHt), and the Sunnyvale WPCP on 29 Oct (PJM). Single *Peregrine Falcon* have also been found at the Sunnyvale WPCP on 20 Sep and the Palo Alto dump on 20 Oct (both PJM). A *Prairie Falcon* record from Henry Coe SP 24 Sep (JY, AL) is also of interest.

Shorebirds

Once the August and September rush of *Lesser Yellowlegs* is past we occasionally find a substantial carryover

into October. One near the Coyote Creek mouth 2 Oct (MJM) is within their normal interval, but birds seen in the Palo Alto FCB and the Mountain View Forebay from 28 Sep to 26 Oct with a peak count of 16 on 18 Oct (PJM, MRo) is less expected. We've had fewer *Pectoral Sandpipers* this season with one at the Sunnyvale WPCP 2 Sep (PJM), two at the Mountain View Forebay 30 Sep (MRo), five near the Coyote Creek mouth 2 Oct (MJM), and a single in the Palo Alto FCB 4 Oct (PJM).

### **Gulls & Terns**

A juv. Sabine's Gull roosting at Charleston Slough 3 Oct (PJM) is only our third county record. To have had two different birds in a two week period is unusual for this pelagic migrant. Adding to this season's list of *Elegant Terns* were six at Charleston Slough on 3 Oct as well as the gull (also PJM). Another pelagic fall migrant we rarely find in the county is *Common Tern*. An imm. at Coyote Lakes Park near Metcalf Rd 18 Oct (DLSu) is our only inland record.

### Swifts et.al

More information this month on the Vaux's Swift migration. Over Saratoga they were first noted with 20 on 24 Sep (DLSu, GAB) and last seen on 4 Oct with 59 counted in flocks of 2 and 3 (DLSu). Lewis' Woodpeckers appear to be on the move. One over Stanford on 21 Sep (PJM) and another at the Arastradero Preserve 14 Oct (LyT, G&KHt) are our first peninsular records since the winter of 1986-87. Incidentally, none could be found in San Antonio Valley on 27 Sep (WGB, CB) even though the oak mast crop appeared very good. A Red-naped Woodpecker at Coyote Creek near Burnett 12 Sep (DLSu) is the earliest record I have for this rare sapsucker. Twenty-five Willow Flycatchers were banded at the Coyote Creek Riparian Station (CCRS) this fall with the last record on 20 Sep. Two more were seen the same day on Covote Creek below Anderson Dam near Burnett (DLSu). An Ash-throated Flycatcher at the Palo Alto WPCP 9 Oct (PJM) was exceptionally late. Our second county record of Tropical Kingbird was found on Coyote Creek near Burnett 18 Oct (DLSu). The date is typical for reverse migrants which normally show up along our coast. Our fall swallow migration has brought out some unusual records. A female Purple Martin along Guadalupe Slough 17 Sep (PJM) is one of our few fall records for this rare west coast species. Delayed migrating Violet-green Swallows were found at Henry Coe SP on 15 Oct (JY, AL) and along Coyote Creek near Burnett from 12 Sep-18 Oct (DLSu). In the latter case numbers peaked at about 300 birds and was reduced to six by the last date. In both cases most of the birds were immature. A single immature along the Matadero riparian on 26 Oct (MRo) probably represents an overwintering bird. A Bank Swallow at the Sunnyvale WPCP 17 Sep (PJM) is a very rare migrant - our

most recent record is for 1985. Barn Swallows also lingered late with an imm. on Coyote Creek near Burnett 18 Oct (DLSu) being the last noted. A Red-breasted Nuthatch in oak habitat in Henry Coe SP 15 Oct (JY, AL) is the first evidence of a fall flight of this montane species. Canyon Wrens found at Henry Coe 24 Sep and 15 Oct (JY, AL) are always of interest. A House Wren in Saratoga 26 Sep (DLSu) is quite late for migration. Our first fall record of American Dipper away from nesting spots is from Coyote Creek at China Hole in Henry Coe SP 14 Oct (JY, AL). Fall migrant Black-throated Gray Warblers include three found on Coyote Creek near Burnett 20 Sep (DLSu), one at Henry Coe SP 24 Sep (JY, AL) and a total of seven banded at CCRS with the last recapture date 18 Oct. Palm Warblers at the Matadero riparian 6 Oct and the Palo Alto WPCP 7 Oct (both PJM) are our earliest records for this very rare vagrant. To add to our excellent fall for Northern Waterthrush another bird was banded at CCRS on 8 Oct, the latest fall date we have for this species. A Green-tailed Towhee was banded at CCRS on 1 Oct for the sixth county record and the second this year. A Chipping Sparrow banded at CCRS 8 Oct was unusual for that location. An adult at the Palo Alto WPCP 29 Oct (PJM) was even less expected. A Vesper Sparrow was found at the same site 9 Oct (PJM) for one of our few county records. White-throated Sparrow have turned up in greater numbers this fall with singles at the Matadero riparian on 6 and 22 Oct (PJM), one banded at CCRS 14 Oct, and one at a feeder in Los Altos 1 Nov (PLN). Lawrence's Goldfinches have been found regularly in the Diablo Range with three at Coyote Creek near Burnett 20 Sep (DLSu) and many recorded in goldfinch flock in Henry Coe SP on 14-15 Oct (JY, AL).

