Please carpool if possible; bring binoculars, field guides, layered clothing.

LO = Lunch optional; RC = Heavy rain cancels; NF = No facilities available

Saturday Jan. 4, 7:30 AM County Chase

Half day. **Leader:** Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. **Highlights:** Get a head start on your County Year List with some vagrant chasing. **Notes:** Bring a full tank of gas, lunch, and field guides as we attempt to track down some of the unusual birds seen on the Christmas Bird Counts in Santa Clara County. **Directions:** From Hwy 237 in San Jose take Gold St. north to the end, bear left on Elizabeth St. and then right on Hope St. Meet outside the entrance to the Alviso Marina Parking Lot. **Notes:** Be prepared to carpool as parking may be limited at some sites. **RC**

Sunday Jan. 5, 8:00 AM Los Capitancillos Ponds

Half day. **Leader:** Ann Verdi (408) 266-5108. **Directions:** If coming from Hwy 85, go south on Camden Ave. just past Blossom Hill Rd. Singletree Way is the next left turnoff near Beacon School. Park on the street; we will meet at the trail entrance located on the right just beyond the power plant. **Highlights:** We will bird ponds that are often filled with a wide variety of waterfowl and Gulls, a nearby creek for riparian birds as well as other areas closely associated with the ponds that attract birds. **RC**

Wednesday Jan. 8, 1:00 PM Coyote Valley

Half day. **Leader:** Don Starks 408-266-2969. **Notes:** This is an afternoon trip. **Directions:** Take Hwy 101 south, exit right (west) onto Bailey Rd. Turn left on Hale/Santa Teresa Blvd. In .8 miles, turn right on west Laguna Ave. **Highlights:** Raptors. *RC*

Saturday Jan. 11, 8:30 AM Alum Rock Park

Half day. **Leader:** Jim Johnson (408) 966-3506. **Directions:** From Hwy 101 or I-680 take McKee Rd. northeast toward the hills then left on Toyon Ave., right on Penitencia Creek Rd. and continue on into the park. Pass under the bridge and meet at the far end of the upper parking lot. **Difficulty Level:** This is a moderately strenuous 3-4 mile walk. **Highlights:** Resident breeding birds (possible Rufous-Crowned Sparrow, *The Avocet 2*

and Canyon Wren if we are lucky) early migrants, and lingering winter birds. **Notes:** Be prepared for some mud! Expect to pay an entrance fee. *LO.RC*

Sunday Jan. 12, 8:00 AM Panoche Valley

Full day. Leader: Clay Kempf (831) 761-8260. Directions: Meet at Paicines Store on Hwy 25 approx. 11 miles south of Hollister. Highlights: This is one of our better "out of the county" field trips traversing oak woodland and open grassland via back roads into a unique habitat. Targeted species include Phainopepla, Mountain Bluebird, Prairie Falcon, Ferruginous Hawk and Golden Eagle; other possibilities include Mountain Plover, Bald Eagle, Vesper Sparrow, Greater Roadrunner and Chukar. **Notes:** Bring lunch and a full tank of gas; carpooling is strongly recommended due to limited parking on the narrow roads. **IMPORTANT:** Do not expect to use the restrooms at the Paicines Store, as their use is limited to paying customers (we encourage patronage of local businesses). FRS radios (Walkie-Talkies) set to channel 11 may prove useful on this trip.

Saturday Jan. 18, 8:00 AM Charleston Slough

Half day. **Leader:** Steve Tracey (408) 966-3860. **Directions:** From Hwy 101 in Mt. View take San Antonio Rd. north to Terminal Way parking area. Meet at the entrance nearest San Antonio Rd. **Difficulty Level:** This trip is recommended for beginning birders but all are encouraged to attend. **Notes:** Bring your spotting scope and a friend.

