Will Year-3 Data from the Coe Fire Surveys Yield Answers?

n early 2008 a small group of interested birders set out to study the Henry Coe State Park wildfire of 2007, known as the "Lick Fire." (http://coefire2007.info/) The goal of this effort was to document the response of bird communities over time in the various habitats burned in the Lick Fire, and to relate any changes in bird communities to the vegetation changes that are being documented in other post fire research. Generally speaking there is little known about the response of bird communities to wildfires in the western United States. While extensive study occurs



on plant communities and the regeneration of the vegetative structure of habitats, there is a void in the information regarding how those vegetative changes affect bird communities.

It's that time of year again! Join your fellow SCVAS members for the annual potluck dinner and volunteer recognition awards. NOTE: Please bring your own plates and cups to the dinner to help reduce the use of wasteful plastic and paperware.

The eight survey routes are roughly 4 miles in length and consist of both burned and unburned habitats for control purposes. Each route was surveyed between 2 and 4 times in 2008 and all routes were surveyed 4 times in 2009. Each survey happens within a discreet window of time to enable the comparison of data from one year to the next. In the words of Amy Lauterbach, project manager and inspirational leader, "There's a lot of noise in the data, and we won't be able to do any real analysis until we have at least one more year of data, but it will be fun to poke around." Because of the survey start-up timing in 2008, only the third and fourth windows from 2008 offer complete data-sets to compare to 2009. But those comparisons

Please carpool if possible; bring binoculars, field guides, layered clothing.

LO = Lunch optional; RC = Heavy rain cancels; NF = No facilities available

Saturday May 1, 8:30 AM

Mines Rd., Del Puerto Canyon & vicinity Full day. Leader: Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. We'll start this trip in Del Puerto Canyon, working our way west to San Antonio Valley. From I-580 go east over Altamont Pass, to I-5, south on I-5, west at the Patterson exit (Diablo Grande Pkwy) and then right on Del Puerto Canyon Rd. Meet at the first pullout. Highlights include possible Costa's Hummingbird, Phainopepla, Lewis's Woodpecker and Lawrence's Goldfinch. Bring a full tank of gas, lunch and liquids.

Sunday May 2, 8:30 AM Stevens Creek County Park

Half day. Leader: Jim Johnson (408) 996-3506. From I-280 in Cupertino take Foothill Expwy exit south 2.1 miles (it becomes Stevens Canyon Rd) turn left into first park entrance and meet in first parking lot, Chestnut Picnic Area. A top riparian birding spot in the South Bay for migrants and local breeding birds. Entrance fee required. *LO*, *RC*

Wednesday May 5, 12:00 PM City of Sunnyvale Landfill

One hour. Leaders: Freddy Howell, Allen Royer and/or Elaine Gould. Contact organizer Silviana Ruiz (408) 730-7545 to attend. Donald M. Somers Water Pollution Control Plant, junction of Borregas and Caribbean. Meet at Trailhead at north end. Birding geared toward beginners. Bring binoculars; loaners also available. *RC*

Saturday May 8, 8:00 AM South-coastal San Mateo County (Gazos Creek and Pescadero Marsh)

Half day plus. Leader: Al Eisner (650) 926-2018 days and voice mail, (650) 364-3686 evenings. Meet at the Gazos Creek Coastal Access parking lot, on the west side of Highway 1 midway between Half Moon Bay and Santa Cruz (about 25 miles from each). Gazos Creek usually has a good variety of breeding (and singing) songbirds (possible MacGillivray's Warbler), while Pescadero Marsh and vicinity should add some migrant shorebirds and resident marsh birds. *LO*

Sunday May 9, 8:00 AM Charleston Slough

Half day. Leader: Steve Tracey (408) 966-3860. Meet at Terminal Way at the end of San Antonio Rd north off Hwy 101 in Mountain View. A good birding trip for beginning birders but all are encouraged to attend. A good trip to check out your spotting scope. Bring a friend.

Wednesday May 12, 8:30 A.M. Rancho Canada del Oro O.S.P.

Half day. Leader: Janna Pauser (408) 997-1727. Hwy 85 exit Almaden Expwy. Follow Almaden southeast to end; right on Harry; 1 block, then left on McKean. Take McKean 6+ miles past Calero Reservoir, turn right on Casa Loma Rd. Meet at parking lot at end of road (2 miles). We'll bird along a quiet road, easy walking. Bring water. Birds of oak woodland and riparian habitats. *LO*

Saturday May 15, 7:45 AM Anderson Dam/Coyote Creek County Park.