### Farewell, Brown Towhee

Our familiar Brown Towhee, seen so often in our yards and on our lawns is no more. The Thirty-seventh Supplement to the American Ornithologists' Union Check-list of North American Birds has split the Brown Towhee into the California Towhee (Pipilo crissalis) and the Canyon Towhee (Pipilo fuscus). The former is the species found in California, as the name for once would indicate, while the Canvon Towhee will be found in the interior southwest. Two other splits affect birds commonly seen in California. The Western Flycatcher has been split into the Pacific-slope Flycatcher (Empidonax difficilis) and the Cordilleran Flycatcher (Empidonax occidentalis). The Pacific-slope is the expected species in California, while the Cordilleran will be found in the mountains of the Great Basin and in the Rocky Mountains. However, neither Empid species will be any easier to identify. The

*California Gnatcatcher* (Polioptila californica) has been split from the *Black-tailed Gnatcatcher* (Polioptila melanura), and again is the species expected in California.

In other changes, the Water Pipit (Anthus spinoletta) has been renamed the American Pipit (Anthus rubescens). The Northern Hawk-Owl has lost its hyphen becoming the Northern Hawk Owl, and the Common Pauraque has become less common by becoming just the Pauraque. The Common Barn-Owl has done both, becoming simply the Barn Owl. Perhaps the best news from this Supplement, however, is the absence of lumps (consolidation of two or more species into one), ensuring that this time around, at least, we will at worst stay the same on our lists and happily may gain a new species or three. - From The Quail, Mt. # Environmental Action News

## Program Aired Anyway **'Ancient Forests' Loses Sponsors**

On Sunday, September 24, the most recent World of Audubon television special, "Rage Over Trees" was aired on TBS without commercial sponsorship. The program documents the public debate over protection of the Northwest's remaining ancient forests on public lands. Every commercial sponsor to the program told Turner Broadcasting officials that they decided to pull the tv ads as a result of threats and intimidation by the timber industry.

This most recent action followed cancellation of underwriting for the entire Audubon television series by Stroh Brewery. Although Stroh was undergoing financial problems, the timber industry also launched a letter writing campaign and threatened the brewery with a boycott. "This is the last gasp in a desperate effort to stop the American people from seeing a major documentary film about the public debate over protection of the Northwest's remaining ancient forests on public land," said NAS President, Peter Berle. "We firmly believe the public will be furious about this attempt at censorship, which runs counter to every principle of free speech embodied in the First Amendment." Timber industry representatives have labeled Audubon as extremists when, in fact it is they who really are taking extreme actions, and Audubon represents the mainstream viewpoint on this issue.

Corporations that cancelled their commercial air time include Ford Motor Company, Dean Witter Reynolds Co., for their Discover Card, ITT Rayonier Inc., Hartford surance Group, Exxon, Michelin Tire Corp., Stroh, New York Life, and Citicorp. Audubon is now seeking a new underwriter for the series.

Turner Broadcasting needs to know that there is a large constituency that values Ted Turner's willingness to support the Audubon cause by airing the television program in spite of suffering large financial losses due to the pullout of sponsorship. It is especially important that Turner Broadcasting officials have documentation to this effect to help win back commercial sponsorship of the Audubon television series and keep it on the air.

### International Ban Sought on Drifting Death Nets

Whales, dolphins, seabirds, seals and many other creatures die after becoming entangled in the nylon filaments of high seas driftnets. Thirty to forty miles long and thirty to fifty feet deep, these nets often drift endlessly, literally strip-mining the seas of marine life.

