Sunday Jan. 1, 7:30 AM County Chase

Half day. **Leader**: Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. Get a head start on your County Year List with some vagrant chasing as we attempt to track down some of the unusual birds seen on the Christmas Bird Counts in Santa Clara County. **Directions:** From Hwy 237 in San Jose take Gold St. North to the end, bear left on Elizabeth St. and then right on Hope St. Meet outside the entrance to the Alviso Marina Parking Lot. **Notes:** Bring a full tank of gas, lunch, and field guides. Be prepared to car pool as parking may be limited at some sites. **RC**

Monday Jan. 2 - No Field Trip Mt Hamilton CBC

Wednesday Jan. 4, 12:00 PM City of Sunnyvale Landfill

One hour. **Leaders**: Freddy Howell, Allen Royer and/or Elaine Gould. Contact organizer Silviana Ruiz (408) 730-7545 to attend. **Directions**: Donald M. Somers Water Pollution Control Plant, junction of Borregas and Caribbean. Meet at trailhead at north end. **Difficulty Level:** Birding geared toward beginners. **Notes:** Bring binoculars; loaners also available. *RC*

Saturday Jan. 7, 8:00 AM Ogier Ponds

Half day. **Leader**: Kirsten Holmquist (408) 747-0988. **Directions:** From Hwy 101 in Morgan Hill take Cochrane Rd. West to Monterey Hwy, turn right, go north 2.6 miles, turn right towards the Model Airplane Park (street is unnamed). Follow the road for 1/4 mile and park in the gravel lot at the first bend in the road (meet at the gate if the entrance is locked). **RC**

Sunday Jan. 8, 8:00 AM Panoche Valley

Full day. **Leader**: Clay Kempf (831) 761-8260. **Directions**: Meet at Paicines Store on Hwy 25 approx. 11 miles south of Hollister. **Notes**: This is one of our better "out of the county" field trips traversing oak woodland and open grassland via back roads into a unique habitat. Targeted species include Phainopepla, Mountain Bluebird, Prairie *The Avocet 2*

Falcon, Ferruginous Hawk and Golden Eagle; other possibilities include Mountain Plover, Bald Eagle, Vesper Sparrow, Greater Roadrunner and Chukar. *Bring lunch and a full tank of gas;* carpooling is strongly recommended due to limited parking on the narrow roads. FRS radios (Walkie-Talkies) set to channel 11 may prove useful on this trip. **IMPORTANT:** Do not expect to use the restrooms at the Paicines Store, as their use is limited to paying customers (we encourage patronage of local businesses).

Wednesday Jan. 11, 9:00 AM Coyote Lake County Park, Gilroy

Half day. **Leader**: Bill Barnhart, (408) 779-6123. **Directions:** In Gilroy, take Leavesley Rd. (exit 357) east from Hwy 101 for 1.8 miles. Turn left on New Ave., in .6 miles turn right on Roop Rd. Stay on Roop Rd. for 3 miles (there will be a "T" intersection - turn left to stay on Roop) and take a left into the park entrance on Coyote Reservoir (Lake) Rd. Meet in the first parking lot on the right (Lakeview Picnic Area). **Notes:** Possible entrance fee. **RC, LO**

Saturday Jan. 14, 8:15 AM Arastradero OSP

Half day. **Leader**: Rich Page (408) 377-1092. **Directions:** From I-280 take Page Mill Rd. west; turn right on Arastradero Rd. and meet in the parking lot about ½ mile on the right. **Difficulty Level:** Moderate walking. *RC*

Sunday Jan. 15, 9:00 AM San Francisco's Southern Parks

Half Day. Leader: Alan Hopkins (415) 664-0983, Cell phone (415) 794-0281. Directions: Heading north on Hwy 101 take the Candlestick/3Com Park off ramp just after passing Brisbane Lagoon. Continue east along Harney Way and turn right onto Jamestown/Hunters Point Expwy. If no locked gate is encountered then drive along the Expwy, watch for the entrance to Candlestick State Recreation Area on the right and enter (no fee). We will meet at the end of the paved road that runs through the park (if gate is locked, meet in front of gate). Notes: We'll choose a good place to

see shorebirds, bay ducks, loons and raptors. We will then visit San Francisco's second largest park - McLaren Park, for land birds and a few dabbling ducks. Other lesser-known but birdy parks may be visited, time permitting. *RC*

