# **Diverse Teams Give the 2012 Birdathon a Great Start**

What do the Lean Mean Green Machine, the Fledgelings, the SnipeHunters, the Wrong Terns, and the UniversaListers have in common? These teams launched this year's Birdathon in grand style during the first week of April.

The Fledgelings, led by Pati Rouzer, hoped to see 30 species of birds going into the event. Maya Zolotar reported "We saw 65 species in all, a lot more than we expected... we did see a rare female Barrow's Goldeneye and a Black Skimmer. And we saw a surprise Bald Eagle! I also got to release a Hermit Thrush at the Coyote Creek Banding Station, which was amazing."

The Lean Mean Green Machine, under the guidance of Rob Furrow, was our only true green entry with all seven participants bicycling along the bay to tally their astounding 104 species of birds in just 4 hours. "It was a spectacular day, and it was incredibly birdy along our route. By far the hardest part of the day was choosing when to stop, and forcing ourselves onward even when there were so many birds around," commented Captain Furrow.

The Wrong Terns membership comes from our Education Committee and they delivered a respectable tally of 83 species including skydancing Red-tails and nesting Cooper's Hawks."We didn't actually get lost this year, although we did forget where we parked once or twice," reported Toby Goldberg.

The UniversaListers, along with the Fledgelings and the Lean Means, are new to the Birdathon this year. Led by Jim Thomas, the four new birdathoners brought in a most excellent 92 species in four hours of birding. Special mention goes to 12-year-old Andrew Tey who without binoculars was first to see and ID many of the birds.

Laurie West-Roberts' Snipe Hunters have been together for a decade or more, which goes to show that Birdathons get in your system. The only true big day team so far in the Birdathon season, Laurie's team identified 135 species of birds between 6:30AM

> and 7PM. The highlight for many was the hundred or so White-throated Swifts foraging at eye-level at Lake Cunningham; or the Snipe Hunters' traditional gourmet lunch.

> These five teams and the 19 teams that were still scouting and prepping when we went to press are raising funds for the SCVAS education and conservation programs, and we thank them all for this tremendous effort.

One hour. **Leaders**: Freddy Howell, Allen Royer and/or Elaine Gould. Contact organizer Silviana Ruiz (408) 730-7545 to attend. **Directions**: Donald M. Somers Water Pollution Control Plant, junction of Borregas and Caribbean. Meet at Trailhead at north end. **Difficulty Level**: Birding geared toward beginners. **Notes**: Bring binoculars; loaners also available. *RC* 

#### Saturday May 5, 8:30 AM

Mines Rd., Del Puerto Canyon & vicinity Full day. Leader: Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. Directions: We'll start this trip in Del Puerto Canyon, working our way west to San Antonio Valley. From I-580 go east over Altamont Pass, to I-5, south on I-5, west at the Patterson exit (Diablo Grande Pkwy) and then right on Del Puerto Canyon Rd. Meet at the first pullout. Highlights: Hoped for highlights include possible Costa's Hummingbird, Phainopepla, Lewis's Woodpecker and Lawrence's Goldfinch. Notes: Bring a full tank of gas, lunch and liquids.

Half day. Leader: Janna Pauser (408) 569-9264 or jannana@pacbell.net. Directions: From Hwy 85 take Almaden Expwy southeast to Harry Rd; go right 1 block, then left on McKean. Take McKean 6+miles, past Calero Reservoir, and turn right on Casa Loma Rd. Meet at parking lot at end of road, about 2 miles. Highlights: Hoped for species include Black-headed Grosbeak, Western Wood-Pewee, Purple Finch, possible Lazuli Bunting. Notes: Bring water. LO

#### Wednesday May 9, 8:30 AM Rancho Canada del Oro O.S.P.

Half day. **Leader**: Janna Pauser (408) 569-9264. **Directions**: Take Hwy 85 exit Almaden Expwy. Follow Almaden to end; turn right on Harry; 1 block, then left on McKean. Take McKean 6+ miles past Calero Reservoir, turn right on Casa Loma Rd. Meet at parking lot at end of

road (2 miles). **Highlights**: Birds of oak woodland and riparian habitats. **Difficulty Level**: We'll bird along a quiet road, easy walking. **Notes**: Bring water. *LO* 

#### Saturday May 12, 8:00 AM Alum Rock Park

Half day. **Leader**: Jim Johnson (408) 996-3506. **Directions**: From Hwy 101 or I-680 take McKee Rd. northeast toward the hills then left on Toyon Ave., right on Penitencia Creek Rd. and continue on into the park. Pass under the bridge and meet at the far end of the upper parking lot. **Difficulty Level**: This is a moderately strenuous 3-4 mile walk. *LO*

