Saturday Sept. 1, 8:15 AM Arastradero Preserve

Half day. Leader: Rich Page; (408) 377-1092. Directions: From I-280 take Page MillRd.westapprox.1/2 mile to Arastradero Rd. Turn right and meet at the parking lot located 1/2-mile on the right. Highlights: Woodland and grassland species as well as a good assortment of raptors are possible. Difficulty Level: Trip involves two plus miles of moderately strenuous walking. RC

Sunday Sept. 2, 8:00 AM **Ogier Ponds**

Half day. Leader: Kirsten Holmquist; (408) 747-0988. Directions: From Hwy 101 in Morgan Hill take Cochrane Rd. west to Monterey Hwy, turn right, go north 2.6 miles, turn right towards the Model Airplane Park (street is unnamed). Follow the road for 1/4 mile and park in the gravel lot at the first bend in road (meet at the gate if the entrance is locked). RC

Wednesday Sept. 5, 12:00 PM **City of Sunnyvale Landfill**

One hour. Leaders: Freddy Howell, Allen Royer and/or Elaine Gould. Contact organizer Silviana Ruiz (408) 730-7545 to attend. Directions: Donald M. Somers Water Pollution Control Plant, junction of Borregas and Caribbean. Meet at Trailhead at north end. Difficulty Level: Birding geared toward beginners. Notes: Bring binoculars; loaners also available. RC

Saturday Sept. 8, 8:00 AM

Almaden Lake Park and Alamitos Creek Half day. Leader: Frank Vanslager; (650) 961-1505. Directions: Meet at the bathrooms (blue building) near the east entrance to Almaden Lake Park. From Hwy 85 take Almaden Expwy south, turn left on Coleman Road and then right on Winfield Blvd. **Difficulty Level:** Expect about 3 miles of easy walking. Highlights: We will bird the lake and the trail upstream looking for waterfowl, raptors, and a wide variety of riparian birds. Notes: Entrance fee may be required, but parking is free on Winfield

Blvd. LO, RC



Sunday Sept. 9, 800 AM **Alum Rock Park**

Half day. Leader: Jim Johnson; (408) 996-3506. Directions: From Hwy 101 or I-680 take McKee Rd. northeast toward the hills then left on Toyon Ave. then right on Penitencia Creek Rd. and continue on into the park. Drive under the bridge and meet at the far end of the parking lot. Notes: Possible entrance fee. Difficulty Level: A moderately strenuous 3-4 mile walk. LO, RC

Wednesday Sept. 12, 8:30 AM Vasona Lake County Park

Half day. Leader: Janna Pauser; (408) 569-9264. Directions: Entrance on Blossom Hill Road, on the west side of Hwy 17 in Los Gatos. From Hwy 17 exit at Lark Ave.; go west to University Ave., turn left onto Blossom Hill Rd. and use main entrance. Turn into first parking lot on your left after kiosk. Difficulty Level: Easy walking. Highlights: We'll bird the south end of this popular Los Gatos Park. Possible Yellow Warbler, Western Tanager and a variety of riparian birds. Notes: Gate opens at 8 AM, entrance fee required. LO, RC

Saturday Sept. 15, 9:00 AM **Point Reves**

Full day. Leader: Peter LaTourette; (650) 961-2741. Highlights: Our annual trip to the west coast's most active vagrant trap where birds and the weather are always exciting and unpredictable! Directions: From Hwy 1 in Marin Co. take Sir Francis Drake Blvd. west approx. 14 miles and turn left to Drakes Beach. Meet in the parking area. Notes: Bring lunch, liquids, a full tank of gas, and be ready for fog, wind, sun and lots of difficult to ID birds. Be prepared to carpool from Drakes Beach.

Sunday Sept. 16, 9:00 AM **Charleston Slough**

Half day. Leader: Allen Royer; (408) 288-7768. Directions: From Hwy 101 in Mt. View take San Antonio Rd. north to Terminal Way parking area. Meet at the entrance nearest San Antonio Road. Difficulty Level: This trip recommended for beginning birders but all are encouraged to attend. Notes: Bring your spotting scope and a friend.

