After leading Santa Clara Valley Audubon for seven years, Bob Power has announced his retirement as executive director effective January 31st, 2014.

"This past year was exceptional for our organization and I will leave SCVAS in excellent financial shape with a very strong and experienced staff," said Bob in a recent discussion with the Board of Directors. An executive search committee has been formed and is actively seeking qualified individuals to find someone who is a great fit for the conservation and education programs we are known for.

During Bob's tenure, significant accomplishments were achieved. Some of the highlights have been:


- Brought back the Environmental Advocate as a permanent staff position.
- Worked with our coalition against the development in Panoche Valley.
- Participated in and helped to shape regional, long-term land-use plans such as, the county's Habitat Conservation Plan, the Salt Pond Restoration Plan, and environmental policies of the Santa Clara Valley Water Department.
- Worked closely with Golden Gate Audubon and the Ca. Attorney General's office to limit raptor mortality at the Altamont Pass Wind Resource Area.
- Ensured that SCVAS is a voice for Burrowing Owls in the Bay Area and beyond.
- Grew education and conservation fundraising through our Birdathon from \$26,000 to \$75,000 annually.

Turn right and meet at the parking lot located 1/2-mile on the right. **Highlights:** Woodland and grassland species as well as a good assortment of raptors are possible. **Difficulty Level:** Trip involves two plus miles of moderately strenuous walking. **RC**

Follow the road for 1/4 mile and park in the gravel lot at the first bend in road (meet at the gate if the entrance is locked). **RC**

Conservation Corner

July has been a busy month for our Environmental Action Committee and volunteers:

Burrowing Owls

On the evening of July 4th, we helped the City of Mountain View manage crowds at Shoreline and protected three pairs of Burrowing Owls and their chicks from a stampede of fireworks viewers. We got to see both the owls and the spectacular fireworks display. Two weekends later on a lovely summer evening, we headed to the Warm Springs Unit of the Don Edwards National Wildlife Refuge to survey for Burrowing Owls. We saw a total of 14 owls, confirmed 6 active nesting sites, and enjoyed vigorous exercise and a lovely sunset. San Francisquito Creek Flood Control Project

Last year, we expressed concerns that the alternative selected for the San Francisquito Creek Flood Control Project could potentially threaten populations of clapper rails and black rails at the Faber Tract, an important site for the preservation of these species. The US Fish and Wildlife Service has recently reiterated our concerns. As a result, additional analysis is required before the US Corps of Engineers can approve the project.

The San Francisquito Creek Flood Control Project would utilize 7.4 acres of the Palo Alto golf course. This prompted Palo Alto to propose the Palo Alto Municipal Golf Course Reconfiguration and Baylands Athletic Center Expansion Project. Here, the golf course would be denuded of trees and redesigned in a "Baylands theme". Playing fields and a gym would be approved between the golf course and US 101.

SCVAS did not oppose the reconfiguration of the golf course. However, we have significant concerns over some of the project's components and proposed mitigations. We are worried that the turf grass selected for its salt tolerance would become invasive, as it has in other estuaries in warm climates. We are also concerned with a proposal to mitigate for the loss of trees on the golf course by planting thousands of trees at the Pearson Arastradero preserve. We are advocating with the city to plant native grasses and shrubs at Byxbee Park instead.

Bird Friendly Campus Campaign

SCVAS continues to work with several local companies on improving their campuses to protect birds and enhance their habitat. Our campaigns include Habitat Enhancement (such as nest boxes), Bird Safe Design, and "Don't Take the Bait." We are currently engaged with Apple, Facebook, Google, Intuit, and Phillips Lumileds, hoping that these world leaders set an example for our valley and far beyond.

Volunteer Ventures

This program shares the wonder and importance of wetland habitats with 3rd-6th graders throughout Santa Clara County. Volunteers guide students in exploring wetland wild-life and habitat both in the classroom and out in the field. This program is rewarding for our volunteers and for the hundreds of South Bay children who participate (almost 1800 this past year!). No experience is necessary, as we will provide training for both field and class sessions. All a potential docent needs is a love of nature and a desire to share it with children.