Half day. Leader: Jean Myers (408) 846-4810. From Hwy 101 in Morgan Hill take Cochrane Rd east and meet on the west side of the Target Parking lot (next to Hwy 101). We will carpool to the top of Anderson Dam, hike 2-3 miles and drive to other locations along Coyote Creek. Bring water and a snack and dress appropriately (the trail is steep and uneven in places). A Santa Clara County Parks Day use fee will be required. *LO*

Sunday May 16, 8:00 AM

Santa Teresa County Park South Half day. Leader: Janna Pauser (408) 569-9264. From the southern end of Almaden Expwy (Almaden Valley) turn right on Harry Rd., immediately left on McKean Rd then after 1.3 miles turn left on Fortini Rd; 0.6 miles later go left on San Vicente and immediately right into the small dirt parking lot. We'll take the lower (mostly flat) Fortini /Mine trail to the Pueblo picnic area. Hoped for species include Rufous-crowned Sparrow, Western Kingbird, Ash-throated Flycatcher and Lazuli Bunting.

Saturday May 22, 8:00 AM Russian Ridge Open Space Preserve

Half day. Leader: Frank Vanslager (650) 961-1505. Meet at the Vista Point Pullout located on the Bay side of Skyline Blvd. (Hwy. 35) a little over a mile northwest of Page Mill Rd. Bring extra layers of clothing in case it's foggy and cold. Possible Grasshopper Sparrow and Lazuli Bunting. *NF*

Sunday May 23, 8:00 AM Skyline Ridge Open Space Preserve

Half day. Leader: Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. Meet at the northeast corner of Skyline Blvd. (Hwy. 35) and Page Mill Rd (the corner nearest San Francisco and the bay). (Note: Do not park in the Russian Ridge Parking Lot!) This is a moderately strenuous walk with some elevation change. Highlights: possible Black-throated Gray Warbler, Western Tanager. Bring extra layers of clothing as temperatures can vary wildly even at this time of year. *LO*

Saturday May 29, 8:00 AM Monte Bello Open Space Preserve


Half day. Leader: Kirsten Holmquist (408) 747-0988. From I-280 in Palo Alto take Page Mill Rd west, toward Skyline Blvd. (Hwy. 35), for approx. 7 miles and meet at the Monte Bello OSP parking area on the left. Possible Lazuli Bunting, Blackthroated Gray Warbler, Chipping and Grasshopper Sparrows. Be prepared, it can be cold, wet and foggy. *LO*

Sunday May 30, 8:00 AM Arastradero OSP

Half day. Leader: Rich Page (408) 377-1092. From I-280 take Page Mill Rd west; turn right on Arastradero Rd and meet in the parking lot about a half-mile on the right. Trip involves moderately strenuous hiking. *RC*

Wednesday June 2, 12:00 PM City of Sunnyvale Landfill

One hour. Leaders: Freddy Howell, Allen Royer and/or Elaine Gould. Contact organizer Silviana Ruiz (408) 730-7545 to attend. See details from May 5th.

Sunday June 6, 8:00 AM Smith Creek/Twin Gates

"Birding by ear" field trip

Half day. Leader: Frank Vanslager (650) 961-1505). From I-680 take Alum Rock Ave northeast, turn right on Mt Hamilton Rd. go past main entrance to Grant Ranch County Park (approx. 9 miles). Continue uphill another two miles to Twin Gates parking lot on the left. Probable birds include Horned Lark, Grasshopper Sparrow, woodland and riparian breeding birds. This is a moderately strenuous hike over rolling hills.

Wednesday June 9, 8:00 AM Rancho San Antonio OSP

Half day. Leader: Roxie Handler. (408) 730-1745. From I 280, take the Foothill Expwy./Grant Rd. exit. Turn south (left) onto Foothill Blvd. Turn right on Cristo Rey Dr. Park entrance is about one mile on left. Meet in the last parking area adjacent to the restrooms. Good riparian habitat: orioles, grosbeaks, thrashers, quail and more.

Saturday June 12, 8:00 AM Charleston Slough

Half day. Leader: Dave Cook (408) 275-1492. For directions see write-up for May 9th.