Saturday Sept. 22, 7:30 AM **Sunnyvale Baylands Park**

Half Day. Leader: Pat Kenny; (408) 725-0468. Directions: From Hwy 237 take the Lawrence Expwy/Caribbean Drexittoward Caribbean Dr. Turn right into the park at the first stoplight on Caribbean Dr. north of Hwy 237. Meet in the first parking lot to the right of the entrance kiosk. Notes: A \$6.00 parking fee may be required. **RC**

Sunday Sept. 23, 8:30 AM **Coyote Hills Regional Park**

Half day. Leader: Frank Vanslager; (650) 961-1505. Directions: Take Hwy 84 (Dumbarton Bridge) east to Newark. Exit right at Thornton, then go left on overpass, as Thornton becomes Paseo Padre turn left at Patterson Ranch/Commerce Rd into park. Meet at far end of Quarry parking lot located on the left, 1/4 mile past park entrance. Notes: Entrance fee required. LO, RC

Saturday Sept. 29, 8:00 AM **Carmel River**

Half day plus. Leader: Bob Reiling; (408) 253-7527. Directions: Take Hwy 1 south to Carmel, turn left at Rio Rd., and then immediately turn right into the Crossroads Shopping Center. Temperatures vary, so bring extra layers of clothing. Rubber boots optional as there may be puddles in the riverbed.

From Hwy 237 in San Jose take Gold St. north to the end of the street, bear left on Elizabeth St. and then right on Hope St. to the Marina parking lot. **Highlights:** A chance to visit some of the local hot spots you hear about and, we hope, to see some "good" birds

Sunday Oct. 21, 9:00 AM Hawk Hill/Marin Headlands

Full day. Leader: Nick Yatsko; (408) 891-3187. Directions: Going north on Hwy 101, after crossing the Golden Gate Bridge exit just past the Vista Point, cross under Hwy 101 and turn right just before entrance back onto Hwy 101 south. Drive up hill to the highest point and park. Meet at the parking area or at the Hawk watch on top of the hill. Highlights: Migrating raptors including the possibility of seeing a rare Broad-winged Hawk. Notes: Weather conditions can be highly variable, dress in layers, bring lunch and liquids. This will be our only field trip to the Hawk Hill/ Marin Headlands this fall. Heavy fog in the headlands will likely cancel the trip.

Saturday Oct. 27, 8:30 AM Grant Ranch County Park

Half day. Leader: Jim Johnson; (408) 996-3506. Directions: From I-680 take Alum Rock Ave. northeast, turn right on Hamilton Rd. and go approximately 9 miles to the park. Meet at Grant Lake (aka Hall's Valley Lake) parking lot, which is the first parking lot on the left side of the road (do not enter the Main Park Entrance on the right). Highlights: Fresh water ducks, oak woodland birds and possible Golden Eagle. Notes: A Park entrance fee will be required for the last half of the trip. Difficulty Level: This will be a moderate 2 mile walk. LO, RC

Conservation Corner

Panoche Valley needs YOUR help

The Panoche Valley solar project received an infusion of funds from Duke Energy and the developers are now pursuing additional permits from state and federal agencies. While our California Environmental Quality Act legal challenge is to be resolved in the California Appellate Court later this year, the Army Corps of Engineers has published a Notice of Intent to prepare a federal Environmental Impact Assessment. The fight to save Panoche Valley continues, and **YOU CAN HELP US PERSEVERE**: <u>Email</u>: *spn.eis.panoche@usace.army.mil*; **please also copy**: shani@scvas.org

<u>Please ask</u> that 1) the Environmental Impact Statement consider alternatives outside of Panoche Valley and outside of San Benito County on land that is not designated an Important Bird Area and is not included in the Core Recovery Area for endangered species; 2) Comprehensive surveys, following Department of Fish and Game protocols, for all endangered species must be conducted, and 3) please add your own thoughts about the potential development of a solar project in Panoche Valley.

Mountain View General Plan

Our extensive advocacy efforts on behalf of birds and wildlife habitat in Mountain View engaged many in our community. On July 10th, the City Council approved a new General Plan, and rejected residential development as an option in the North Bayshore area. While housing is now off the table, other development is permitted and we can expect to see great expansion and intensification as Google and other companies grow.