Sunday Jan. 19, 8:15 AM Arastradero OSP

Half day. **Leader:** Rich Page (408) 377-1092. **Directions:** From I-280 take Page Mill Rd. west; turn right on Arastradero Rd. and meet in the parking lot about ½ mile on the right. **Difficulty Level:** Moderate walking. *RC*

Saturday Jan. 25, 8:00 AM Ogier Ponds

Half day. **Leader:** Kirsten Holmquist (408) 747-0988. **Directions:** From Hwy 101 in

Morgan Hill take Cochrane Rd. west to Monterey Hwy, turn right, go north 2.6 miles, turn right towards the Model Airplane Park (street is unnamed). Follow the road for 1/4 mile and park in the gravel lot at the first bend in the road (meet at the gate if the entrance is locked). *RC*

Sunday Jan. 26, 9:00 AM San Francisco's Southern Parks

Half Day. **Leader:** Alan Hopkins; home (415) 664-0983, cell (415) 794-0281. **Directions:** Meet at the parking lot to Heron's Head Park. From Hwy 280 or 101 take the Cesar Chavez St. exit east to Third St. Turn right onto Third St. after crossing the bridge turn left onto Cargo Way. Cargo Way ends at the Heron's Head Park parking lot. **Highlights:** This newly created park is a great place to look for shorebirds and bay waterfowl. Later we will then visit San Francisco's second largest park, McLaren Park, for land birds and a few dabbling ducks. **RC**

Saturday Feb. 1, 8:30 AM Coyote Reservoir

Half day. **Leader:** Bob Reiling (408) 253-7527. **Directions:** From Hwy 101 in Gilroy take Leavesley Rd. east for 1.5 miles, turn left on New Ave then right on Roop Rd. Go left at the "T" intersection, then after 1.3 miles left again on Coyote Reservoir Rd. and on to the Lakeview Picnic area on the right. *LO*, *RC*

Sunday Feb. 2, 8:30 AM Martin Luther King Jr. Regional Shoreline

Half day. **Leader:** Steve Tracey 408-966-3860. Highlights: At this East Bay location we will bird Arrowhead Marsh and vicinity. We'll look for rails (including Clapper), shorebirds, and ducks around the marsh as well as pipits and sparrows in some of the open fields and brushy areas. Depending on the activity level, we may also hop over to Oyster Bay Regional Shoreline. Directions: From I-880 in Oakland take the 98th Ave. exit toward Oakland International Airport. In 0.7 mi turn right onto Airport Access Rd. that then becomes Pardee Dr. after crossing Hegenberger Rd. Turn left onto Swan Way and in 0.2 mi turn right into the Park. We will meet in the parking lot at the end of the road.

Wednesday Feb. 5, 12:00 PM City of Sunnyvale Landfill

One hour. **Leaders:** Freddy Howell and Allen Royer. No RSVP necessary, but contact the landfill coordinator, Silviana Ruiz, at (408) 730-7545 with questions. **Directions:** Donald M. Somers Water Pollution Control Plant, junction of Borregas and Caribbean. Meet at trailhead at north end. **Difficulty Level:** Birding geared toward beginners. **Notes:** Bring binoculars; loaners also available. *RC*

Saturday Feb. 8, 8:00 AM Shoreline Lake and Environs

Half day. **Leader:** Frank Vanslager (650) 961-1505. **Directions:** From Hwy 101 take Shoreline Blvd. and proceed north to its end (on past the golf course). Meet in the parking lot near the boathouse. **Highlights:** Expected species include ducks, gulls, some shorebirds, and a few riparian birds. **Difficulty Level:** A moderately long, but level, loop trip. **RC**

Sunday Feb. 9, 8:30 AM Merced & San Luis Wildlife Refuges

Full day. Leader: Rich Page (408) 377-1092. **Directions:** Meet at the parking area near the first Observation Platform in Merced National Wildlife Refuge. From Hwy 101 in Gilroy take Hwy 152 east thru Los Banos, (no services past Los Banos, so check your gas gauge), approx. 20 miles then north 7 miles on Rte. 59 to Sandy Mush Rd., turn left approx. 8 miles to Merced Wildlife Refuge, on the left. Allow 2.5 hrs driving time from San Jose, more if it's foggy. Highlights: Raptors, ducks, geese, Great Horned Owls, Sandhill Cranes and White-faced Ibis possible. After the Merced Wildlife Refuge we will caravan to the San Luis Wildlife Refuge for lunch and more birding. Difficulty Level: This will primarily be a driving bird trip so FRS radios (Walkie-Talkies) set to channel 11 will prove to be of value. Notes: Dress in layers; bring lunch, liquids, and a full tank of gas. RC

Wednesday Feb. 12, 8:30 AM Gilroy Water Treatment facility or Coyote Creek trail

Half day. **Leader:** Dennis Porter 408-205-0535. **Directions:** Exact location will depend on weather conditions. We will carpool from McDonalds on Cochrane