After approximately 6.4 miles turn right into the Sprig Lake parking lot. **Difficulty Level**: This half-day birding walk, climbing on the way out and descending on the return trip, begins in mixed oak woodlands but in short order passes through grasslands, chaparral and, finally, coastal forest where Redwood and Douglas Fir dominate the landscape. **Notes**: Be sure to bring liquids. **LO**

Half day. **Leader**: Rich Page (408) 377-1092. **Directions**: From I-280 take Page Mill Rd. west; turn right on Arastradero Rd. and meet in the parking lot about a half-mile on the right. **Difficulty Level**: Trip involves moderately strenuous hiking. *RC* 

#### Sunday May 20, 8:00 AM Russian Ridge Open Space Preserve

Half day. **Leader**: Frank Vanslager (650) 961-1505. **Directions**: Meet at the Vista Point Pullout located on the Bay side of Skyline Blvd. (Hwy. 35) a little over a mile northwest of Page Mill Rd. **Notes**: Bring extra layers of clothing in case it's foggy and cold. **Highlights**: Possible Grasshopper Sparrow and Lazuli Bunting. *NF* 

#### Saturday May 26, 8:00 AM Monte Bello Open Space Preserve

Half day. **Leader**: Kirsten Holmquist (408) 747-0988. **Directions**: From I-280 in Palo Alto take Page Mill Rd. west, toward Skyline Blvd. (Hwy. 35), for approx. 7 miles and meet at the Monte Bello OSP parking area on the left. **Highlights**: Possible Lazuli Bunting, Black-throated Gray Warbler, Chipping and Grasshopper Sparrows. **Notes**: Be prepared, it can be cold, wet and foggy. *LO* 

#### Sunday May 27, 8:00 AM Skyline Ridge Open Space Preserve

Half day. Leader: Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. Directions: Meet at the northeast corner of Skyline Blvd. (Hwy. 35) and Page Mill Rd. (the corner nearest San Francisco and the bay). *IMPORTANT*: Do not park in the Russian Ridge Parking Lot! Difficulty Level: This is a moderately strenuous walk with some elevation change. Highlights: possible Black-throated Gray Warbler, Western Tanager. Notes: Bring extra layers of clothing as temperatures can vary wildly even at this time of year. *LO*

Highlights: A top riparian birding spot in the South Bay for migrants and local breeding birds. Notes: Entrance fee required. LO, RC

Half day plus. Leader: Rich Page (408) 377-1092. **Directions**: Take Highway 17 to Santa Cruz, and then go north on Highway 1. Meet at the beach parking area alongside Highway 1 just north of the Waddell Creek Bridge (at MP 36.30; which is 2 miles south of Ano Nuevo State Reserve and seven miles north of Davenport). Difficulty **Level**: This is a long but fairly level hike (app. 5 miles) along the Skyline-to-the-Sea Trail. **Highlights**: Looking for Swainson's Thrush, Winter Wren, Wilson's Warbler, and woodpeckers. Notes: Be prepared to carry lunch and liquids (in a backpack if possible) and dress in layers.



# **Conservation Corner**

Google's crossings over Stevens Creek - one bridge at a time. Advocacy and outreach efforts by SCVAS and several other environmental organizations were successful in motivating Google to scale down its plan to build too many bridges over Stevens Creek. Initially, Google proposed to build two vehicle bridges and one pedestrian/bicycle bridge to connect the Bayshore area to the company's new campus development in Moffett Field. We opposed the development of a vehicular bridge on Crittenden Lane, based on a consensus among Environmental groups that such a bridge would irreversibly damage important buffer lands and threaten sensitive riparian ecosystems and wetlands and the many avian species that rely on these resources. Google is expected to restart its environmental review process for a scaled down project: crossing Stevens Creek at Charleston Road with one vehicular bridge and a bicycle/pedestrian bridge.

SCVAS invested time and effort working to reduce the scope of the proposed bridges project. We provided comments that highlighted the inadequacy of Google's California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) review. We coordinated and collaborated with other organizations (Citizens Committee to Complete the Refuge, Committee for Green Foothills, Sierra Club, Native Plant Society) and government agencies, and engaged in direct advocacy with City of Mountain View City Council and staff.

Eliminating the proposed bridge at Crittenden allows for better transition from urban to natural landscapes and better protection of wildlife, nature and sense of place. We will continue following up on the plan and environmental review for the proposed Charleston Bridges. We see an opportunity to continue working with other environmental organizations, with the City of Mountain View, and with Google, to allow humans and nature to thrive along the bay.