The new General Plan's Vision for North Bayshore promotes biological habitats. The vision trickles to a new Goal: "An area that is a model of highly sustainable and innovative development, protective of the natural and biological assets of the area" and a new Policy: Wildlife friendly development. Implement wildlife friendly site planning, building and design strategies.

We hope to continue working with the City of Mountain View, Google and other employers in the area throughout the implementation of the plan.

Cavalia and the Burrowing Owls

The Cavalia experience opened in San Jose in July. The Armer siblings and Greg Kerekes provided <u>Cavalia</u> with footage used to create a video on the plight of the burrowing owls. This video (see http://zone.pmt.ca/ zone/zonepublique.php?u=s9rzhk) screened at the start of each performance. Overall, more than 50,000 saw the video. We are very grateful to Cavalia for their support and help in raising Burrowing Owl awareness.

Additional Projects We Are Tracking Closely:

- High Speed Rail Authority is planning Maintenance and Storage Yards south of San Jose
- The Santa Clara County Vector Control District is planning a new Integrated Mosquito and Vector Management Program
- Palo Alto is updating the Natural Environment Element of its Comprehensive Plan.
- San Jose is considering residential development on Penitencia Creek. In addition, the city is planning Creek Bank Stabilization projects for five areas along upper Guadalupe Creek
- Don Edwards National Refuge is completing its Comprehensive Conservation Plan

If you're interested in education or working with children, this is definitely the perfect time to get involved. Wetlands Discovery Program Docent – This program, our flagship educational program, shares the wonder and importance of wetland habitats with third through sixth graders throughout Santa Clara County. Raptors in Flight with Bob Power

Raptors hold everyone's attention. Their grace as they dominate the airways and their power as they hunt are mesmerizing. The beauty and majesty of a raptor when they choose to allow us a prolonged look on a distant perch always makes a lasting impression. This class will focus on identification of raptors in flight using multimedia to focus on the size, shape, flight style, and field marks of the common and not so common raptors of the Bay Area. Field trips will reinforce the classroom experience with one trip to the west's most productive Hawkwatch site, Hawk Hill in the Marin Headlands, and one trip in search of our rarest raptor, the California Condor. *Note*: We will not be studying owls in this class.

Duck Identification Made Easy with Bob Power



Struggling with ducks? Just starting out? Hoping to engage someone in a conversation about hybrids? This is the class for you. We will be looking at both the common and not so common ducks that populate the San Francisco Bay and our local salt ponds during the winter months. Our field trip will start in the East Bay and we will work our way back to Sunnyvale. Along with repetitive and reinforcing sightings of common duck species, our field trip will be focused on finding, identifying and comparing Barrow's and Common Goldeneye, Eurasian and American Wigeon, Greater and Lesser Scaup, and the elusive Tufted Duck, and White-winged Scoter.



Costa Rica: Quintessential Tropical Birding January 15th – January 29th with Charlie Gomez, Bob Hirt, and Bob Power

Costa Rica's temperate climate and environment rich in fruits and flowers is also blessed with an avian population that is diverse, colorful, and prolific. Nearly 890 species of birds can be found here, ranging from Scarlet Macaws to Threewattled Bellbird. While we cannot hope to see all 890 species in one trip, we can hope to see 300 to 350 species under the capable leadership of Charlie Gomez, arguably Costa Rica's finest trip leader. From National Wildlife Refuges and National Parks to high mountain ecosystems and tropical forests, we will be searching for endemic and exotic birds including Keelbilled Toucan and the ultimate Costa Rica target bird, the Resplendent Quetzal. This 13-day tour, sandwiched between

travel days to and from Costa Rica, will take us from the outskirts of San Jose, Costa Rica, through the most unique habitats of the Pacific rain forests and the Talamanca highlands, immersing ourselves in four of the country's finest birding destinations along the way. We hope you will make plans to join us on this fantastic adventure.

<u>Fees</u>: \$2950/person, double-occupancy; \$500 single supplement. Deposit of \$500 due by 9/15 to hold reservation. Additional Information: Fees do not include airfare, bar bills, or other incidentals. Fees do include all park entrance fees, tips for guides and drivers, and a tax deductible donation to SCVAS. Trip limited to 12 participants.



