Shani holds a Ph.D. in Ecology from U.C. Davis and a Masters degree in Biology from Ben Gurion University in Israel. 

From Hwy 101 in Morgan Hill take Cochrane Rd. west to Monterey Hwy, turn right, go north 2.6 miles, turn right towards the Model Airplane Park (street is unnamed). Follow the road for 1/4 mile and park in the gravel lot at the first bend in road (meet at the gate if the entrance is locked). *RC*

Saturday Jan. 9, 8:00 AM Panoche Valley

Full day. Leader: Clay Kempf (831) 761-8260. Meet at Paicines Store on Hwy 25 approx. 11 miles south of Hollister. This is one of our better "out of the county" field trips traversing oak woodland and open grassland via back roads into a unique habitat. Targeted species include Phainopepla, Mountain Bluebird, Prairie Falcon, Ferruginous Hawk and Golden Eagle; other possibilities include Mountain Plover, Bald Eagle, Vesper Sparrow, Greater Roadrunner and Chukar. of extirpation. Extreme measures have to be employed if we're serious about maintaining and increasing the size of existing populations. What we believe to be the core strategies that will successfully lead to recovery are as follows:

- · Resources must be focused on existing colonies.
- Resources devoted to habitat acquisition outside of the 2-mile range of existing colonies will benefit other species, but are just a hope and a dream in the context of Burrowing Owl conservation.
- Strategies must have a strong emphasis on active management
 of colonies, including translocation, augmenting existing
 populations, captive breeding and any other technique of
 proven success in managing of Burrowing Owls.
- · Annual surveys must be done to establish the real population

level of breeding owls.

- · Working/partnership with WPCP is key.
- Management of San Jose landfills to optimize possible owl habitat should be explored.
- A working/partnership with VTA where owls are already present should be explored.
- Working partnerships with the managers of golf courses, airports, and county parks where BUOW have been recently resident, could augment current habitat."

As the public version of the plan nears release, we'll be looking for our Armchair Activists to bolster support for the comments we've made. Our Burrowing Owls need your help. Stay in touch with this issue and speak up when we need you!

SCVAS Field Seminar: Raptors of Robinson Road with Bob Power



The mixed agricultural and short-grass landscape of rural Solano County is an ideal fall and winter hunting ground for raptors of all shapes and sizes. We'll discuss the migration patterns, identification, and natural history of Ferruginous and Rough-legged Hawks, Merlin, and Prairie Falcon in the classroom portion of this workshop. The field trip will put us in position to observe as many as 7 species of raptor including the four target species and

observe their behavior in the wild. Along with these four superlative raptors, we hope to find Mountain Plover, Burrowing Owl, Horned Lark, Long-billed Curlew and other birds of the easy and not-so-easy to find variety.



Field Notes

(August-September 2009) by Bill Bousman

Waterfowl through Hawks

There are few late summer reports of Blue-winged Teal, so an eclipse male on the Sunnyvale Water Pollution Control Plant (WPCP) oxidation ponds on 25 Aug (WGB) and another male on Adobe Creek in the Palo Alto FCB on 26 Sep (MMR et al.) were of interest. Unusual inland, a juvenile Brown Pelican was seen at Almaden Lake on 31 Jul (JPa) and likely the same bird at Calero Reservoir on 1 Aug (AV). The high count of Brown Pelicans for the period was 53 birds on the Alviso ponds on 28 Sep (WGB). A casual visitor to the Palo Alto Duck Pond in recent years, a single Cattle Egret was there 27-30 Sep (SZ, v.ob.). Three White-faced Ibis were seen in the Mountain View Forebay on 15 Sep (SR) and one was in flight over the Palo Alto Baylands on 18 Sep (WGB). An immature Swainson's Hawk over San Martin on 23 Aug (SCR) was our token migrant for this fall. The first Merlin of the season was over the Santa Clara Valley Water District (SCVWD) ponds on 25 Sep (AV).

Shorebirds through Skimmers

An adult Pacific Golden-Plover was seen on Pond A17 on 1 Sep (WGB). Snowy Plover nesting in the vicinity of New Chicago Marsh continued through at least 27 Aug (WGB). High counts during surveys included 36 birds (including 9 young) on 28 Aug and 22 birds on 27 Sep (MMR, MJM, RGJ). Lesser Yellowlegs were found in small numbers in August, but 79 on the Coyote Creek Field Station (CCFS) pond on 1 Sep (MMR) overwhelmed the 16 Greaters there that day and is probably a high count for the county. Numbers dropped after that with 12 there on 13 Sep (SCR, v.ob.) being the last birds found. Twenty-four Red Knots seen at the Stevens Creek mouth on 27 Aug (FV) were the only birds reported this period. Single Sanderlings were seen on closed refuge ponds in Alviso on 29 Aug (MMR, MJM) and 26 Sep (MMR et al.). Only two Baird's Sandpipers were found during the fall passage, single juveniles on the CCFS waterbird pond on 1 Sep (MMR) and on closed refuge ponds on 27 Sep (MMR, MJM). The numbers of Pectoral Sandpipers seemed limited as well. Based on timing, a bird found in New Chicago Marsh on 2 Aug (ChW) was likely an adult.

