Half day. **Leader:** Janna Pauser (408) 997-1727 or jannana@pacbel.net

Directions: From Hwy 85 take Almaden Expwy southeast to Harry Road; go right 1 block, then left on McKean. Take McKean about 6 miles, past Calero Reservoir, and turn right on Casa Loma Road. Meet in the parking lot at the end of the road, about 2 miles. Birds: Black-headed Grosbeak, Western Wood-Pewee, Purple Finch, possible Cassin's Vireo, Lazuli Bunting, Blue-Gray Gnatcatcher, and Allen's Hummingbird. Notes: Bring water. LO

Wednesday May 4, 12:00 PM City of Sunnyvale Landfill

One hour. **Leaders:** Freddy Howell, Allen Royer and/or Elaine Gould. Contact organizer Silviana Ruiz (408) 730-7545 to attend. **Directions:** Meet at Donald M. Somers Water Pollution Control Plant, junction of Borregas Avenue and Caribbean Drive. Meet at Trailhead at north end. **Notes:** Birding geared toward beginners. Bring binoculars; loaners also available. *RC*

Saturday May 7, 8:00 AM South-coastal San Mateo County (Gazos Creek and Pescadero Marsh)

Half day plus. **Leader:** Al Eisner (650) 926-2018 days and voice mail, (650) 364-3686 evenings. **Directions:** Meet at the Gazos Creek Coastal Access parking lot, on the west side of Highway 1 midway between Half Moon Bay and Santa Cruz (about 25 miles from each). **Birds:** Gazos Creek usually has a good variety of breeding (and singing) songbirds (possible MacGillivray's Warbler), while Pescadero Marsh and vicinity should add some migrant shorebirds and resident marsh birds. **LO**

Sunday May 8, 8:30 AM Charleston Slough

Half day. **Leader:** Ann Verdi (408) 266-5108. **Directions:** Meet at Terminal Way at the end of San Antonio Road, located north off Hwy 101 in Mountain View. **Notes:** This is a good birding trip for beginning

birders although all levels are encouraged to attend. This will be a good trip to utilize your spotting scope. Bring a friend.

Saturday May 14, 8:00 AM Alum Rock Park

Half day. **Leader:** Jim Johnson (408) 996-3506. **Directions:** From Hwy 101 or I-680 take McKee Road northeast toward the hills then left on Toyon Avenue, right on Penitencia Creek Road and continue into the park. Pass under the bridge and meet at the far end of the upper parking lot. **Difficulty Level:** Moderately strenuous, 3 to 4 miles. **LO**

Sunday May 15, 8:30 AM Mount Madonna County Park

Half day. **Leader:** Steve Tracey (408) 996-3860. **Directions:** From Hwy 101 in Gilroy take Hwy 152 West (Hecker Pass Hwy). After approximately 6.4 miles turn right into the Sprig Lake parking lot. This half-day birding walk, climbing on the way out and descending on the return trip, begins in mixed oak woodlands but in shortly passes through grasslands, chaparral and coastal forest where Redwood and Douglas Fir dominate the landscape. **Notes:** Bring water. *LO*

Half day. **Leader:** Rich Page (408) 377-1092. **Directions:** From I-280 take Page Mill Road west, turn right on Arastradero Road and meet in the parking lot about a half-mile on the right. **Difficulty Level:** Moderately strenuous. *RC*

Directions: Meet at the vista point pullout located on the Bay side of Skyline Boulevard (Hwy. 35), a little over one mile northwest of Page Mill Road. Birds: Possible Grasshopper Sparrow and Lazuli Bunting. Notes: Bring extra layers of clothing in case it's foggy and cold. NF

Saturday May 28, 8:00 AM Monte Bello OSP

Half day. **Leader:** Kirsten Holmquist (408) 747-0988. **Directions:** From I-280 in Palo Alto take Page Mill Road west, toward Skyline Boulevard (Hwy. 35), for approximately 7 miles and meet at the Monte Bello OSP parking area on the left. **Birds:** Possible Lazuli Bunting, Black-throated Gray Warbler, Chipping and Grasshopper Sparrows. **Notes:** Be prepared for cold, wet and foggy conditions. **LO**