Carlos Gomez, or as he is better known, Charlie, started his birding career working with Gary Stiles, the author of Birds of Costa Rica. He has guided birding and other natural history groups for Costa Rica Expeditions for two decades. Before that, he was Station Manager at the Organization for Tropical Studies' La Selva Biological Station and has been called "legendary" in the Washington Post. Late Spring 2013

The Breeding Birds of Yuba Pass, Sierra Valley, and the Gold Lakes Region May 31st - June 3rd *with Bob Power*

The northern Sierra offers a spectacular array of nesting birds, from White-headed Woodpeckers and Hermit Warblers to Yellow-headed Blackbirds and Green-tailed Towhees. We typically see 100+ species of birds during this workshop, few are species available to study in the South Bay, and all are stunning. With a four-day trip, we are able to explore these unique habitats at leisure.

<u>Fee</u>: \$125 members; \$160 non-members. Trip fees cover continental breakfast and bag lunches for those staying at the Buttes Resort in Sierra City.

Location: We will meet at 1 PM at Yuba Pass on May 31st, and then meet at 7AM in Sierra City on June 1st, 2nd, and 3rd.

Additional Information: We organize carpools each morning on location. We will have a maximum of three vehicles for our field trips. **Please do not sign up for this workshop if you're not prepared to carpool around Sierra Valley.** Carpooling expenses are shared by the participants; typically \$5/person/day. Two spectacular national parks mark the northern and southern bounds of this trip: Denali and Kenai Fjords. Denali, with the incomparable Alaska Range and around every corner a chance for Grizzly Bear, Moose, Caribou, or one of Alaska's other magnificent mammals. Nearby, the Denali Highway's extraordinary scenery harbors more mammals: Long-tailed Jaegar, Arctic Warbler, and other species at the limits of their range. Taking no back seat is Kenai Fjords, with its immense ice fields,



breathtaking mountains rising from the ocean, and thousands of breeding seabirds. June marks the peak of breeding activity with all of our target species in their finest plumage. The birds we'll be seeking comprise a long list of highlights: White-winged Crossbill, Three-toed Woodpecker, Northern Hawk-owl, Long-tailed Jaeger, Horned Puffin, Arctic Tern, Kittlitz's Murrelet, Willow Ptarmigan, Gyrfalcon, and so many more. There are fabulous birding trips, amazing birding trips, wonderful birding trips and then there's Alaska!

Late Summer 2013

Eastern Sierra mid-summer Birding Dream July16th-21st *with Bob Power*

The east slope of the Sierra offers a spectacular array of breeding, post-breeding and migratory birds, from Williamson's Sapsuckers and Clark's Nutcrackers to Osprey and Green-tailed Towhees. With a six-day trip, we're able to explore a number of unique habitats including the alpine zone surrounding Saddlebag Lake, the high desert sage grasslands of the historic ghost town of Bodie, the extraordinary tufa formations of Mono Lake and the basalt columns of Devils Postpile National Monument. We typically see 120+ species of birds during this workshop, few are species available to study in the South Bay, and all are stunning.

<u>Fee</u>: \$175 members; \$210 non-members. Fees cover: Kayaking, Bodie Entrance, Devil's Postpile Entrance, and Saddlebag Ferry. A portion of your fees go directly to supporting SCVAS Educational Programs.

<u>Altitude</u>: Lee Vining is our daily departure point at 7,000 ft. in elevation. We venture off one day to Saddlebag Lake at 10,000 ft. and above. It is not unusual for participants to feel the effects of the altitude and may require a couple days to acclimate. <u>Physical activity</u>: Each day involves some hiking at altitude. While at a birder's pace, it is still hiking at altitude. One morning is spent kayaking along the south shore of Mono Lake. Participants on this trip should be in reasonable physical condition and should consult their doctor if altitude is a concern.

<u>Additional Information</u>: Class size is limited to 11. We organize carpools each morning on location. We will have a maximum of three vehicles for our field trips. **Please do not sign up for this workshop if you're not prepared to carpool each day**. Carpooling expenses are shared by the participants and are not part of the base fee; typically \$5/person/day.