Burrowing Owl Preservation Plan at Shoreline is moving forward. We thank City staff for their hard work and commitment to the conservation of burrowing owls, and thank City of Mountain View council members Laura Macias, Ronit Bryant, Jac Siegel, Magaret Abe Koga and mayor Mike Kasperzak for their leadership. McClellan Ranch Park is now McClellan Ranch Preserve, and it is McClellan Ranch west across Stevens Creek. We thank the Cupertino City Council for adopting these names and for moving forward with a master plan for both properties. McClellan Ranch serves hundreds of children and youth who come here to observe nature. The children and adults enjoy the synergy of a nature preserve, footpaths and a trail, the 4H farm and animals, the community garden - and the birds thrive here too. We owe a special thank you to longtime advocate Deborah Jamison. Her commitment and tenacity continue to protect and promote the Stevens Creek Corridor in the City of Cupertino.

# The Breeding Birds of the Mono Basin with Bob Power

The east slope of the Sierra offers a spectacular array of breeding birds, from Black-backed Woodpeckers and MacGillivray's Warblers to Osprey and Green-tailed Towhees. With a six-day trip, we're able to explore a number of unique habitats including the alpine zone surrounding Saddlebag Lake, the high desert sage grasslands of the historic ghost town of Bodie, the extraordinary tufa formations of Mono Lake and the ancient Bristlecone Pines of the White Mountains. We typically see 100+ species of birds during this workshop, few are species available to study in the south bay, and all are stunning.

Dates: Tue. 7/17 through Sun. 7/22.

**Location:** We meet at 1:00PM Tuesday, at Mono Lake County Park, and then meet at 7:00AM at the Lakeview Lodge on following mornings; 6:00AM on Saturday. Transportation, lodging, and meals are the responsibility of each participant. Rooms may be reserved at the Lakeview Lodge in Lee Vining but there are many other options including great camping in Lee Vining and Lundy Canyons.

**Fee:** \$150 members; \$175 non-members.

Class size is limited to 11. We organize carpools each morning on location. We will have a maximum of three vehicles for our field trips. Please do not sign up for this workshop if you're not prepared to carpool around the Mono Basin and down to the White Mountains and back. Carpooling expenses are shared by the participants and are not part of the base fee; typically \$5/person/day.



# Field Notes

(May 2012-June 2012)

#### **Geese through Loons**

The number of Greater Whitefronted Geese dropped quickly in February with one at the South County WasteWater Authority (SCRWA) Gilroy treatment ponds on 2 Feb (MJM, LCr), four to six near Bailey Avenue and Monterey Road 4-11 Feb (SCR), and seven at the Parkway Lakes on 12 Feb (AME). Snow Geese were found widely during the period but rarely for long periods. An immature was near Shoreline Lake 1-7 Feb (GZ, v.ob.), two birds were at the SCRWA ponds in Gilroy on 2 Feb (MJM, LCr), an adult was in Vasona CP 2-18 Feb (LSu, v.ob.), one was near Bailey Avenue and Monterey Road 4-11 Feb (SCR), one was in the New Chicago Marsh on 18 Feb (SCT), an immature was at Lake Cunningham (20-25) Feb (MJM, KBu), and an adult was in the Shoreline area 23-31 Mar (GZ, v.ob.). A single Ross's Goose at the SCRWA ponds in Gilroy on 2 Feb (MJM, LCr) remained from January's concentration. Similarly, an immature at Vasona CP 6-27 Feb (ER, WGB) probably was the same bird seen the month before. Six near Bailey Avenue and Monterey Road 4-11 Feb (SCR) appeared to be new. Three Tundra Swans at the SCRWA ponds in Gilroy on 2 Feb (MJM, LCr) did not linger. A Eurasian Wigeon was seen in the Palo Alto estuary on 10 Feb (MDo). A single bird was at the SCRWA ponds in Gilroy on 9 Mar (AME) and 21 Mar (JAC). A third bird was on Pond A9 in Alviso on 11 Mar (RFu). Two to five **Blue**winged Teal were in the SCRWA ponds in Gilroy 2-8 Feb (MJM, LCr, WGB), but not after that. Two to three males were in Artesian (Mallard) Slough 2-6 Feb (DWe, WGB). No more were found over the rest of the period until a male was found in the Lockheed Martin ponds on 29 Mar (RFu). The number of wintering **Redhead** drops quickly in most February's. Pond A18 in Alviso retained hundreds of birds through 6 Feb (DWe, WGB), but declined after that with the last seen on 19 Feb (v.ob.). Five birds were seen on Pond A10 on 23 Mar (MJM) and three to five were on Pond A2E through the end of the period (RFu). Amale Common X Barrow's Goldeneye, not seen since late November, was once again found on the Los Capitancillos percolation ponds on 10 Mar (AV). Where was it from December through February? The wintering male Barrow's Goldeneye was last seen at Shoreline Lake on 17 Feb (SZ). A female was seen on the lake as well 10-17 Feb (GZ, SZ). After that no Barrow's were found until 16 Mar when