Sunday May 29, 8:00 AM Skyline Ridge OSP

Half day. Leader: Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. Directions: Meet at the northeast corner of Skyline Boulevard (Hwy. 35) and Page Mill Road (the corner nearest San Francisco and the bay). Do not park in the Russian Ridge Parking Lot. Difficulty Level: Moderately strenuous with some elevation change. Birds: Possible Blackthroated Gray Warbler, Western Tanager. Notes: Bring extra layers of clothing as temperatures can vary wildly at this time of year. LO

Half day. **Leader:** Frank Vanslager (650) 961-1505). **Directions:** From I-680 take Alum Rock Avenue northeast, turn right on Mount Hamilton Road and go past the main entrance to Grant Ranch County Park (approximately 9 miles). Continue uphill for another two miles to the Twin Gates parking lot on the left. **Birds:** Possible birds include Horned Lark, Grasshopper Sparrow, woodland and riparian breeding birds. **Difficulty Level:** Moderately strenuous over rolling hills.

Foothill Boulevard south about 2 miles. Turn left into Stevens Creek County Park and left again into the Chestnut parking area. **Birds:** Riparian habitat. **Notes:** Entry fee required. **LO**

Saturday June 11, 8:00 AM Alum Rock Park

Half day. **Leader:** Jim Johnson (408) 996-3506. **Directions:** See the May 14th write-up for Alum Rock Park.

Sunday June 12, 8:00 AM Rancho del Oso (coastal Big Basin State Park)

Half day plus. **Leader:** Rich Page (408) 377-1092. **Directions:** Take Highway 17 to Santa Cruz and then go north on Highway 1. Meet at the beach parking area alongside Highway 1 just north of the Waddell Creek Bridge (at MP 36.30; which is 2 miles south of Ano Nuevo State Reserve and seven miles north of Davenport). **Difficulty Level:** This is a long but fairly level hike (approximately 5 miles) along the Skyline-to-the-Sea Trail. **Birds:** Swainson's Thrush, Winter Wren,

Wilson's Warbler and woodpeckers. **Notes:** Be prepared to carry lunch and liquids (in a backpack if possible) and dress in layers.

Saturday/Sunday June 18-19 Yuba Pass/Sierra Valley

Leader: Clay Kempf (831) 761-8260, or ltjaeger@att.net. **Directions:** Meet at 7:00 AM Saturday at the large Yuba Pass parking lot on south side of Hwy 49. From the South Bay take Hwy 80 to Truckee; go north on Hwy 89, then west on Hwy 49 to Yuba Pass. Birds: Saturday will be spent exploring the Yuba Pass area for Red-breasted and Williamson's Sapsucker, White-headed and Black-backed Woodpecker, American Dipper, Townsend's Solitaire, Calliope Hummingbird, Evening Grosbeak, Yellowrumped, Hermit, Nashville & MacGillivray's Warblers, Lincoln's Sparrow and more. On Sunday the group will bird east of the pass in drier habitat where Mountain Bluebird, Green-tailed Towhee, Sage Thrasher, Vesper and Brewers Sparrow, and other Great Basin specialties occur. Our last stop is the fresh water Marsh of Sierra Valley, where Sandhill Crane, Yellow-headed Blackbird, White-faced Ibis, various ducks, and in some years, Black Tern, breed. Notes: Motels in the Sierra City area are recommended for their proximity to the meeting locations. Camping is available at a number of sites throughout the region, including Yuba Pass itself. **Trip limited to the first 15 people** to register with Clay via email or phone.

Saturday July 16, 8:00 AM Charleston Slough

Half day. **Leader:** Nick Yatsko (408) 247-5499. **Directions:** Meet at Terminal Way at the end of San Antonio Road, north off Hwy 101 in Mountain View. **Notes:** All levels are encouraged to attend but birding will be geared toward the beginning birder.

Saturday August 6, 8:30 AM Ano Nuevo State Reserve

Half day. **Leader:** Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. **Directions:** Entrance to the preserve is along Highway 1 about 30 miles south of Half Moon Bay or 20 miles north of Santa Cruz. **Difficulty level:** Plan on a 3 to 4 mile walk (half of it in sand), fog, bright sun and wind. **Birds:** Possible birds include Bank Swallow, Marbled Murrelet and early returning shorebirds. **Notes:** Bring a scope, lunch, liquids, and dress in layers. The Armers dedicated themselves to the project and devoted weekends and holidays to filming our Burrowing Owls on location and then editing the results. Additionally, the Armers conducted many hours of interviews with Burrowing Owl advocates and two of the leading Burrowing Owl biologists in North America. In November of 2010, SCVAS assumed the responsibility of assembling the Administrative Record for our litigation efforts to hold the County of San Benito accountable and to require an adequate Environmental Impact Report for the Panoche Valley Solar Project. Little did we know just what this would entail. San Benito County provided us with hundreds of documents that had to be sorted, categorized, indexed, duplicated and organized according to complex, and often baffling, court rules, and it was Jessie's outstanding administrative abilities, dedication and tenacity that