Field Notes

(June-July 2012) by Bill Bousman

Geese through Gulls

A SY Greater White-fronted Goose was at the Morgan Hill Community Park on 22 Jun (SCR), now resident since last December. We have a few summering records. A pair of **Blue-winged Teal** was seen in the Lockheed Martin marsh on 20

Jun (MSt), our only summer report. A male and female **Common Goldeneye** were found on the Ogier Avenue ponds on 14 Jun (RPh et al.). A **Pacific Loon** on Vasona Reservoir on 9-13 Jun (JPa et al., v.ob.) is only the second summer record for the county. A pair of **Clark's Grebes** nested on the southeast island in Pond A1 in Mountain View 8 Jun-17 Jul (R&PF, m.ob.) but were not successful as the eggs did not hatch. A **Whitefaced Ibis** briefly visited Adobe Creek in the Palo Alto FCB on 10 Jun (DWe). Two juvenile **Bald Eagles** fledged from

the nest northeast of Casa de Fruta on 7 Jun (DLSu) and were seen regularly nearby into early July (v.ob.). A Sora was heard twice in Artesian Slough on 21 Jun (RWR, FV), our only June record (most are late July). This is the first summer record since 2003. Snowy Plovers were seen in small numbers from New Chicago Marsh and Ponds 13 and 16 (v.ob.). The high counts were of 11 on 8 and 23 Jul (MJM) in New Chicago. There was no evidence of nesting as in the last six years. A surprise was a breeding plumaged Wandering Tattler on the edge of Stevens Creek Reservoir on 15 Jun (RFu, v.ob.). This is our first summer record. The first Lesser Yellowlegs of the season were in New Chicago Marsh 17-24 Jul (PDu, v.ob.). Based on descriptions, two different adult Semipalmated Sandpipers were found in New Chicago Marsh 19-20 Jul (MJM, LCr, SCR et al., v.ob.). Surprising was a basic **Dunlin** there on 19 Jul (SCR et al.). The adult Wilson's Phalaropes started moving through in late June as is typical. The high count was 1730 birds in New Chicago Marsh and Pond A16 on 21 Jul (WGB). The numbers of Red-necked Phalaropes do not peak until August or September, so the 153 birds on New Chicago Marsh on 24 Jul (WGB) were also typical. A

SY **Heermann's Gull** was over the San Francisquito Creek delta in both counties on 2 Jun (MMR, ARo). Although we have a few records from July, this is the first for June.

Doves through Phainopepla

A White-winged Dove was seen in Morgan Hill on 16 Jul (SCR), but could not be refound. This is the sixth county record. Two different Greater Roadrunners were seen along County Line Road in Henry Coe

A good summer for rarities, although few stayed: Wandering Tattler, Heermann's Gull, White-winged Dove, Northern Parula, and Chestnut-sided Warbler.

SPon 26 Jun (AL, JY). A few **Black Swifts** may linger into June. Three over Monte Bello OSP on 1 Jun (GHa) were certainly migrants, but one near Loma Prieta on 15 Jun (ARi) may have been a foraging bird from the small coastal population. **Vaux's Swifts** were found in typical numbers this summer. Nesting pairs were found using chimneys (JPa, BHe), one in the Almaden Valley and the second closer to Los Gatos. A HY male **Allen's Hummingbird** was photographed at Stanford 26-28 Jul (JM). The adults have gone south by May, but HY birds may linger into early September.

Three young female **Pileated Woodpeckers** fledged from their Mt. Madonna CP nest on 9 or 10 Jun (DPo). Two more **Willow Flycatchers** were found in June, one singing along Llagas Creek above Bloomfield Road on 1 Jun (MMR) and another in an Almaden Valley yard on 18 Jun (JPa). A very late **Say's Phoebe** was seen at Moffett Field on 2 Jun (MMR). More surprising was a nesting pair off Hellyer Avenue 2-16 Jul (JPa, v.ob.) that fledged three young. A pair fledged young nearby last year in

May. There have been a half dozen or so nesting records at the western front of the Diablo Range over the last 60 years. The **Purple Martin** showing was one of the best in recent years. Birds were found near the Loma Prieta lower saddle throughout June (m.ob.) with at least four on 8 Jun (WGB) and 15 Jun (ARi). To the south, five birds were at Maymens Flat on 15 Jun (ARi), and a male was about three miles south of the Loma Prieta Way/Summit Road junction on 23 Jun (CK, PK). A number of birds were seen in a closed area on Mt. Umunhum on 14 Jun (AJ).

