Countdown to the 1990 San Jose Christmas Bird Count

Come join us for an all-day adventure in counting all the ducks, geese, hawks, sparrows, and rarities in the area. The count begins at or before dawn and will continue all day. Afterwards we'll all meet for a wonderful pot-luck supper and a tally of the day's results. To properly cover all the areas within the count, we need your help in this census of all the common to abundant and uncommon to rare birds. Just pick an area that is convenient for you and call the section leader (see bottom of page 3 for list). As sections fill up, we may ask people to count in other areas. Beginners are very welcome; you don't need to have done a count before. Volunteers are needed to spot, count and list birds. Dress warmly, bring a lunch and your binoculars. A mandatory \$5.00 CBC fee per participant covers compilation and publication costs.

Feeder watchers are also needed. This information is just as valuable. To participate, you'll need to live within the count circle, be home on December 23, and be willing to count the number of visitors to your feeder. Call us before the count for more information at (415) 329-1811.

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

Field Notes

Herons and Ducks

The first American Bittern of the season was at the Palo Alto Baylands 30 Oct (PJM). The hybrid Snowy Egret X Little Blue Heron was at Charleston Slough again on 28 Sep (WGB) and 7 Oct (PJM). A flock of 14 Blue-winged Teal at Sunnyvale Baylands Park 12 Oct (MFe) is exceptional. Three there 18 Oct (MFe) and a male in the Palo Alto Flood Control Basin (FCB) 27 Oct-5 Nov (MMR, MFe, PJM, RSch, AW) are more typical numbers for fall. A male Eurasian Wigeon has been recorded in the Mountain View Forebay with sightings 4 and 19 Oct (MMR), Additional males were found at Crittenden Marsh 21 Oct and the Sunnyvale Water Pollution Control Plant (WPCP) 25 Oct (both PJM). Five Redhead were in the North Pond at the Palo Alto FCB 27 Oct (MMR, PJM). A single bird was at the Palo Alto Duck Pond 30 Oct (PJM).

Falcons

Merlin are again being well-reported this fall. One was found at Grant Lake 3 Oct (EA, AT). On 29 Oct singles were along the Matadero riparian and San Francisquito Creek (RSch), and the next day one was seen at the Mountain View Forebay (PJM). Peregrine Falcon have been seen regularly as well. An adult was at the Palo Alto Baylands 30 Sep (TAC). Individuals were at the Sunnyvale WPCP 6 Oct and the Palo Alto FCB the next day (both RSch). A bird at the WPCP 23 Oct was an imm. (MFe). Inland; a bird was seen over Arastradero Preserve 25 Oct (GHt). Finally, one was seen near San Francisquito Creek 20 Oct (RSch) being harassed by a Merlin. It is difficult to guess the actual number of birds involved in these sightings, but it has been a good month nonetheless.

Shorebirds

A juv. Lesser Golden-Plover of the race dominica was found in the Palo Alto FCB 23 Oct (MMR) and was seen by a number of observers through 28 Oct (MFe, MJM, AW). A second bird was seen as

well on 27 Oct (PJM). This is the latest record we have for this species in recent years; they are more typically found in September. It is widely believed that this race will obtain full species status soon and will be called the *American Golden-Plover* while the race fulva will be called the *Pacific Golden-Plover*. As expected, the number of *Lesser Yellowlegs* has fallen off in October. One to three have continued to be found in the Mountain View Forebay through 14 Oct (MMR, AME, TAC). Four to six birds have been

in the Palo Alto FCB 14-28 Oct (MMR, PJM, MJM). In another example of the Patagonia effect, the interest in the Lesser Golden-Plover uncovered a *Stilt Sandpiper* in with the dowitchers in the North Pond of the Palo Alto FCB 25 Oct (MMR) for the third county record. To finish out the shorebird month a *Red Phalarope* was found in the old Palo Alto Yacht Harbor for the first record since 1987 (RSch).

Goatsuckers and Woodpeckers

The movements of *Common Poorwill* are not well known because of their nocturnal habits. We do know that some birds overwinter as they are found feeding and calling during warm periods. Three were netted and banded at CCRS 10-24 Oct (fide WGB), a first for that location. Why they were captured this year is a mystery, but it does suggest a migratory movement. A *Red-naped Sapsucker* was seen at Searsville Lake 22 Oct (BK), always a good find.

Flycatchers through Warblers

A Willow Flycatcher banded at CCRS 3 Oct (fide WGB) is late. A Hammond's Flycatcher netted there 1 Oct

is both exceptionally rare and late. Rock Wrens are expected in scattered locations throughout the county where the appropriate habitat of rocks and open ground is found. Two to three birds at Santa Teresa CP 6 and 20 Oct are typical in this respect (MJM, PLN). However, a single bird on rip-rap at the Mountain View Forebay 10 Oct (BR, RL) is well out of habitat. We have few records of migrating or dispersing birds away from known breeding locations. A Townsend's Solitaire at Sanborn CP 3 Nov (EG) is always rare. Perhaps it augurs an invasion this winter of montane birds. A juv. Tennessee Warbler banded at CCRS 9 Oct (fide MRi) is the fifth county record for this eastern vagrant. A Blackpoll Warbler, another vagrant, was near the Palo Alto Water Quality Control Plant 29 Sep (PJM). Although it is one of the more common vagrants along the coast, this is only the second county record. CCRS added another warbler to the vagrant list 11 Oct with an Ovenbird, a third county record.