a 1st-winter male showed up (WGB) and promptly disappeared. But then a female turned up on 17 Mar and remained there through the end of the period (JTh, m.ob.). A juvenile **Red-throated Loon** was found at Shoreline Lake on 6 Feb (MJM) and remained through 8 Feb (m.ob.). No other loons were seen during the period.

#### **Pelicans through Shorebirds**

This is the fourth winter in which **Brown Pelicans** have lingered in the South Bay over this period. Most notable was a count of 10 birds on ponds centered on Pond AB2 on 29 Mar (RFu). One or two birds have been seen occasionally during the period (v.ob.). The American Bittern wintering in the Mountain View Forebay was last seen on 17 Feb (SZ, v.ob.) and was the only one found during the period. A 1st-winter White-faced Ibis along Thompson Creek above Tully Road was reported four times during period, the latest being on 26 Mar (JPa et al.). There are at least three active Bald Eagle nests in the county this spring. Two adults were seen carrying nest material to the first nest on Coyote Reservoir on 4 Feb (RCP), one that had been used in past years. Birds were noted incubating by 21 Feb (JPa, v.ob.). A pair was first noted on the second nest on a tower west of Calaveras Reservoir on 26 Feb (DWe, v.ob.). The third nest is north of Casa de Fruta along Hwy 152. Incubation

seen on 9 Mar (DLSu). Elsewhere, birds were seen at six or seven different locations. Single Ferruginous Hawks were found at Joseph Grant CP on 6 Feb (MO'B, DRo) and north of Casa de Fruta on 16 Feb (DLSu). Birds remaining in Coyote Valley included an adult there on 25 Feb (MDo et al.), an immature on 1 Mar (MJM), and a late bird over Tulare Hill on 23 Mar (CE). A Prairie Falcon in San Antonio Valley on 25 Feb (PDu) may have been a local bird, wintering birds on the valley floor were not found after the third week in January. Snowy Plovers apparently wintered on Pond A13 in Alviso with 75 counted on 23 Mar (MJM). A Lesser Yellowlegs was seen in New Chicago Marsh on 19 Feb (MDo, KDo) and two were on Pond A13 on 23 Mar (MJM). Sanderlings continued on the Alviso ponds with 15 seen on 11 Mar (RFu) and 16 there on 23 Mar (MJM). This winter's **Ruff** was seen twice more in February in Crittenden Marsh, once on 18 Feb (SCT) and

then on 22 Feb (DWe).

A 2nd-cycle Slaty-backed Gull was found in Pond A16 in Alviso on 11 Feb and was seen again on 18 Feb (SCR, v.ob.). Pond A16 was the metropolis for Glaucous Gulls in February with one to four 1st-cycle birds seen over the month (m.ob.). Two 2nd-cycle birds were seen on 11 and 19 Feb (SCR, DWe) and a 3rd-cycle was there on 4-5 Feb (SCR, v.ob.). Single 1st-cycle birds were on the Ogier Avenue ponds on 8 Feb (PDu) and 3 Mar (SCR). Missing since the end of January, five to six Black **Skimmers** showed up again at Charleston Slough 24-30 Mar (JTh, v.ob.). A Greater Roadrunner was found again northeast of Hellyer Avenue on 8 Feb (WGB). A