Saturday Jan. 21, 8:00 AM Los Capitancillos Ponds

Half day. **Leader**: Ann Verdi (408) 266-5108. **Directions**: If coming from Hwy 85, go south on Camden Ave. just past Blossom Hill Rd. Singletree Way is the next left turn-off near Beacon School. Park on the street, we will meet at the trail entrance located on the right just beyond the power plant. **Notes**: We will bird ponds that are often filled with a wide variety of waterfowl and Gulls, a nearby creek for riparian birds, as well as other areas closely related habitats. **RC**

Sunday Jan. 22, 8:00 AM Lake Cunningham Park

Half day. **Leader**: Janna Pauser (408) 569-9264. **Directions:** From Hwy 101 in San Jose, go Northeast on Tully Rd. to the park entrance located on the left just past Capital Expwy. Turn left at the entrance kiosk and park in the Marina parking lot. *LO*, *RC*

Saturday Jan. 28, 8:00 AM Alum Rock Park

Half day. **Leader**: Jim Johnson (408) 996--3506. **Directions:** From Hwy 101 or I-680 take McKee Rd. northeast toward the hills then left on Toyon Ave., right on Penitencia Creek Rd. and continue on into the park. Pass under the bridge and meet at the far end of the upper parking lot. This is a moderately strenuous 3-4 mile walk. **Notes:** Resident breeding birds (possible Rufous-Crowned Sparrow, and Canyon Wren if we are lucky) early migrants, and lingering winter birds. Be prepared for some mud! **LO, RC**

Sunday Jan. 29, 8:30 AM Coyote Reservoir

Half Day. **Leader**: Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. See details and directions from Jan. 11th. *LO*, *RC*

Wednesday Feb. 1, 12:00 PM City of Sunnyvale Landfill

One hour. **Leaders**: Freddy Howell, Allen Royer and/or Elaine Gould. Contact organizer Silviana Ruiz (408) 730-7545 to attend. See details from Jan. 4th.

Field Trips continued

Saturday Feb. 4, 8:00 AM Foster City and Coyote Point, San Mateo County Bayside

Half day plus. **Leader**: Al Eisner (days and voicemail: (650) 926-2018; evenings: (650) 364-3686). **Directions:** Meet at Sea Cloud Park in Foster City. Take Hillsdale Blvd. toward the Bay from highway 101. Turn right at Edgewater Dr. Continue several stop signs past the shopping center to Pitcairn Dr. and turn left. (There is a sign for "Sea Cloud Park" at that intersection.) Take Pitcairn until you just reach the park, turn right on Sea Cloud Dr., and proceed to the end of the parking area. We will later caravan to another Foster City location and to Coyote Point (likely admission charge). Notes: This trip should be good for shorebirds (including rock-birds) and waterfowl (possible Harlequin Duck and Eurasian Wigeon, no guarantees!), but we will also look for landbirds. RC

Sunday Feb. 5, 8:00 AM Shoreline Lake and Environs

Half day. **Leader**: Frank Vanslager (650) 961-1505. **Directions**: From Hwy 101 take Shoreline Blvd. and proceed north to its end (on past the golf course). Meet in the parking lot near the boathouse. **Notes**: Expected species include ducks, gulls, some shorebirds, and a few riparian birds. **Difficulty Level**: A moderately long, but level, loop trip. *RC*

Wednesday Feb. 8, 1:00 PM Coyote Valley

Half day. **Leader**: Don Starks (408) 266-2969. **NOTE**: This is an AFTERNOON field trip to catch raptors at their best! **Directions:** Take 101 S., exit right (west) onto Bailey Rd. (exit 373); turn left on Hale/Santa Teresa Blvd., in .8 mile, turn right on Laguna Ave. Meet leader .1 mile down Laguna Ave. *RC*

Saturday Feb. 11, 9:00 AM Pescadero Marsh and Vicinity

Half day. **Leader**: Sue James (650) 348-0315. **Directions:** Meet at first parking lot south of the bridge over Pescadero Creek on Hwy 1. **Notes:** Shorebirds, gulls, grebes, and ducks possible. Don't forget to bring that spotting scope. *RC*