Road in Morgan Hill. Take Hwy 101 south; exit Cochrane Rd. and turn right. Turn left at first stop light and park at McDonald's. We'll carpool from here; do not meet at birding site. **Highlights:** If Gilroy ponds have water we'll drive the levee's for ducks and shorebirds. If not, we'll bird the Coyote Creek trail from park headquarters on Malaguerra. *LO*, *RC*

Saturday Feb. 15, 8:00 AM Oka Ponds

Half Day. **Leader:** Jim Johnson (408) 996--3506. **Directions:** From Hwy 17 in Los Gatos take Lark Ave. exit west. Turn right on Oka Rd., left on Mozart Ave. and an immediate right on Oka Lane. Meet at the gate at the end of the lane. **RC**

Sunday Feb. 16, 8:00 AM Lake Cunningham Park

Half day. **Leader:** Pete Dunten (650) 210-6764. **Directions:** From Hwy 101 in San Jose go East on Tully to the entrance to Lake Cunningham Park, 0.3 miles past Capitol Expwy (Raging Waters). Turn left into the park and left again at the entrance booth. Meet in the Marina parking lot. **Notes:** There will be a \$6 parking fee.

Saturday Feb. 22, 8:30 AM Coyote Hills Regional Park

Half day. **Leader:** Frank Vanslager (650) 961-1505. **Directions:** Take Hwy 84, Dumbarton Bridge, east towards Newark. Exit right on Thornton, then left over freeway, as Thornton becomes Paseo Padre. Turn left at Patterson Ranch/Commerce Rd. into park. Meet at far end of Quarry Parking lot ¼ mile past park entrance. **Notes:** An entrance fee should be expected. *LO, RC*

Sunday Feb. 23, 7:30 AM Santa Cruz Coastal Hot Spots

Half Day (optional plus). Leader: Todd Newberry, Santa Cruz Bird Club (831) 426-8741. Directions: Meet 7:30 AM at the Santa Cruz lighthouse on West Cliff Dr. From Hwy 17 take Hwy 1 "north" (toward Half Moon Bay), turn left on Bay St. (just after McDonald's), go to its end, turn right onto W. Cliff Drive, follow bluff-top to lighthouse. For those running late, at 8 AM we will be on West Cliff Dr., checking inter-tidal shelves as we approach the Natural Bridges overlook at the west end of West Cliff Dr. Highlights: A chance to visit local birding hotspots and to chase recently reported goodies. Notes: Dress in layers; Todd's trip goes rain or shine.

Half day. **Leader:** Kirsten Holmquist (408) 747-0988. **Directions:** Meet in the parking lot at Sausal Pond edge of the preserve. From I-280 in Portola Valley take Alpine Rd. south (toward hills) about 2.9 miles to the first stop sign, turn right on Portola Rd. and go 0.8 miles to the parking lot on the left side of the road just past The Sequoias. *RC*

Sunday Mar. 2, 9:00 AM Stanford Campus

Half day. **Leader:** Dick Stovel (650) 856-6105. **Directions:** From Hwy 101 in Palo Alto take University Ave. exit west through downtown and into Stanford campus (University Ave. becomes Palm Dr.). Meet at the end of Palm Dr. at entrance to Main Quad. **Highlights:** Local breeding birds and early returning migrants should be active. **Difficulty Level:** This field trip is highly recommended for beginning birders. **RC**

Friday, Saturday & Sunday Mar. 15-17 Honey Lake, Eagle Lake & vicinity

Leader: Bob Hirt (408) 821-2732. Highlights: A weekend trip to a remote corner of northeast California to see Sage Grouse on their booming grounds. Other expected species include eagles, hawks, geese, ducks, cranes, woodpeckers and other mountain specialties such as Townsend's Solitaire, Cassin's Finch, Mountain Bluebird, and Pinyon Jay. Trip limited to 20 participants; please call leader for further details and to reserve a space on this unique field trip.

Conservation Corner

San Jose approves Master Plan for Water Pollution Control Plant

Despite strong opposition from every environmental group in the South Bay region, eight of eleven City of San Jose Council Members approved the Master Plan for the lands of the San Jose Water Pollution Control Plant.