saved us. She volunteered long hours - often into the night - sifting through piles and boxes of emails, studies, opinions, decisions, letters, announcements and various other documents to get the record formatted and organized in just the right way. We submitted the record to the County in February, and promptly hired Jessie part time to help Susan with the Birdathon effort. Stop by our office on a Monday, Thursday or a Friday afternoon and say hello.

Conservation Corner

Here are some of the projects that your EA and Environmental Action Committee are working on:

Panoche Valley Update

SCVAS litigation efforts to hold the County of San Benito accountable and to require an adequate Environmental Impact Report for the Panoche Valley Solar project are proceeding as expected. We submitted the Administrative Record in February 2011, and in March the record was certified - 15 volumes and 11,

242 pages. Our attorney Rose Zoia is working on an opening brief, due April 29th. We expect the hearing to be held on August 8, 2011 or soon after.

Recent stories in the Hollister Freelance indicate that Solargen Energy is experiencing financial difficulties and delays in the pursuit of the Panoche Solar project.

Santa Clara County Park Acquisition Policy

SCVAS, in coordination with other local environmental organizations, engaged in advocacy efforts with Santa Clara County Supervisors and their staff. These efforts contributed to improvement of a proposed change to the policy for Parkland Acquisitions by the county.

As we hoped, the Board of Supervisors unanimously accepted the County Parks Department's status report and approved the Parks Department's policy

recommendations. This decision maintains the "regional" criterion for parkland acquisitions, and effectively diverted an effort to define "park deficiency" in urban areas as a criterion for allocating Park Charter funds for local neighborhood park acquisitions.

Supervisors requested that County Parks Department develop a proposal for a formalized parkland acquisition program to address urban and suburban park needs. The board gave direction that any such program should be consistent with County Parks' historical roles as a provider of park services in the unincorporated areas and as a partner with other parks and recreation service providers in parkland acquisitions. The board further directed that any such program would not be at the expense of County Parks' traditional commitment to the acquisition of regional parklands.

Thus, public discussion about the appropriate guidelines for a parkland acquisition program to address urban and suburban park needs is to continue, and we will continue advocating for nature and burrowing owls, and for open space. We thank the many volunteers and "Armchair Activists" who participated in this campaign by attending public meetings and by writing to the Parks department and to Santa Clara County supervisors and hope you all will continue lending your voice in support of our advocacy efforts in this and other efforts.

Stevens Creek Restoration - Phase II

The City of Cupertino has decided to proceed with the design and environmental review for Phase II of the \$2.7 million


Stevens Creek Park Project. The project would provide for creek restoration and the extension of the Stevens Creek Trail from Blackberry Farm to Stevens Creek Boulevard. SCVAS is very much in favor of this project.

Design of the project has started so that Cupertino can receive a \$1.2 million California River Parkways grant for its implementation of the project, about one third of the estimated cost. The terms of the grant required that planning had to begin immediately. On Jan. 18 the Cupertino Council voted to allocate up to \$200,000 to start the project, even though it is not clear that the city can secure the additional funding needed to finish it. They instructed staff to seek those additional grants from the Santa Clara Water District and other agencies. In June 2011 the city council will revisit the project to examine funding availability.

The already completed Phase I at Blackberry Farm is widely touted as a model for successful urban stream restoration. That phase re-created a lively ecosystem: aquatic insects and steelhead trout thrive in pools and riffles formed to enhance aquatic habitat in the widened creek. Ancient western sycamores

were preserved and provide shade and shelter to birds and bats. The Phase I work included widening the creek channel and adding meanders, as well as planting more than 6,000 native plants to create a riparian woodland and meadow both for wildlife and people. Recreation facilities and the Stevens Creek Trail provide connectivity and services to the Cupertino community and beyond.

Phase II will engineer a "natural" extension of the Blackberry Farm restoration. The project would remove expanses of concrete from the creek banks, expand the creek channel and enhance it with backwater and riffles to encourage spawning by steelhead trout and to increase survival of fry. Riparian vegetation will be planted to replace the concrete along the creek banks, and ancient sycamores and oaks will be preserved. The restored creek would provide a backbone to all the other uses of the land that surrounds it: the Stocklmeier orchard, the golf course, and the trail linking both sides of the creek to the urban environment beyond.