Sunday Feb. 12, 8:30 AM Merced & San Luis Wildlife Refuges

Full day. Leader: Rich Page (408) 377-1092. **Directions:** Meet at the parking area near the first Observation Platform in Merced National Wildlife Refuge. From Hwy 101 in Gilroy take Hwy 152 east thru Los Banos (no services past Los Banos, so check your gas gauge), approx. 20 miles then north 7 miles on Rte. 59 to Sandy Mush Rd., turn left approx. 8 miles to Merced Wildlife Refuge, on the left. Allow 2.5 hrs driving time from San Jose, more if it's foggy. Notes: Raptors, ducks, geese, Great Horned Owls, Sandhill Cranes and Whitefaced Ibis possible. This will primarily be a driving bird trip so FRS radios (Walkie-Talkies) set to channel 11 will prove to be of value. After the Merced Wildlife Refuge we will caravan to the San Luis Wildlife Refuge for lunch and more birding. Dress in layers; bring lunch, liquids, and a full tank of gas. RC

Saturday Feb. 18, 8:00 AM Oka Ponds

Half Day. **Leader**: Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. **Directions:** From Hwy 17 in Los Gatos take Lark Ave exit West. Turn right on Oka Rd., left on Mozart Ave and an immediate right on Oka Ln. Meet at the gate at the end of the lane. *RC*

Sunday Feb. 19, 8:00 AM Alum Rock Park

Half day. **Leader**: Jim Johnson (408) 996-3506. For directions and information see the write-up for Jan 28th. *LO,RC*

Sunday Feb 26, 7:30 AM Santa Cruz Coastal Hot Spots

Half Day (optional plus). Leader: Todd Newberry, Santa Cruz Bird Club (831) 426-8741. A chance to visit local birding hotspots and to chase recently reported goodies. Directions: Meet 7:30 AM at the Santa Cruz lighthouse on W. Cliff Dr. From Hwy 17 take Hwy 1 "north" (toward Half Moon Bay), turn left on Bay St. (just after McDonald's), go to its end, turn right onto W. Cliff Dr., follow bluff-top to lighthouse. Notes: Dress in layers; Todd's trip goes rain or shine. For those running late, at 8 AM we will be on West Cliff Dr., checking inter-tidal shelves as we approach the Natural Bridges overlook at the west end of West Cliff Dr.

Saturday Mar. 3, 8:00 AM Blue Oaks Ranch Preserve

Half day. Leader: Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. Directions: We will meet at the Washburn trail entrance to Joseph D. Grant County Park. If coming from Alum Rock Ave. take Hwy 130, Mt Hamilton Rd., drive approx. 6.7 miles and look for two gates on your left, and an old decrepit barn off in a field nearby. Turn left into the second of the two gates, painted yellow with yellow fence and fence posts. If coming up Quimby Rd. turn left on Mt Hamilton Rd. and drive approx. 0.8 miles to the two gates on your right. Notes: This trip will be limited to 12 participants in three cars, a waiver of responsibility and assumption of risk form must be signed at the beginning of the trip and carpooling is required. Please call leader to reserve a space. RC


Sunday Mar 4, 9:00 AM Stanford Campus

Half day. **Leader**: Dick Stovel (650) 856-6105. **Directions**: From Hwy 101 in Palo Alto take University Ave. exit west through downtown and into Stanford campus (University Ave. becomes Palm Dr.). Meet at the end of Palm Dr. at entrance to Main Quad. **Notes**: Local breeding birds and early returning migrants should be active. **Difficulty Level**: This field trip is highly recommended for beginning birders. *RC*

Leader: Bob Hirt (408) 821-2732. A weekend trip to a remote but beautiful corner of northeast California to see Greater Sage Grouse on their booming grounds. We often see Sage Sparrow and Thrasher plus Pronghorn near the "lek." Other expected sightings include eagles, hawks, geese, ducks, cranes, woodpeckers and other mountain specialties such as Townsend's Solitaire, Cassin's Finch, Mountain Bluebird and Chickadee, Juniper Titmouse, Black-billed Magpie and Pinyon Jay. Trip limited to 20 participants; please call leader for further details and to reserve a space.