Sunday June 13, 8:00 AM Alum Rock Park

Half day. Leader: Jim Johnson (408) 996-3506. From Hwy 101 or I-680 take McKee Rd northeast toward the hills then left on Toyon Ave, right on Penitencia Creek Rd and continue on into the park. Pass under the bridge and meet at the far end of the upper parking lot. This is a moderately strenuous 3-4 mile walk. *LO*

Saturday June 19, 8:00 AM Rancho del Oso (coastal Big Basin State Park)

Half day plus. Leader: Rich Page (408) 377-1092. Take Highway 17 to Santa Cruz, and then go north on Highway 1. Meet at the beach parking area alongside Highway 1 just north of the Waddell Creek Bridge (at MP 36.30; which is 2 miles south of



Ano Nuevo State Reserve and seven miles north of Davenport). This is a long but fairly level hike (approx. 5 miles) along the Skyline-to-the-Sea Trail looking for Swainson's Thrush, Winter Wren, Wilson's Warbler, and woodpeckers. Be prepared to carry lunch and liquids (in a backpack if possible) and dress in layers.

Sunday June 20, 8:30 AM Mt. Madonna County Park

Half day. Leader: Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527). From Hwy 101 in Gilroy take Hwy 152 West (Hecker Pass Hwy). After approximately 6.4 miles turn right into the Sprig Lake parking lot. This half-day birding walk, climbing on the way out and descending on the return trip, begins in mixed oak woodlands but in short order passes through grasslands, chaparral and, finally, coastal forest where Redwood and Douglas Fir dominate the landscape. Birding is as varied as the terrain, and offers insights into how habitat shapes bird populations. *LO*, but be sure to bring liquids.

Saturday July 10, 8:00 AM Charleston Slough

Half day. Leader: Nick Yatsko (408) 247-5499. For directions see write-up for May 9th.

Saturday August 7, 8:30 AM Ano Nuevo State Reserve

Half day. Leader: Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. The entrance is along Highway 1 about 30 miles south of Half Moon Bay or 20 miles north of Santa Cruz. Plan on a 3-4 mile walk (half of it in sand), fog, bright sun and wind. Bring a scope, lunch, liquids, and dress in layers. Possible birds include Bank Swallow, Marbled Murrelet and early returning shorebirds. There is a \$10 per car parking fee; meet at the far (south) end of the parking lot. *LO*

Sunday August 15, 8:00 AM Charleston Slough

Half day. Leader: Nick Yatsko (408) 247-5499. For directions see write-up for May 9th.

The Joys (and Frustrations) from Abundant Rain

Rain will definitely be a common theme for bird-andgarden topics of discussion for months to come. It can, however, be both a blessing and a curse, so it will be important to work with all that the rain brings with it.

I hope I can speak for all gardeners when I say how thrilled I am to see our native garden basking in the moisture of the past several months. It will be important to keep this in mind during the hot summer months, though - most of our native plants thrive

on this seasonal moisture and do not need much, if any, additional water during the summer. In fact, some of our native plants will actually be harmed by summer watering after they've become established (I think I killed the Woolly



Blue Curls that way...). So make sure to take advantage of the bounty of our current wet season and avoid over-watering! I've been told that the general rule for summer watering is twice in July and August, once in September and October. Otherwise, let mother nature do the work for you.

Unfortunately, not everything that thrives on the wet winter is something we actually *want* in our gardens - invasives and weeds will also be doing very well after all of this rain. When those dratted dandilions or oat grasses or what-have-you's show up amidst the sages and ceanothus, just remember that you're gardening for the wildlife. In other words, be willing to accept some weeds if the alternative is using harmful chemicals. And if you can't, or don't have the time to, remove the weeds all the way down to the roots, just removing the seed heads when they emerge can help prevent their return next year.

So, the moral of the story is that, like everything else, rain brings both benefits and problems to our Backyard Sanctuaries. The trick is utilizing the benefits to their best advantage, and trying to not obsess about the problems.

PALO ALTO SUMMER BIRD COUNT

If you missed the Palo Alto Christmas Bird Count (or enjoyed it), and you would like to do it when it is warmer, then the summer count is for you. It is always on the first Saturday of June, this year the 5th. We use the same count circle, and we use the same great group of leaders. Field Notes