Sparrows and Crossbills

A Sage Sparrow east of Black Mountain 5 Oct (RSch) was in an area where the species hasn't been seen since 1985. But this is rough country and it is possible a few pairs could escape our notice for years at a time. Two Sharp-tailed Sparrows at the Palo Alto Baylands on the high tide 5 Nov (AW) were in an area where they have been found regularly for the last few winters. White-throated Sparrows have been banded at CCRS on 24 and 29 Oct and one was seen on a census there 4 Nov (MJM). Another bird was seen in Alum Rock Park 1 Nov (AME). A single Red Crossbill at Stanford 31 Oct (PJM) and a flock of 10 over El Corte Madera OSP 4 Nov (GGH) are the first reports since early 1989.

Field Trip Reports

Wilder Ranch, Waddell Creek & Rancho Del Oso — October 20, 1990

Fifteen birders greeted the sun coming up over the beach and Wilder State Park with eager anticipation. Plenty of birds, including some surprises, added to a beautiful day of birding. The hike along the trail to the bluff overlooking Wilder State Beach produced Black and Say's Phoebe, American Pipit, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Western Meadowlark, Lesser Goldfinch, and five sparrows including Fox and Savannah. Scanning the beach and ocean produced Red-throated Loon, all three cormorants, Snowy Plover, Black and Ruddy Turnstone, Whimbrel, Willet and Marbled Godwit.

Everyone got great views of a *Rhinoceros Auklet* feeding just off the bluffs. Further along we saw six additional shorebirds for a total of 13, including an unexpected *Red Knot* in winter plumage, as well as several beautiful *Black Oyster-catchers*. Seven types of gull were seen

including Mew, Bonaparte's and Glaucous-winged. Returning to the parking lot and the farm buildings near the visitor center for lunch, we were fortunate to locate a Barn Owl roosting in the lone palm tree.

After lunch we took a short hike into the hills above Wilder ranch and added Sharp-shinned, Red-tailed and Redshouldered Hawks as well as spectacular views of the ocean and surrounding hills.

Heading north with a substantial list, we by-passed Laguna Beach for Waddell Creek and Rancho Del Oso. Added to the list were *Belted Kingfisher*, *Sora Rail*, *Townsend's Warbler*, and perhaps the best bird of the day, *Red-naped Sapsucker* about 1 mile up the trail from the ranger station. All in all, an excellent day of birding with a total of 79 species seen or heard.

Marin Headlands Raptor Trip—October 7, 1990

Nine hardy birders arrived at 9:00 A.M. to find the gates half way up the road to the parking area for the Marin Headlands bunker 129 parking area closed (Thank you Mr. Bush and your budget crisis). We managed to talk to the NPS police (who were present when we arrived) into opening the gates for us, and got to the "hawk watch" at about 9:30 A.M., eagerly awaiting our first hawk.

The day was clear, *calm*, and warm, which does not bode well for migrating hawks. With thoughts of the 60-plus Broad-winged hawks observed last Tuesday, October 2, 1990, we hoped, and hoped, and hoped, and hoped....

We spent 5 hours on the hill and saw approximately 75 raptors fly over during that time period. Highlights for the day included one sub-adult *Golden Eagle*, a possible dark morph *Red-legged Hawk*, and two *Black Swifts*. Just before we got to the "hawk watch," Phil Gordon observed several *Evening Grosbeaks* fly over! We had fun watching fly past other migrants such as *Varied Thrush*, *American Pipit*, *Vaux's Swift*, *Band-tailed Pigeon*, and *Townsend's Warbler*.

Raptors observed included around 25 Turkey Vultures, about 8 Northern Harriers, approximately 20 Sharp-shinned Hawks, close to 15 Cooper's Hawks, 1 Red-shouldered Hawk, about 15 Redtailed Hawks, 1 Buteo sp. (possibly Rough-legged), 1 Golden Eagle, and 4 American kestrels.

Thirty-four species of birds were seen and great views, from the Farallon Islands to Mt. Diablo. Although we saw no really unusual birds, we did get looks at the common hawks, which is always a great thrill, and of course, there was always the great excitement of the anticipation that goes along with the "hawk watch." You never know what will appear on the horizon next, and with so many eyes (there were about 75 people at the "hawk watch"), every shout fired off a shot of Adrenaline and a multitude of speculations on the bird's identity!

At about 2:00 P.M., we gave up, quite content with having been fortunate to have been able to again witness that wonderful mystery in action—migration. I look forward to next year's "hawk watch."

There will also be information on how to sign up classrooms to use SCVAS environmental education programs.


SCVAS Office Wish List