A family group of 3-4 **Canyon Wrens** was found on Route #8 in Henry Coe SP on 30 Jun (MMR), the only Canyon Wrens seen so far this year. At least one of the pairs of **American Dippers** in Stevens Creek Canyon nested successfully as two adults were found with two fledglings on 15 Jun (RFu). A **Golden-crowned Kinglet** was on Mt. Umunhum on 14 Jun (AJ), a few miles away from areas where birds have nested in the past. One to three **Hermit Thrushes** in Mt. Madonna CP on 20 Jul (DPo) are from the coastal nesting population. This park is the best place in the county to find this

nesting subspecies. An adult Cedar Waxwing was seen along Harry Road on 1 Jul (JPa); we have few summer records following the tail of migration in early June. The invasion of Phainopeplas into Henry Coe SP near the border with Stanislaus County continued into June. Along Routes #4 and #5, where 13 birds were found in late May including a pair building an nest, a total of 21 birds were counted on 26 Jun (AL, JY). During winter invasions in the 1980s, the Mt. Hamilton CBC tallied 26 birds on two successive years (but the individual maximum party count was 11). So the count of 21 birds along about eight miles is without precedent.

Field Notes cont'd

Moreover, if we were not doing these burn surveys in Coe, this invasion would have been completely missed. How often has this happened before in these remote regions? One to two birds were also found on Route #12 on 10 and 30 Jun (SCR), and four birds were on Route #8 on 30 Jun (MMR).

Warblers through Goldfinches

An adult male Northern Parula was found along the Coyote Creek bike path south of the model airplane park on 14 Jun (RPh et al.) for the 7th county record. It could not be found again. A singing adult Chestnut-sided Warbler was seen in Stevens Creek CP on 16 Jun (MMR, DWe) during the search for the Wandering Tattler. This is our first spring record and 12th overall. Breeding Yellow-rumped Warblers are always of interest, so a singing bird southeast of the junction of Hwys 35 and 9 on 11 Jun (DM, MP) and one or more birds in Sanborn-Skyline CP near Castle Rock on 19 Jun (ARi) were notable. Less common are summering Hermit Warblers. One was along Skyline Boulevard south of Page Mill Road on 2 Jun (GHa). Two to three were southeast of Hwys 35 and 9 on 11 Jun (DM, MP), and one or more birds were in Sanborn-Skyline CP near Castle Rock on 19 Jun (ARi). The biggest surprise were the two HY birds found in Ed Levin CP on 19 Jul (SCR, PE, MSc). On this date, they are likely from a coastal breeding population, or are they?

A Yellow-breasted Chat was heard singing along Llagas Creek above Bloomfield Road on 1 Jun (MMR). A juvenile **Rufouscrowned Sparrow** was seen in a Morgan Hill yard on 8 Jul (SCR) for the second time in two years. **Black-chinned Sparrows** continued to be found on the slopes below Summit Road near Loma Prieta in Santa Cruz County (m.ob.). On occasion a bird would briefly move across the road for a Santa Clara County tick (v.ob). Similarly, a Santa Cruz **Sage Sparrow** would move into Santa Clara County (v.ob.). A SY male **Summer Tanager** was found at Stanford on 8 Jun (RoC, v.ob.), but did not

remain, the first since 2006. It has been a good spring for **Rose-breasted Grosbeaks**. An immature male visited a feeder west of Gilroy on 24 May (A&JA), an adult male was at a Saratoga feeder on 13 Jun (JJ), and a female or immature was on Mt. Umunhum on 14 Jun (AJ). A male **Blue Grosbeak** was briefly seen along the Pajaro River below Hwy 101 on 3 Jul (RWR, FV). A singing male **Indigo Bunting** was found near the

campground at Joseph Grant CP on 18 Jun (P&JO'B) and remained at least through 27 Jun (m.ob.). A single **Pine Siskin** at Monte Bello OSP on 2 Jul (GHa) was a good find. Fairly good numbers of **Lawrence's Goldfinches** were seen in June with a high count of 25 in Joseph Grant CP on 4 Jun (FV et al.). Only two birds were reported in July, one at Monte Bello OSP on 2 Jul (GHa) and a male was singing in Morgan Hill on 24 Jul (SCR).