(February-March 2010) By Bill Bousman

Waterfowl

Wintering Greater White-fronted Geese lingered into spring with one to two at the Coyote Creek GC through 19 Mar (MJM, v.ob.), one at The Villages GC through 18 Mar (MF), four in the Shoreline area through 17 Mar (CL, v.ob.) and one at Lake Cunningham on 25 Feb (JPa). A wintering Snow Goose at the San Pedro percolation ponds was seen through 27 Feb (SCR, v.ob.). The wintering Ross's Goose in the vicinity of Shoreline Park stayed at least through 27 Mar (WGB). A 1st-winter bird at the San Pedro percolation ponds remained until 27 Feb (SCR, v.ob.). An adult at the Los Capitancillos percolation ponds was seen on 13 Feb (AV) and 22 Feb (MJM). Lingering Eurasian Wigeon included two males in the Palo Alto FCB through 8 Feb (MDo et al., JDeB), two males at the South County Regional WasteWater Authority (SCRWA) treatment ponds on 10 Feb (RWR, FV) and 17 Mar (WGB), and three males still on Pond A14 in Alviso on 18 Mar (WGB). The last **Blue**winged Teal in Adobe Creek this season were recorded on 2 Feb (AH et al.). At least eight birds were at the SCRWA treatment ponds in Gilroy on 10 Feb (RWR, FV) with only two there on 17 Mar (WGB). A pair of Blue-winged Teal moved into Pond A1 in Mountain View on 18 Feb (JDeB) and a number of birds where seen there through the period (m.ob.), including at least eight there on 29 Mar (RSe). A solo male was at the Geng Road pond on 7 Mar (DK), and a pair was in Artesian Slough on 27 Mar (BP). An apparently pure male Eurasian Green-winged Teal was seen again in Stevens Creek near the tidal marsh on 7 Mar (MDo). The numbers of wintering Redheads dropped during the period with the last concentration noted being 87 birds in Crittenden Marsh on 8 Feb (WGB, RWR, FV). A single male was on Lake Lagunita at Stanford on 14 Feb (RSc) and 17 Mar (KA). Another male was seem on Pond A16 in Alviso on 28 Feb (MMR). The male Common X Barrow's Goldeneye wintering at the Los Capitancillos percolation ponds was seen again on 13 Feb (AV) and 22 Feb (MJM). Untypically, a pair of **Barrow's Goldeneyes** has remained on Shoreline Lake through the end of March (m.ob.). Another male was seen there on 8 Mar (WGB).

Loons through Gulls

Curiously, an adult **Red-throated Loon** showed up on the small pond near Gate 5 at the Monte Bello OSP on 8-9 Mar (GHa). We seldom encounter loons in montane stock ponds or reservoirs. Lingering **Brown Pelicans** continued to be found during the period. Nine adults on 22 Feb (WGB) was a high count for the Shoreline area, but by the end of the period only one was seen on 29 Mar (GL).

Continuing Whitefaced Ibis and a one-day Brandt's Cormorant were exceptional records.

In Alviso, the high count was of five adults on Pond A16 on 16 Feb (WGB), but only one was noted on 28 Feb (MMR, RGJ). Surprisingly, a single bird was seen over McClellan Ranch on 7 Feb (LMy et al.) and an immature was at Lake Cunningham on 22 Mar (MJM). A Brandt's Cormorant on Shoreline Lake on 9 Mar (AS, PLD), our sole March record, was a surprise but it did not stay. The American Bittern wintering in the Mountain View Forebay was seen more or less regularly throughout the period (m.ob.). A bird on Grant Lake was seen again on 25 Mar (OH, WGB). The wintering immature White-faced Ibis continued, adding our first February and March records for this species. Mostly one or two birds were seen, either in the Palo Alto Baylands or near the Mountain View Forebay. But three birds were tallied in the Palo Alto Baylands on 4 Feb (MBr, MMacP) and 9 Feb (AP), and three were recorded in Adobe Creek at dusk on 17 Mar (GL). Nesting of the Calaveras Reservoir Bald Eagles was first noted on 20 Feb (CVR) and they have remained at their tower nest through the period. Elsewhere, an immature was observed fishing on Lexington Reservoir on 6 Feb (BC),

both an adult and a 2nd-year bird were at the SCRWA treatment ponds in Gilroy on 10 Feb (RWR, FV), an adult was seen at Chesbro Reservoir on 5 Mar (RSh) and 26 Mar (JPa), and a sub-adult was over Ed Levin CP on 14 Mar (AJ et al.). Wintering Ferruginous Hawks are frequently seen through February, but this year the last one reported was in the Coyote Valley on 3 Feb (RWR, FV). A **Prairie Falcon** was seen in Halls Valley on 3 Feb (OH) and is likely a Diablo Range breeder. Two **Snowy** Plovers were seen on closed refuge ponds in Alviso on 28 Mar (MMR, RGJ), apparently returning breeders. A 1st-winter Glaucous Gull was found on Pond A16 in Alviso on 13 Feb (MSi) and a second bird was found there on 15 Mar (MMR), one or both birds were found there irregularly through the period (v.ob.). Another 1st-winter bird was seen on Almaden Lake on 20 Mar (AV, JPa). Black Skimmers continued on Charleston Slough with a peak count of 14 birds on 29 Mar (GL).