Educational Presenters — With the school year already in high gear, we need more volunteers to fill requests for educational presentations in K-12 classrooms throughout Santa Clara County. We use slideshows, stuffed birds, and real nests to teach youth about local birds and their habitat. These presentations are engaging and come fully scripted. No experience is necessary though teaching and birding experience are helpful. Time commitment is flexible, and scheduling is based on classroom and volunteer availability.

Wildlife Education Day Support – As our largest annual event, Wildlife Education Day fields an abundance of ways in which you can volunteer. Lower Klamath / Tule Lake Eagles Feb. 6th - 10th, Thursday - Monday

The lower Klamath Basin is a magnet for Rough-legged Hawks, Ferruginous Hawks, Prairie Falcons, Golden Eagles, and of course, Bald Eagles in abundance. While we attempt to identify all birds seen on this trip, the focus is raptors. We 'll see geese in phenomenal numbers, multiple duck species, and often see the first few north-bound Sandhill Cranes. Verna's Winema Lodge won't last forever. Come experience a northern California classic.

Lodging: Participants make their own reservations. There are other

accommodations in the area, but we're not sure you'll be able to beat the convenience, dining, price combo of the Winema Lodge, which is ideally situated and puts on a great dinner and breakfast.

Additional information: Participants must be prepared to either drive a carpool or ride in a carpool on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. We will have a maximum of 3 vehicles, 4 guests per vehicle, as we wander around the backroads of the Lower Klamath and Tule Lake National Wildlife Refuges.

Field Notes

(June - July 2013)

Ducks through Hawks

One year in ten we may find an oversummering **Eurasian Wigeon**, so a male seen in Pond A2E on 1 Jun (MJM, LCr) was exceptional. **Northern Shovelers** occasionally nest in the South Bay so it was interesting to see a female with three ducklings at the Sunnyvale WPCP on 27 Jul (WGB). Female **Northern**

Pintail were apparently incubating nests in New Chicago Marsh in Alviso on both 17 Jun (MJM) and 28 Jul (MJM, RGJ), but the outcome of neither attempt is known. Redhead occasionally oversummer as the example of five males in eclipse plumage in Pond A16 on 26 Jul (WGB) shows. A female Lesser Scaup with 11 ducklings a few days old was found at the Sunnyvale WPCP on 27 Jul (WGB). Some years, downy young are not seen until August, last year none were found. In most years we find White-faced Ibis in spring and fall, so their presence this sum-

mer is unusual. A single bird was seen in the north pond of the Palo Alto FCB on 10 Jun (MDo) but was not found there again. Two were discovered in the Lockheed Martin marsh on 18 Jun (DC), at least 10 were there on 22 Jun (MJM,

LCr, v.ob.) and at least a few nonbreeders have remained through the period (m.ob.). **Ospreys** are very scarce in the Diablo Range. One seen at Mississippi Lake on 22 Jun (JY) is only the third record from Coe Park in the last 30 years. Perhaps related to the amazing concentration of **Swainson's Hawks** during the spring migration, a pair of Swainson's built a nest along Coyote Creek on county park lands and raised a single youngster. The nest was found on 14 May (WGB) and monitored through the end of the present period (RPh, WGB). Eggs were

Summer was marked by three unrelated events: the first Pigeon Guillemot to be found in the county, the first nesting of Swainson's Hawk in a hundred years, and a remarkable summer incursion of Black Rails.

collected from a pair of Swainson's in 1889, but as far as we know, this is the first successful nest of this threatened species since then. I hope that details of this successful nesting can be distributed in the near future. Apart from the nesting pair (both intermediate morphs), a light morph adult was seen in Coyote Valley on 2 Jun (BHi, GP) and another light morph adult was over Hwy 152 at the Merced County line on 20 Jul (DLSu).