second bird was along Coyote Ridge on 25 Feb (CE). One seen near San Felipe and Silver roads on 28 Feb (RWR) is likely a third bird. A wintering female Costa's **Hummingbird** was seen once more on 3 Mar at Morgan Hill feeders (SCR). The first migrant Rufous Hummingbird was at those same feeders the same day (SCR). One was at an Almaden Valley feeder 5-25 Mar. Two at Ed Levin CP on 22 Mar (WGB, DWe) were likely different birds. One was also seen in Santa Teresa CP on 27 Mar (PDu). The only report of Lewis's Woodpeckers were two in San Antonio Valley at the YZ Ranch on 2 Mar (WGB). A **Pileated Woodpecker** was seen west of Coyote Reservoir on 24 Mar (DRo et al.). We have three records for the Diablo Range and four for the valley floor, most are in spring. The Pacific-slope Flycatcher found in December remained along Alamitos Creek through at least 19 Feb (JPa). This is about the eighth winter record we have had in the last 30 or so years. The Lake Cunningham Eastern Phoebe found in January remained there at least through 25 Feb (CDL). A **Plumbeous Vireo** was seen along Coyote Creek near Sycamore Drive on 29 Mar (WGB) and continued into April (RWR). This is our 7th county record and the 1st for spring. A Cassin's Vireo was found at Stanford on 21 Feb (RCa), only our 3rd winter record. A pair of American Dippers in the Stevens Creek Canyon above Mt. Eden Road was seen through most of the period. Another pair in the canyon, a few miles above Redwood Gulch Road was found on 12 Feb (RFu). A pair in Los Gatos Creek above Main Street in Los Gatos was observed 27-30 Mar (JKJ, LSu). A male Mountain Bluebird was found along the Coyote Creek Trail below Hwy 237 on 3 Feb (PDu) and provided a treat for many birders. Adding to the treat,

a second Mountain Bluebird joined the first on 7 Feb (CY). Both remained through 17 Feb (DWe), and a single bird through 20 Feb (CDL). It's been a banner winter for **Phainopepla**, but not in the interior of the Diablo Range. The male found at the end of Marsh Road in early December was seen at least through 26 Feb (DWe). Surprisingly, a female turned up there on 29-30 Mar (AME, MO'B). In Joseph Grant CP a female was seen on 19-21 Feb (P&JO'B, GaH). A pair was discovered on Roop Road on 9 Mar (MJM, LCr) and have remained at least through 14 Mar (v.ob.). Lastly, another female turned up on the west side of the valley on 15 Mar (PDu) in the yetto-be-opened Coyote Valley OSP.

#### Warblers through Goldfinches

Single Northern Waterthrushes continued in the Charleston Road marsh, with one seen on 25 Feb (MJM, LCr), one heard on 17 Mar (WGB), and observations on 27 Mar (FT) and 29 Mar (RFu). The female-type American Redstart found in January remained until 20 Feb (MJM, v.ob.). Hermit Warblers appear to be on the move early with a singing male along Coyote Creek below Silicon Valley Boulelvards 28-29 Mar (PDu), a male along Coyote Creek near Sycamore Drive on 31 Mar (DWe), and one in Alum Rock Park on that day as well (MDo, AS et al.). The Jeffrey Fontana Park wintering flock of Chipping **Sparrows** has continued through at least 21 Mar with high counts of seven birds on a number of occasions (v.ob.). Two singing Grasshopper Sparrows at Ed Levin CP on 22 Mar (AS) are first arrivals. About nine different White-throated Sparrows were found mostly in the flatlands during the period, plus at least four birds at feeders, many are continuing birds from earlier in the winter. The adult Harris's Sparrow is still coming to a Campbell feeder through the end of the period (LMy). Wintering Western Tanagers included a male along Coyote Creek at Sycamore Drive on 15 Feb (AS) and 29 Mar (WGB), two along San Francisquito Creek above El Camino on 17 Feb (PDu), a continuing bird at Vasona CP on 18 Feb (JPa) and 2 Mar (MO'N, MK), one in Edenvale Park on 27 Feb (JPa), and one at Ed Levin CP on 24 Mar (RWR, FV). At least 17 roosting Great-tailed Grackles continued at Lake Cunningham through 19 Feb (v.ob.). Then on 26 Mar at least 13 had returned to start nesting activities

(JPa et al.). A single bird was singing on the Ogier Avenue ponds on 4 Feb (SCR). Pine Siskins have been found widely, but in small numbers. Two were on Mt. Hamilton on 25 Feb (PDu), one was at Joseph Grant CP on 10 Mar (MDo et al.), two were at a feeder at Hidden Villa on 12 Mar (GHa), six to eight were in Almaden-Quicksilver CP on 22 Mar (JPa), at least one was at Santa Teresa CP on 27 Mar (PDu) and one at Belgatos Park on 30 Mar (JPa). Lawrence's Goldfinches have been scarce since the huge numbers found on the Mt. Hamilton CBC. Two females were on Seeboy Ridge east of Mt. Hamilton on 25 Feb (PDu), one was singing in a Morgan Hill yard on 4 Mar (SCR), and another was singing south of Pacheco Pass on 5 Mar (JB).



I like that I am helping birds and that there is a chance of seeing baby birds hatch and grow. My mom likes that we found so much support for my idea and so many people willing to help make it happen. I hope my story inspires someone to make a difference in their own community.