Each year, our volunteer ranks continue to grow with dedicated and passionate people who share a love for birds, the environment and our community.

Of course, we are always eager to welcome *new* volunteers to this amazing group so we can continue to grow the important programs you, our members, have said matter to you. As you start thinking about your plans for the coming year, don't forget to think about how you just might be the perfect fit for our organizational needs in 2012. With opportunities to work with children, help coordinate events, restore songbird populations - and so much more! - there's something for everyone.

<u>Cavity Nest Box Monitor</u> – You can help save cavity nesting birds of Santa Clara Valley from population decline. Now more than ever your help is crucial to this effort. Increasing habitat loss and degradation has left native cavity nesters, such as Western Bluebirds, Chestnut-backed Chickadees and Barn Owls, without natural cavities in which to raise their young. Fortunately, our team of dedicated nest box volunteers is bringing these populations back. As a nest box monitor, you can help families of these and other cavity nesters make their homes and raise their young. You may install nest boxes yourself or monitor pre-installed boxes. Monitoring involves consistent, weekly visits to boxes during the breeding season to record their use and can be personally rewarding. A minimum of a one-season commitment is required. No experience is necessary, as we will provide training materials and guidance. See the Cavity Nesters Recovery Program information on page 11 for details on information and training sessions. For more information call (408) 252-3740.

Wetlands Discovery Program Docent – This program shares the wonder and importance of wetland habitats with 3rd through 6th grade children throughout Santa Clara County during the spring and fall. Volunteers guide students in exploring wetland wildlife and habitat both in the classroom and out in the field. This program is rewarding for both volunteers and the many South Bay children who participate each year .We have a fabulous cadre of experienced docents but definitely need more. No experience is necessary as we will provide training for both field and class sessions. All a potential docent needs is a love of nature and a desire to share it with children. Some availability on weekday mornings will be important.

Conservation Corner

The Burrowing Owls of Shoreline at Mountain View

In Fall and Winter 2009, Santa Clara Valley Audubon Society embarked on an advocacy campaign on behalf of burrowing owls in the City of Mountain View. At the time, both the City and Google Inc. were planning new playing field complexes on the edges of Shoreline Park. We asked the City to ensure not only that the Burrowing Owls of Shoreline should not be harmed by these projects, but also that the City does all it can to improve habitat for the owls and help the population persist and grow. Our advocacy efforts evolved into a productive partnership. The City of Mountain View made a commitment to the welfare of the owls in a comprehensive effort that engaged City Council and staff, SCVAS staff and volunteers, owl biologists, and many many friends. We are making progress, working together to resolve complex issues in innovative ways with the hope that burrowing owls will again thrive at Shoreline and beyond.

The City of Mountain View engaged burrowing owl expert Dr. Lynne Trulio to prepare a "Burrowing Owl Preservation Plan" (coined "Preservation Plan" instead of "Management Plan" by Councilwoman Ronit Bryant). The plan has not been approved yet, but the City (Public Works, Shoreline staff) has already started to implement some of its recommendations in an effort to improve habitat prior to the 2012 nesting season. To compensate for the loss of foraging grounds to playing fields, the city created new habitat on acres of Shoreline Golf Course (where ponds were dewatered to discourage nuisance birds such as coots and Canada geese). California natives were hydro-seeded, and dozens of students from San Jose State University volunteered to augment the seedlings with hundreds of native perennials, taking part in a Together Green conservation project. Plants were selected to provide food and shelter to prey species over the entire year. Brush and rock piles were also constructed to provide shelter and habitat for prey species. Artificial burrows were placed at strategic places to attract burrowing owls as well as California ground squirrels.

In 2011, three pairs of burrowing owls raised 10 chicks at Shoreline. This was the first time in Shoreline at Mountain View's recorded history that every pair of nesting Burrowing Owls has produced chicks in a single season. This success was celebrated on the City's website. Every one of Mountain View City Council members has visited the park to see the owls and the habitat creation efforts. California assemblyman Paul Fong also visited the owls. The local Mountain View Voice published stories about the burrowing owls of Shoreline and the efforts to save them, as did the Wall Street Journal. Shoreline's Lakeside Café is selling a

burrowing owl cookie, and donating some of the proceeds for burrowing owl conservation.