Rails

Like the case of the Swainson's Hawk, there is evidence from the 19th century of nesting by **Black Rails** in Alviso. Since that time, Black Rails have been an occasional wintering presence in some of our better marshes in favorable years. The two exceptions have been a bird heard calling at the peak of the spring period on 26-27 Apr 1993 in Palo Alto (MMR, WGB, SCR) and one seen on 30 Aug 1995 at the Sunnyvale WPCP (JMD). This summer a Black Rail was heard calling well out in Alviso Slough on 6 Jun (PDu). For the most part, calling rails moved upstream in the slough through

23 Jun, then were found farther out again (m.ob.) Two birds were heard calling on 10 Jun (WGB) and 27 Jun (JTh). A bird was heard from Artesian Slough 6-7 Jun (PDu, v.ob.) and another again on Alviso Slough on 8 Jul (PDu). One or two birds were last heard in Alviso Slough on 17 Jul (GR). At least two birds were involved in this incursion, maybe more. Based on egg collections, the California Black Rail, our local subspecies, lays eggs from 10 Mar to 6 Jul (Birds of North America), so these were likely birds trying to establish breeding territories. A

Virginia Rail was heard along the maintenance road in Shoreline Park on 8 Jun (WGB), three weeks after this species has normally left the South Bay. A calling bird in Monte Bello on 16 Jun (MJM, LCr) was from the sag pond where they have been heard before in the summer.

Shorebirds through Guillemots

Snowy Plovers appear to have had a fairly good breeding season with multiple broods found from New Chicago Marsh and Pond A16 west to Pond A12 and the unnamed triangular pond north of Crittenden Marsh. On 28 Jul alone, young were

found in New Chicago, the impoundment north of the Alviso Marina CP, Pond A12 (four broods), and the unnamed pond (MJM, RGJ, SCR, FV). The first of the returning adult Lesser Yellowlegs was found on Pond A16 on 2 Jul (WGB). Good numbers have been found in that area through the end of the period with a peak count of five on 20 Jul (MJM, LCr). The end of July has been good for **Ruddy** Turnstones with three or more birds in Pond A16 on 21-28 Jul (DWe, v.ob.) and one over Pond A9 on 29 Jul (WGB). Two Red Knots on Pond A9 on 28 Jul (MJM, RGJ, SCR) were the first of the fall birds. An adult Semipalmated Sandpiper was seen in New Chicago Marsh on 23 Jul (MJM, LCr) and an unaged bird was found Charleston Slough on 25 Jul (DPe). An adult **Pectoral Sandpiper** was seen in New Chicago Marsh on 28 Jul (SCR), the juveniles are not likely before September. The peak count of passage Wilson's Phalaropes was 2400+ in New Chicago on 18 Jul (WGB). The high count of Red-necked Phalaropes was 500 in New Chicago on 28Jul (MJM, RGJ), we should

see much greater numbers in late August or early September. Least Terns arrived in their favored staging area of Pond A2E on 19 Jul (WGB) when 10 were seen. Numbers increased rapidly (v.ob.) and at least 118 were there on 31 Jul (WGB). An adult and juvenile Elegant Tern on Pond A2E on 21 Jul (MMR) were two to three weeks early. Black Skimmers nesting on an island in Pond A16 hatched two young on 20 Jul (FV), but one succumbed in a few days. Breeding attempts at Shoreline Lake by another pair were unsuccessful (v.ob.). On a survey for Snowy Plovers the team discovered a juvenile **Pigeon Guillemot** on Pond A14 in Alviso on 28 Jul (SCR, MJM, RGJ), a first record for the county. The youngster has been seen through the end of the month (m.ob.) and looks healthy, but the South Bay is not always a good place for alcids.