Field Notes

(February-March 2011)

Geese through Cormorants

Wintering Greater White-fronted Geese lingered into March. Two birds were found regularly at Lake Cunningham during the period (m.ob.). One to nine birds were seen at various locations from Shoreline Park to the Palo Alto Muni GC over the period with nine birds seen on Adobe Creek in the Palo Alto FCB on 1 Feb (PJM) and perhaps the same ones along Pond A2W on 1 Mar (FV). An immature **Snow Goose** found in January at the Los Capitancillos percolation ponds remained during this period, at least through 27 Mar. It was either found near the ponds or at DeAnza Park, about a half mile away (v.ob.). One or two Ross's Goose continued to be seen at Lake Cunningham through 5 Mar (m.ob.). One to two birds were at the South County Regional Waste-Water Authority (SCRWA) treatment ponds in Gilroy 3-4 Feb (RWR, FV, WGB). A Ross's on the Palo Alto Muni GC on 3 Feb (GHa) may also have been the solo bird at Shoreline Park on 11 Feb (RoF, PaF) and 1 Mar (FV, RoF). **Tundra Swans** continued to be seen along Bloomfield Road through 11 Feb, pleasing many observers. Numbers increased from the initial five birds to the nine that were tallied 10-11 Feb (MDeF, CH, DLSh). A single male Eurasian Wigeon was seen again at the SCRWA treatment ponds in Gilroy on 3 Feb (RWR, FV). One in the Palo Alto estuary on 6 Feb (JDeB) was also a repeat. The number of males in Pond A9 in Alviso had declined to two by 12 Feb (WGB). Two birds were seen at the east end of the Sunnyvale Baylands Park on 20 Feb(SSh). The most regular location was Pond A16 in Alviso where one to two males were seen 26 Feb-27 Mar (v.ob.) A single male was on the former Arzino Ranch lands on 27 Mar as well (DWe). Pond A16 also provided a male Eurasian X American Wigeon 1-5 Mar (MJM, AME). Atypically, Blue-winged **Teal** were not seen after 14 Feb. Two pairs were at the SCRWA treatment ponds 3-4 Feb (RWR, FV, WGB). Two birds were also at the Sunnyvale WPCP ponds on 5 Feb (JTh). On 14 Feb, two males were seen in Artesian Slough in Alviso (GHa) and another male was in the Lockheed-Martin marsh (RCP, MW). As in recent years, the number of Redhead drop after January, five were in

the Alviso ponds on 12 Feb (WGB) and a pair was seen in Pond A16 28 Feb-1 Mar (RWR, FV, DWe, MJM). An adult female Long-tailed Duck was found on Pond A10 in Alviso on 27 Mar (MMR, RJG), but was not seen again. It may have been the same bird as seen there in January. The wintering male Common X Barrow's Goldeneye continued at the Los Capitancillos percolation ponds through 9 Mar (AV, JPa, MJM). The pair of Barrow's Goldeneyes at Shoreline Lake stayed until 28 Feb, whereas the single wintering female was last seen on 16 Feb (m.ob.). At least one Mountain Quail was heard calling in the Adobe Creek drainage

on the slopes of Black Mountain on 12 Mar (JY). They had been heard in that area regularly prior to 2004, but not in recent years. A juvenile **Red-throated Loon** was found on the northernmost of the Los Gatos Creek CP percolation ponds on 20 Feb (RFu) and was there at least through 22 Feb (m.ob.). Another Red-throated was seen on Pond A11 in Alviso on 28 Mar (RWR, FV). A juvenile was found on Shoreline Lake on 30 Mar (RS) and has continued there into April. Single adult **Brown Pelicans** were seen on Pond A16 in Alviso on 14 Feb (GHa) and 1 Mar (MJM).