Roadrunners through Grackles

A Greater Roadrunner was seen along San Antonio Valley Road just after it leaves the valley on 28 Feb (GT, MV). In the south county, one was seen near Pacheco Pass on 14 Mar (JB). A Short-eared Owl was flushed in a field in the Coyote Valley on 25 Mar (TGs), encountering this owl is always a surprise. A male Rufous **Hummingbird** was seen in Ed Levin CP on 12 Feb (MMR), quite early. In March, about 10 males were recorded, most in Ed Levin CP (v.ob.), but also single males were in the Villages on 6 Mar (MF), at a Los Altos Hills feeder on 16 Mar (RCo), and in an Almaden Valley yard on 20 Mar (JPa). The first Allen's Hummingbird of the season was found in Ed Levin CP on 28 Feb (MMR, DWe). Two to three **Lewis's** Woodpeckers were seen in San Antonio Valley 28 Feb and 10 Mar (GT, MV, WGB). A count there of 14 on 16 Mar (RCi, JMi) was more impressive. The last report of the female Yellow-bellied Sapsucker in Menlo Park (and a sometime visitor to Santa Clara County) was on 10 Feb (KC). The last sighting of the male on Craig Drive in San Jose was on 6 Mar (RWR). A Pileated Woodpecker was seen over Hwy 17 on 7 Feb (DLSu). Birds became noisy in March with at least six encountered from Upper Stevens Creek CP to Mt. Madonna CP 18-

23 Mar (v.ob.). Red-breasted Nuthatches were found in a variety of montane locations in March (v.ob.), but none were found in the valley. An American Dipper was found along Saratoga Creek near Toll Gate Road on 6 Feb (MMR, AR) where occasionally found. Two dippers nest-building were seen again along Los Gatos Creek above East Main Street on 17 Feb (GHa) and 28 Feb (WGB). Nest-building was also ongoing by a pair along Stevens Creek above Mt. Eden Road throughout March (m.ob.). As with the Red-breasted Nuthatches, a few Golden-crowned Kinglets were found in montane areas in March (v.ob.), but none were seen in the valley. Typically, Bluegray Gnatcatchers appear in the second or third week of March, so a bird near the IBM Almaden Research Center on 11 Feb and two there on 28 Feb (both JPa) were likely wintering nearby. Amale Hermit Warbler found on Black Road in Sanborn-Skyline CP on 23 Mar (PLD) was perhaps one of our rare wintering birds, first migrants do not appear until mid-April. The Charleston Road marsh Northern Waterthrush was found again on 8 Feb (RWR, FV), 9 and 15 Feb (LMi), and 27 Mar (WGB). A female

Wilson's Warbler found in Los Gatos Creek CP on 20 Feb (AWa) likely wintered nearby, as our summer residents do not show up until mid-March. The wintering Chipping Sparrow flock in Jeffrey Fontana Park in the Almaden Valley persisted through the period (m.ob.) with a high count of 10 birds there on 28 Feb (WGB). Another wintering chippie visited an Almaden Valley




yard on 15 Feb (JPa). Grasshopper Sparrows were singing along the Calero Creek Trail of San Vicente on 20 Mar (JPa), at the IBM Almaden Research Center on 24 Mar (JPa), and in Ed Levin CP on 27 Mar (SR, AM). The wintering Nelson's Sparrow was found again at the Palo Alto Baylands on 27 Feb (TGr). A White-throated Sparrow was found in the Picchetti OSP on 2 Feb (RKe, PKe). One to two birds were in Belgatos Park from 6 Feb to at least 30 Mar (JPa). Another bird was in Stevens Creek CP on 13 Mar (MDo et al.). A male Western Tanager was in Edenvale Garden Park on 28 Feb (JPa). One was heard the

next day in Los Gatos (SCR, DJ). A first-winter female was photographed in Vasona CP on 9 Mar (ER) and either this bird or another was heard there on 30 Mar (JPa). Migrants and returning summer residents normally appear in early April. A wintering 1st-winter male Blackheaded Grosbeak visited a Saratoga feeder on 27 Feb (DJ fide SCR). Great-tailed Grackles continued at the

Coyote Creek GC during the period (v.ob.) with a high count of seven females on 14 Mar (MMR).

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