Roadrunners through Martins

Our token Greater Roadrunner of the period was a 'cooing' bird northeast of Hellyer Avenue on 27 Jun (WGB). Nesting of Vaux's Swifts include a belated report of birds calling in a chimney on Hosta Lane in San Jose on 8 May (BH fide JPa) and a pair that nested in a chimney near the McAbee entrance to Almaden-Quicksilver CP 21 Jun-23 Jul (JPa, v.ob.). An adult male **Rufous Hummingbird** was seen at a Morgan Hill feeder on 22 Jun (SCR). Willow Flycatchers are very scarce spring migrants so one banded at the Coyote Creek Field Station (CCFS) on 2 Jun (SFBBO) and two birds at Monte Bello OSP on 6 Jun (GHa) are of interest. Surprising in the northwest corner of the county, a Say's Phoebe was seen at Monte Bello OSP on

1 Jun (ViT, PP). Better described as astounding was an adult with two fledglings at Moffett Field the same day (MMR, NMa). We have regular breeding records from the eastern Diablo Range, very occasional records from western edge of the Diablo Range (two fledglings were off Hellyer Avenue on 13 Jun (BJ)), but none from the South Bay edge. Two of the Moffett birds were seen again on 4 and 13 Jun (MMR) and one was at the edge of Crittenden Marsh on 31 Jul (WGB). At least two Purple Martins continued near the lower saddle on Loma Prieta Avenue through at least 17 Jul (v.ob.). Three birds were below Mt. Umunhum on 9 Jun (AV) and 11 Jun (BHi et al.). A female was at Monte Bello OSP on 6 Jun and an immature bird was there on 31 Jul (both GHa).

Wrens through Goldfinches

A Rock Wren was heard in the quarry adjacent to Rancho San Antonio OSP on 4 Jul (MMR, ARo). They have been resident in this private quarry for many years and are now accessible for those with sharp ears on the new Quarry Trail in the OSP. The nearest known populations are on the western side of the Diablo Range below Monument Peak and in the Santa Teresa Hills. American Dippers tend to be more reclusive in the summer so singles along Stevens Creek above Mt. Eden Road on 7 Jun (BM) and on Los Gatos Creek above Main Street on 21 Jun (DoS) were of interest. A single Phainopepla near Mississippi Lake on 22 Jun (JY) was the only one seen this summer (21 birds were seen there last summer). Sage Sparrows are scarce anywhere in the Santa Cruz Mountains so singles along the Indian Creek Trail in Monte Bello OSP on 1 Jun (RFu), beside Loma Prieta Avenue on 20 Jun (AMR), and on the Rancho San Antonio OSP side of Black Mountain on 4 Jul (MMR, ARo) are of interest. The singing male Rosebreasted Grosbeak at Almaden Lake on 31 May (not 21 May as in my previous column) was seen briefly the next morning, 1 Jun (JPa et al.). Another singing adult was found along the Pajaro River east of Sargent Creek on 23 Jun (DLSu). Blue Grosbeaks continued to be found along the Pajaro River with a female near the Santa Cruz border on 3 Jun and an adult male singing nearby in both counties on 23 Jun (both DLSu). A Yellow-head-

ed Blackbird in the Lockheed Martin channel on 5 Jun (BM) is only the fourth record for the summer period. Greattailed Grackles were reported from the Palo Alto FCB to the Coyote Creek GC (v.ob.) with a peak count of 17 birds near Riverside Drive on 19 Jun (MJM). The adult male Baltimore Oriole continued at Vasona CP through 5 Jun (KBu, ViT). It was seen once again on 9 Jul (KBu). A single **Pine Siskin** over Monte Bello OSP on 2 Jun (RFu et al.) may have either been part of the coastal resident population or a lingering bird from last winter's invasion. Very few Lawrence's Goldfinches were reported from the Diablo Range and none from valley floor. Adults and juveniles were widely found in the Santa Cruz Mountains albeit in low numbers. Up to six birds were found in Rancho Canada del Oro OSP during the period and one or more nests were seen 8-19 Jul (JPa).