Awareness of the plight of the burrowing owl is increasing, and we continue to do all we can to harness all this interest and good will in our efforts to engage more communities, protect and enhance habitat in Santa Clara County, and influence state policy.

Raptors of Northern California with Bob Power

Field Notes

(October-November 2011)

Geese through Storm-Petrels

Four Greater White-fronted Geese at the Coyote Creek Field Station (CCFS) pond on 1 Oct (MDo et al.) and five to six birds at the Sunnyvale Water Pollution Control Plant (WPCP) 8 & 16 Oct (PDu, AME) were fall migrants. A Snow Goose found at Shoreline Lake on 30 Nov (DWe) was the first of the season. The first Eurasian Wigeon was one along Adobe Creek in the Palo Alto FCB on 24 Sep (PDu). Singles were on Pond A1 in Mountain View on 29 Oct (DWe), Pond A9 in Alviso on 30 Oct (MMR, RGJ, MJM), the Sunnyvale WPCP on 10 Nov (DWe), and Anderson Reservoir on 19 Nov (AMcD). Three female Blue-winged Teal were seen on the Guadalupe River below Trimble on 4 and 7 Oct (SCR). Five males and a female were at the South County Regional WasteWater Authority (SCRWA) treatment ponds in Gilroy on 12 Oct (WGB) and 29 Nov (RWR, FV). Two males were seen in the Lockheed Martin marshes on 10 Nov (FV) and singles were in Mallard Slough in Alviso on 21 Nov (SCT) and the Mountain View Forebay on 27 Nov (GZ). Two male and two female Redhead were found at the SCRWA treatment ponds on 12 Oct (WGB). A count of 581 birds on the Alviso ponds on 30 Oct (MMR, RGJ, MJM) was amazing and a high count for the county. A male Common X Barrow's Goldeneye reappeared at the Los Capitancillos percolation ponds on 23 Nov for its 6th winter (AV). The first male Barrow's Goldeneye was seen at Shoreline Lake on 23 Nov (SCT) and was there through the end of the month. An immature Red-throated Loon was seen on Shoreline Lake on 29 Nov (fide eBird) and was found the next day on Pond A1 (DWe, PDu). Less expected, a Pacific Loon was on the lake on 23 Nov (fide eBird) and remained through the end of the month (but died in early December). A Common Loon was seen irregularly at the Ogier Avenue ponds 18-25 Nov (RPh, v.ob.). The big surprise of the period was the first county record of a Yellow-billed Loon at Pond A4 in Sunnyvale. The mostly alternate loon was found on 25 Oct (PDu) and was well seen and photographed through 4 Nov when it was found dead (DWe). Almost as amazing as the Yellow-billed Loon was an Ashy Storm-Petrel seen over the Stanford stadium during a night game on 1 Oct (MMR, ARo). This is the second county record.

Bitterns through Hummingbirds

An **American Bittern** in the Lockheed Martin marshes on 10 Nov (MMR) was the only wintering bird found. A **Cattle Egret** seen

in Vasona CP on 19 Nov (AWa *fide* JPa) was apparently a one-day wonder. They are rarer now than a decade ago. The only **White-faced Ibis** found during the period was one in the Sunnyvale WPCP on 6 Nov (DWe). An adult **Ferruginous Hawk** apparently has returned to the Coyote Valley with the first observation on 14 Oct (RPh et al.). It has been seen more or less regularly through the end of the period (v.ob.). Single **Prairie Falcons** were seen in the Coyote Valley on 19 Nov (DWe) and at the Sierra Road summit on 22 Nov (MMR, v.ob.). Ten **Sandhill Cranes** were seen over Halls Valley on 7 Oct (OH). The **Snowy Plover** roost on the playa