H.R. 2958, The Marine Resource Protection and Driftnet Use Cessation Act of 1989, would direct the U.S. Secretary of State to secure an immediate international ban on the use of driftnets. ## Santa Clara County Open Space Authority Approved By Trish Mulvey

Governor Deukmejian signed legislation creating a Santa Clara County Open Space Authority to protect the greenbelt outside the area served by the Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District. However, the real test will be in November 1990 when voters in San Jose, Santa Clara, Milpitas, Campbell, Morgan Hill, Gilroy and surrounding unincorporated areas will be asked to approve funding for land acquisition. A two-thirds majority vote will be needed to approve an annual tax of approximately \$25 per developed parcel.

The Open Space Authority will be started in February 1990 by an interim governing board of five members including one County Supervisor, two San Jose City Council members, and two City Council members from other cities in the jurisdiction of the Authority. The interim board will be replaced by five to seven elected district representatives in June 1992.

Funds raised by the parcel tax will be used by the Authority to purchase land or conservation

## Support group now forming Have a H.E.A.R.T., Help Sea Turtles

The efforts of all concerned conservationists are needed now if sea turtles are to be saved. Although all seven species are protected under the Endangered Species Act, an estimated 11,000 to 12,000 sea turtles are drowned in shrimp nets each year. According to Commerce Department scientific estimates, over 90% of these deaths can easily and inexpensively be eliminated with the proper use of a TED, or Turtle Excluder Device.

A TED Amendment requiring shrimpers to use TED nets was passed three years ago but has yet to be enacted due to pressure from the shrimp industry. The TED net was developed by the National Marine Fisheries Service to enable shrimpers to allow entangled sea turtles to escape without harm, in addition to significantly reduce the 1.5 billion pounds of accidental finfish which are caught and tossed back dead overboard each year. Although TEDs cost only \$400 for the two year investment of a TED net (less than 1% of the annual operating cost of a shrimp boat) and the use of TED nets has enabled some shrimpers to shrimp longer hours without having to empty the nets of drowned fish, to use fewer deck hands, and have caused no appreciable decline in the annual catch of shrimp, Gulf Coast statesmen supported by the shrimp industry have vehemently opposed the use of TEDs and continue to introduce anti-TED amendments to every bill proposed.

The National Marine Fisheries Service and a volunteer-based organization called HEART (Help Endangered Animals Ridley Turtles) have begun rescue efforts and a head-start program for young Ridley Turtle hatchlings, the most endangered of the sea turtle species. The hatchlings are gathered from a beach in Mexico, protected, and fed for ten months while they grow large enough to reduce the mortality rate. Over 9,000 sea turtles have been released, with the hope that this will increase their chance of survival, but donations of used trucks, computers, and especially funding are desperately needed to continue these efforts.

A CALIFORNIA SUPPORT GROUP IS FORMING NOW TO HAVE PEOPLE TO WRITE TO THEIR REPRESENTATIVES AND SENATORS TODAY AND IN THE FUTURE WHEN THE NEED MAY ARISE, demanding firm enactment of the TED amendment that is long overdue. If the TED amendment is allowed to be thwarted, it weakens the Endangered Species Act, and al the other species which that bill currently protects. easements to protect open space preserves and provide low intensity trail use. According to the legislation: "Priority for open-space acquisition should be focused on those lands closest, most accessible, and visible to the urban area". The County Open Space Preservation 2020 Task Force recommendations are expected to be used as a guide. Top priorities include wetlands in the Bay Zone, Santa Teresa Ridge, Lexington Reservoir area. New Almaden area, and lands in Alum Rock, east Coyote, east Berryessa, east San Martin, east Gilroy and the east San Jose foothills.

Of the total funds raised annually by the Authority, approximately 15% will be earmarked for park acquisition projects within city urban service areas. (This is a provision that is particularly important for residents of Santa Clara and Campbell since they are totally surrounded by other cities.) It is anticipated that this funding will be used for completion of creek park chains and protection of riparian habitat. The remainder of the funds will be spent for open space acquisition outside the urban service area.

What you can do: Obtaining approval of two-thirds of the voters for a \$25 per year parcel tax will be a substantial challenge. Your help is needed representing Santa Clara Valley Audubon Society as a participant in the grassroots level Open Space Authority Campaign Committee being organized by the Santa Clara County Greenbelt Coalition. The Committee will have its first meeting in early December. Please contact Vicki Moore for more information or to sign up to participate (408) 983-0539.