Bitterns through Shorebirds

The American Bittern wintering in the vicinity of the Mountain View Forebay was seen again on 3 Feb (GHa) and 10 Feb (CBe). A bird found on the Ogier Avenue ponds on 23 Feb (RWR, FV, AV) was the first one found there this winter. The wintering White-faced Ibis continued through at least 27 Feb, mostly in the Palo Alto Baylands, but with occasional excursions to the Mountain View Forebay and the Palo Alto FCB (m.ob.). Nesting Bald Eagles from north to south. The nesting pair on the west side of Calaveras Reservoir were on a new nest closer to the reservoir shore by 4 Mar (SR) and were apparently incubating by the end of the period (m.ob.). The pair nesting in the northern part of Anderson Reservoir were seen on their nest on 31 Mar (DPo). The pair

that nested last year in the northern part of Coyote Reservoir has been seen regularly during the period, but there is no evidence of nesting (m.ob.). A new nesting pair was seen building a nest next to San Felipe Lake on 29 Feb (PJM) and have remained at this nest through the period (v.ob.). Late winter Ferruginous Hawks included one west of Calaveras Reservoir on 5 Feb (HS, VK) and a dark morph south of Anderson Dam the same day (SCR). Single birds were seen on Marsh road on 13 Feb (ViT et al.) and 14 Mar (DWe). Birds wintering in the Coyote Valley were last seen on 2 Mar (MJM). A **Prairie** Falcon was seen east of Hellyer Avenue on 5 Mar (DPe) and may be a wintering bird. The juvenile Sandhill Crane remained at Lake Cunningham until 7 Feb (DM). The wintering Solitary Sandpiper was last seen along Thompson Creek on 13 Feb (RGJ). But then it (or another) was discovered 23 days later at Lake Cunningham (GHa) and remained there through the end of the period (m.ob.). Our two previous winter records were for stays of 3 and 4 days, this bird appears to have stayed well over 50 days. A scattering of Lesser Yellowlegs records was about typical for recent years: five birds in the impoundment north of the Alviso Marina CP on 14 Feb (GHa) and two birds in flooded fields along Disk Drive on 27 Mar (MMR, DWe). Good concentrations of **Sanderling** continued to be found in Pond A12 in Alviso during the period with a high count of 36 on 12 Feb (WGB). One to two alternate Red-necked Phalarope seen in Pond A12 on 27-28 Feb (MMR, RGJ, RWR, FV) are very rare this early, we have only three or four prior March records.

Gulls through Phainopepla

A 2nd-cycle 'Kumlien's' Iceland Gull was found and photographed in the Ogier Avenue ponds on 5 Mar (SCR) and was also recorded there again on 9 Mar (RWR, DWe). The Ogier Avenue ponds have also been a good spot for Glaucous Gulls. Both 1st-cycle and 2nd-cycle bird were seen there on 5 Feb (SCR). One or more 1st-cycle birds were seen there 26 Feb-12 Mar (m.ob.). This winter, the Palo Alto dump is digging in trash near the fence with Byxbee Park, providing good views of thousands of gulls. A 1st-cycle Glaucous was picked out of that crowd on 21 Feb (MJM) and this or another bird was seen at least through 6 Mar (MJM, MDo, RFu). Two 1st-cycle birds were seen in the New Chicago Marsh on 25 Feb (SCR) and single 1st-cycle or immature birds were seen nearby in Pond A16 on 1 Mar (MJM) and 5

Mar (AME). A 1st-cycle Glaucous was seen at Almaden Lake on 8 Mar (EGu) and again on 13 Mar (SCT et al.). Finally, an immature bird was spotted on Pond A12 in Alviso on 27 Mar (DPe, DWe). The wintering flock of Black Skimmers has apparently stayed hidden in the northwest corner of Pond A1 in Mountain View, but 10 birds were seen in the Mountain View Forebay on 15 Feb (PJM). These birds reappeared on 23 Mar (WGB) and nine or 10 birds have been more or less regular since, either in Charleston Slough or the forebay (v.ob.). Two birds were seen on PondA16, where they have nested in the past, on 26 Feb (SCR) but have not been reported since 1 Mar (v.ob.). A Greater Roadrunner has been heard cooing and been seen east of Hellyer Road 3-11 Mar (RWR, FV, v.ob.). At least one Long-eared Owl has been heard in the Stevens Creek Canyon in Monte Bello OSP, first detected on 5 Feb (JHi, DBr et al.). The last of the Short-eared Owls at the vole fest in Coyote Valley was seen on 8 Feb (WGB). The first Rufous **Hummingbird** of the spring was on Piers Lane at the Stanford Dish on 16 Mar (PDu), that bird has remained through the period. Similarly a male at a feeder in Mountain View on 18 Mar (DC) has also remained through the end of the month. Otherwise birds have been found widely on both side of the valley (m.ob.). The first Allen's Hummingbird of the season was at a feeder in The Villages in San Jose on 9 Mar (MFu). As in other years with strong irruptions of Red-breasted Nuthatches, good numbers continued to found along the valley floor and nearby during the period. American **Dippers** continued along Los Gatos Creek above Main Street on 7 Feb and 8 Mar (RWR, FV, GHa) and along Stevens Creek above Mt. Eden Road 11-12 Mar (PBr, MDo, RCP et al.). A Golden-crowned Kinglet at Ed Levin CP on 12 Feb (SCT) was the only report away from the Santa Cruz Mountains. A Blue-gray Gnatcatcher along the Stiles Ranch Trail in Santa Teresa CP on 9 Feb (GHa, LR) was a continuing wintering bird. A singing bird at Monte Bello OSP on 5 Mar (MDo) was the first spring arrival.