east of the Alviso Marina CP may have peaked on 2 Oct with a count of 118 (MMR, RGJ). This winter concentration was found farther out in the ponds on 30 Oct when 123 were tallied on Ponds A13 and A15 (MMR, RGJ, MJM). This may well be an all-time high count for Santa Clara County. A Solitary Sandpiper at the Ogier Avenue ponds on 5 Oct (PDu) was a late fall migrant and the first October record for the county. Lesser Yellowlegs continued at the CCFS waterbird pond with at least two there through 7 Oct (MDo, SCR) and one seen there on 16 Oct (MMR). Two late migrants were at the SCRWA treatment ponds in Gilroy on 11 Oct (WGB). Three birds found near the Alviso Marina CP on 30 Oct (MMR, RGJ, MJM) may be attempting to winter. Eighteen Sanderlings on Pond A13 in Alviso on 30 Oct (MMR, RGJ, MJM) may be a harbinger of winter when we often find good numbers of this coastal sandpiper in our former salt ponds. **Pectoral Sandpipers** showed up late, after being missed in September. Two to seven bird were seen on the CCFS waterbird pond 7-20 Oct (SCR, v.ob.) with the high count on 20 Oct (RWR, FV). Thirteen **Elegant Terns** on a closed refuge pond on 2 Oct (MMR, RGJ) appeared to be the end of their fall incursion, but one lingered over the Alviso ponds to at least 30 Oct (MMR, RGJ, MJM). In some years they remain well into November. The fall passage of Vaux's Swifts extended into the first week of October as in most years with birds found widely. The last date was at the Sunnyvale Baylands on 7 Oct

(m.ob.), the maximum count being of 30 birds (WGB). In a Morgan Hill yard, a late female **Black-chinned Hummingbird** was seen on 4 Oct (SCR). The female **Costa's Hummingbird** seen there in September has continued to come to the feeders through at least 10 Nov (SCR). The last **Selasphorus** hummingbird there was a female on 4 Oct (SCR).

Woodpeckers through Warblers

Reports of Lewis's Woodpeckers from the San Antonio Valley included one or more birds on 22 Oct (SLo et al.) and six on 25 Nov (JTh, SCT). A Red-naped Sapsucker was found at Rancho Canada del Oro OSA on 9 Nov (JPa). The Willow Flycatcher passage trailed off in October with four more records, the last of one banded at CCFS on 12 Oct (fide MMR). A Least Flycatcher was found along Coyote Creek below Hwy 237 on 7 Oct (SCR), different from the bird banded there in September. A Hammond's Flycatcher was seen along Stevens Creek above Crittenden Lane on 24 Oct (BHi, TGr, PLD), they are found in fall in about one year in three. A Plumbeous Vireo was found at the Ogier Avenue ponds on 6 Oct (SCR), all of our six records are from the fall. A female/immature Purple Martin over the Ogier Avenue Ponds on 2 Oct (SCR) appears to be the latest record of a fall migrant for the county. Single Blue-gray Gnatcatchers at Lake Cunningham on 16 Oct (JPa), the IBM Almaden Research Center on 25-27 Nov (JPa), Calero Creek Trail on 27 Nov (JPa), and Coyote Creek below Hwy 237 on 27 Nov (MMR) all may be attempting to winter. An American Dipper in Los Gatos Creek above Los Gatos on 2 Oct (JPa) was in an area where they are resident. Two Red-throated Pipits were found this fall, the 5th and 6th records for the county. The first was found with American Pipits in a large flock on 1 Nov (MMR, DFi et al.) and seen by many through 7 Nov (v.ob.). The second was with American Pipits in the San Jose-Santa Clara WPCP drying ponds on 26 Nov (SCR). It was a good fall for Phainopepla with singles above Smiths Creek on 15-16 Oct (JTh, SCT), San Antonio Valley on 25 Nov (JTh, SCT) and at the end of Marsh Road on 29 Nov (DWe). One to two birds were seen on the Blue Oak Ranch Reserve in Halls Valley 11-22 Nov (ER, et al.). Single Northern Waterthrushes were found at the Charleston Road marsh on 1 Oct (SCT) and 4 Nov (GHa) and along nearby Stevens Creek on 3 Oct (RGJ) and 31 Oct (DMo). These are likely the same bird and it is once again wintering in these locations. An adult male Black-and-White Warbler was seen at the Sunnyvale Baylands Park on 6 and 7 Oct (PKe, RKe, FV, m.ob.). A Nashville Warbler was again found at the Sunnyvale Baylands Park on 7 Oct (BHi) and seen the next day as well (v.ob.). Another was along Stevens Creek above Crittenden Lane on 21 Oct (MMR). A