Seven birds were at the CCFS pond on 25 Sep (MMR, RGJ, MJM) and a single bird was at the Palo Alto Baylands the same day (BP). With luck, numbers may pick up in October. A single juvenile **Stilt Sandpiper** was seen on the CCFS waterbird pond 10-11 Sep (SCR, v.ob.). Ten juvenile **Least Terns** found on Pond A16 on 23 Aug (DWe) were the only birds seen this summer. The summering **Black Tern** on Pond A16 was last seen on 1 Aug (RGJ et al.). Three juvenile **Common Terns** were found in Pond A9 on 27-28 Sep (MMR, MJM, WGB), the only ones of the season. **Elegant Terns** were

slightly more common. Two were on Pond A11 on 28 Aug (MMR, MJM, RGJ). A single bird was in Pond A16 on 1 Sep (RWR, FV). Two were heard near Pond A1 in Mountain View on 21 Sep (MDo). Seven birds were on Pond A9 on 27-28 Sep (MMR, MJM, WGB) and an adult and begging juvenile were seen on closed refuge ponds on 27 Sep (MMR, MJM). The total count of **Black Skimmers** on Pond A16 in late September was six adults and three juveniles (m.ob.), suggesting some nesting success.


Roadrunners through Phainopepla

A Greater Roadrunner was seen south of Pacheco Pass on 5 Sep (JB). Fall numbers of Vaux's Swifts were similar to summer and mostly in similar locations. A high count was 20 birds over Alviso on 15 Aug (JT). An adult female Costa's Hummingbird was at a Palo Alto feeder from 29 Aug to the end of the period (N&RT). An adult male Allen's Humminbird at a San Jose feeder 2-3 Aug (JT) was late. The first of the fall Willow Flycatchers showed up along Stevens Creek above Crittenden Lane on 17 Aug (RKe, PKe). Roughly 49 birds were found by the end of the period (m.ob.). The only report of a lowland Red-breasted Nuthatch was one found along Coyote Creek near Sycamore Drive on 17 Aug (RWR, FV, SN). I suspect this is a non-invasion year for montane birds. Single American Dippers were found along Stevens Creek above Mt. Eden Road on 4 Aug (DWe) and along Los Gatos Creek below the Los Gatos-Saratoga Road on 5 Aug (LMy). Both birds were

near areas where they breed. A female **Phainopepla** was seen near Llagas Creek at Bloomfield Road on 4 Sep (FV, RWR), well away from known breeding areas.

Warblers through Goldfinches

A hatch-year Tennessee Warbler was found at the Sunnyvale Baylands Park on 23-24 Sep (PKe, RKe, v.ob.), our premier vagrant trap. Migrant Nashville Warblers included one in a San Jose yard on 27 Aug (MV), a dull bird at the Sunnyvale Baylands Park found on 10 Sep (PKe, RKe, v.ob.) and apparently lingering there until 23 Sep, one in the fennel patch at the Palo Alto Baylands on 26 Sep (CG), and a second bird at Sunnyvale on 30 Sep (PKe, v.ob.). A hatch-year Blackpoll Warbler was discovered at the Gate 5 pond at Monte Bello OSP on 9 Sep (GHa), probably our first of this species found on our side of the Santa Cruz Mountains. A second bird was seen 22-24 Sep at the Sunnyvale Baylands Park (RGJ, v.ob.). A hatch-year American Redstart was in the same park on 21-23 Sep (RKe, WGB, v.ob.). Two passing MacGillivray's Warblers were found, one banded at CCFS on 9 Aug (fide MMR) and the other seen nearby along Coyote Creek on 13 Sep (SCR). The big surprise of the fall migration was a hatch-year Canada Warbler found at the Sunnyvale Baylands Park on 19 Sep (RKe, PKe, v.ob.). Amazingly, a second bird was found at the Palo Alto Baylands the next day (DWn). A Yellow-breasted Chat was banded at CCFS on 20 Sep (fide MMR). Four Chipping Sparrows were found at Jeffrey Fontana Park in San Jose on 27 Sep (JPa) and it is likely that these are part of the wintering flock that has been found there over the last few years. A Clay-colored Sparrow was in the Palo Alto Baylands fennel patch 28-30 Sep (PLaT, v.ob.). A second individual was found at the SCVWD ponds on 28 Sep (JPa).



A tailess **Brewer's Sparrow** was seen at the Palo Alto Baylands fennel patch on 10 Sep (BP) and remained there at least through 14 Sep (v.ob.). Another Brewer's was banded

at CCFS on 26 Sep (*fide* MDo). A male **Rose-breasted Grosbeak** was seen along Coyote Creek near Sycamore Drive on 16 Aug (RKe, PKe). A female/immature **Blue Grosbeak** was found along Stevens Creek below La Avenida 13-15 Sep (ChW, MMR). An adult male **Yellow-headed Blackbird** was at Shoreline Park 17-18 Sep (JMi, PLD). The only **Lawrence's Goldfinches** observed were one to two birds over Monte

Bello OSP 18-20 Aug (GHa) and a flock of at least three birds at Vasona Reservoir CP on 25 Sep (JPa).