Warblers through Evening Grosbeak

A **Yellow Warbler** seen near the end of Geng Road in Palo Alto on 21 Mar (DWe) likely wintered near by. Returning summer birds are usually not seen until the second week in April. A **Black-throated Gray**

Warbler found along San Francisquito Creek at the San Mateo Drive bike bridge on 21 Feb (RFu) was also a wintering bird. The Palm Warbler wintering at the end of Embarcadero Way in Palo Alto was seen again on 21 Feb (AME) and 27 Feb (RGJ). The wintering will-o'-the-wisp Northern Waterthrush at Charleston Road marsh was seen again on 11 Feb

(RWR,FV,AME),23 Feb (DWe), and 27 Feb (JMu). The Jeffrey Fontana Park wintering Chipping Sparrows were found throughout the period (JPa, RWR, FV). A Grasshopper Sparrow along the Stiles Ranch Trail on 9 Feb (GHa, LRo) was likely a bird overwintering. The three singing birds seen there on 27 Mar (SCT) were likely returning breeders. The **Swamp Sparrow** found at the Ogier Avenue ponds in January was seen again on 20 Feb (JTh, SCT), 26 Feb (RWR, FV), and 27 Feb (AV). Only four White-throated Sparrows were found during the period. One was regular at a feeder in an Almaden Valley yard throughout the period. A single bird was seen again at Foothill College on 5 Feb (R&BMcD). A bird found at the Los Capitancillos percolation ponds was seen again on 7 Feb (AV). Similary, one found along the Los Alamitos Creek Trail in January was seen at least three times during this period (JPa, SCT et al.). A Western Tanager was found along San Francisquito Creek again on 3 Feb and 10 Mar (both RFu) near the San Mateo Drive bike bridge. This is like the same bird as found early in the winter along the creek. A basic male Indigo Bunting came to a feeder in Saratoga 13-19 Feb and 19-29 Mar (GBa, LBa). Its molt into alternate plumage was well underway during its March visit. We have one prior winter record. Between 3 and 7 female-type **Great-tailed Grackles** were seen at the Coyote Creek GC through 5 Mar (v.ob.). We've not found evidence of nesting there in the last two summers, but don't know where the local population is breeding. Good numbers of Pine Siskins have been found at a number of feeders, including in Morgan Hill (18, RHe), Saratoga (14, GBa), and The Villages (8, MFu). Other locales where birds were seen included Almaden-Quicksilver CP (30+, MJM, JPa), Santa Teresa CP (6, AV), Monte Bello OSP (GHa), and Henry Coe SP (JY, AL). The Evening Grosbeak invasion

declined during the period. The concentrations off Orchard Parkway in Santa Clara had largely dispersed by mid-January, but there were reprises of 12 birds on 3 Feb (AB) and four on 13 Feb (RCi). The birds in the 15-block area from Sylvan Park in Mountain View to Mango Park in Sunnyvale remained in good numbers through 15 Feb (m.ob.) with a high count of 16 at South

Mary and Maranta avenues on 7 Feb (MSa). After 15 Feb, none were found there until three were seen on 31 Mar (MSa). Other sightings included six over the Gamble Garden in Palo Alto on 1 Feb (PJM), 30 on Kenneth Drive in Palo Alto on 7 Feb (CBe), three to 10 birds on the Los Alamitos Creek Trail 10-12 Feb (JPa et al.), one over Lake Cunningham on 5 Mar (SCR), and three to seven birds at Guadalupe Oak Grove Park 26-28 Mar (JPa et al.).