female/immature MacGillivray's Warbler was found along Coyote Creek below Hwy 237 on 7 Oct (SCR) and is likely the same bird banded at CCFS on 28 Sep (fide MMR). An immature female Blackburnian Warbler on Fulton Street in Palo Alto was a great find on 25 Nov (PJM). It was refound on both 26 Nov (SCR, v.ob.) in nearby Rinconada Park and again on 27 Nov (MJM, m.ob.) back along Fulton. An immature Chestnut-sided Warbler was seen at the Sunnyvale Baylands Park 6-7 Oct (PKe, RKe, FV, m.ob.). The second Blackpoll Warbler of the fall was one found at the Ogier Avenue ponds on 2 Oct (SCR). Palm Warblers have been found at the Sunnyvale Baylands Park on 5 Oct (RKe, PKe), at the edge of the Lockheed Martin marshes on 8 Nov (R&BMcD), and along Coyote Creek below Hwy 237 26-27 Nov (SCR, MMR). Hermit Warblers are rarely seen as fall migrants, so one at the Sunnyvale Baylands Park on 7 Oct (DWe) was unusual. A Yellow-breasted Chat was banded at CCFS on 11 Sep (fide MMR), most of our fall records are of banded birds.

Sparrows through Goldfinches

This has been an amazing fall for Clay-colored Sparrows, with seven passage birds. Beyond the one found in September, singles were at Alamden-QuicksilverCPon 3 Oct (JPa), the Sunnyvale WPCP on 4 Oct (JPa, DFi et al.), Moffett Field 14-17 Oct (MP, MMR), Vasona CP on 5 Nov (ER), the Guadalupe River Trail north of Blossom Hill Road on 6 Nov (JPa), and at the edge of the Lockheed Martin marshes on 10 Nov (PDu, MMR). Only a single Brewer's Sparrow was seen, an individual along Stevens Creek above Crittenden Lane on 27 Oct (ADeM fide MMR). Two more Vesper Sparrows were found to add to September's bird. The first was

at the Ogier Avenue ponds on 2 Oct (SCR) and the other was seen at the Sierra Road summit 19-21 Nov (SCR, JLu fide SCR). A Grasshopper Sparrow at the Ogier Avenue ponds on 2 Oct (SCR) and one near Santa Teresa CP on 23 Oct (JPa) may have been late migrants or birds attempting to winter. A Swamp Sparrow was found on Stevens Creek above Crittenden Lane on 31 Oct (DMo) and remained there until 4 Nov (v.ob.). Two birds, an adult and an immature, were at the Ogier Avenue ponds 20-22 Nov (MMR, v.ob.). A bird settling in for the winter was seen in the Palo Alto Baylands 23-25 Nov (SCT, v.ob.). Two White-throated Sparrows along the Guadalupe River below Trimble on 7 Oct (SCR) were the first of the season. Singles were found at the Stanford Dish on 16 Oct (PDu), Hidden Villa on 21 Oct (GHa), along the Los Alamitos Creek Trail on 21 Oct (JPa), Stevens Creek above Crittenden Lane on 21 Oct (SCT), and at the Sunnyvale WPCP 28-29 Dec (PKe, RKe, DWe). One bird was banded at CCFS on 30 Oct (fide MMR) and yard birds included one in the Almaden Valley after 7 Nov (JPa) and two in a Morgan Hill yard on 10 Nov (SCR). The juvenile Painted Bunting seen along Stevens Creek above Crittenden Lane at the end of September was refound on 14 Oct (MMR) and remained there through 9 Nov (m.ob.). A few Yellow-headed Blackbirds lingered at the Sunnyvale WPCP with one seen on 5 Oct (WGB) and two on 7 Oct (MMR). Two Pine Siskins were at a west San Jose feeder on 6 Nov (JTh) and two birds were seen at an east San Jose feeder on 13 and 21 Nov (MFu). One along Stevens Creek above Crittenden Lane 17 Oct (MMR, RGJ) was the only other encountered. Lawrence's Goldfinches included two at Monte Bello OSP on 15 Oct (GHa), five to six at Henry Coe SP on 23 Oct (GaH), and two in San Antonio Valley on 25 Nov (JTh, SCT).