San Jose claims that the Plan "balances" development, recreation and habitat in allocating all but 180-acres of the Plant's buffer lands to development. We believe this is a wrong turn in San Jose's future, as the City and the region grapple with the increasingly evident impacts of Global Climate Change, Sea Level Rise and loss of Biodiversity and Migratory Stop-over Sites. The loss of hundreds of acres to development will soon be evident, as burrowing owls and other species will be confined to a habitat fragment of 180 acres, embedded in a sprawling landscape of industrial and office development, vast sport fields, roads, parking lots and other urban "improvements" between highway 237 and the Bay, from Alviso to Milpitas.

We wish to recognize the thoughtful efforts of the city leaders who understand the changing climate realities, understand the meaning of adaptation to Sea Level Rise, and are willing to stand for habitat and species that are important to us. The efforts of these leaders to preserve habitat is often in front of great pressures from developers, labor unions and colleagues. We are grateful to San Jose City Council Members Sam Liccardo, Ash Kalra and Kansen Chu for their leadership in opposing the conversion of precious habitat in North San Jose to urban sprawl.

Memorial Parks in San Jose

The need to provide burial facilities in a growing metropolitan area results in proposals for new cemeteries and the expansion of others. A proposed cemetery covering over 100 acres in the hills above Coyote Valley east of Calero Reservoir is of great concern, since the developer is looking to cut the hills, fill the valleys, and create a flat, irrigated lawn and a network of roads. During San Jose's General Plan Discussions, this cemetery was considered, and allowed with intent to build a natural burial cemetery. We are following this project closely, and advocate for a natural burial alternative that would not recontour the landscape and would avoid the excessive irrigation, roads and fences.

In addition, SCVAS successfully advocated against a proposed expansion of San Jose's Oak Hills Memorial Park, since the proposed site for expansion was a designated burrowing owl mitigation area (Dairy Hill).

Ulistac Natural Area still threatened

Strong community opposition to the proposed construction of Soccer Fields on Ulistac Natural Area resulted in the City Council of Santa Clara proceeding with a "Youth Sports Complex Feasibility Study." This process embeds significant risk to Ulistac, as it often lumps together environmental concerns as one in many other "stakeholder" interests. SCVAS will continue to watch closely as the City moves toward a decision.

"Ducks" with Lisa Myers

The San Francisco Bay Area provides the perfect opportunity to see many different species of ducks. This three week course will focus on this beautiful and diverse group of birds and will be held in three different duck habitats where we'll be on the look-out for roughly 20 different species of ducks. Did you know some ducks prefer open salt water while other's prefer to hide in fresh water creeks and some ducks eat fish while others are vegetarian. Another great thing about ducks, we can tell the males from the females. Beginning Birders welcome!

<u>Dates</u>: Thurs. Mornings Feb 6th, 13th, 20th; 10AM-12PM.

<u>Locations</u>: To be determined, based on recent sightings and weather.

<u>Fee</u>: members: \$80; non-members: \$95



Mono Basin and the Eastern Sierra with Bob Power

The east slope of the Sierra offers a spectacular array of breeding, post-breeding and migratory birds, from Williamson's Sapsuckers and Clark's Nutcrackers to Osprey and Green-tailed Towhees. With a six-day trip, we're able to explore a number of unique habitats including the alpine zone surrounding Saddlebag Lake, the high desert sage grasslands of the historic ghost town of Bodie, the extraordinary tufa formations of Mono Lake and the basalt columns of Devils Postpile National Monument. We typically see 120+ species of birds during this workshop, few are species available to study in the south bay, and all are stunning.

Important Trip Details:

Altitude: Lee Vining is our daily departure point at 7,000 ft in elevation. We venture off one day to Saddlebag Lake, at 10,000 ft. and above. It is not unusual for participants to feel the effects of the altitude and to need a couple of days to acclimate.

Physical activity: Each day involves some hiking at altitude. While at a birder's pace, it is still hiking at altitude. One morning is spent kayaking along the south shore of Mono Lake. Participants on this trip should be in reasonable physical condition and should consult their doctor if altitude is a concern.

<u>Dates</u>: Tues. July 1st to Sun. July 6th. Class size is limited to 11. We organize carpools each morning on location. We will have a maximum of three vehicles for our field trips. <u>Please do not sign up for this workshop if you're not prepared to carpool each day.</u> Carpooling expenses are shared by the participants and are not part of the base fee; typically \$5/person/day.

<u>Fee</u>: \$225 members; \$260 non-members. Fees cover: Kayaking, Bodie Entrance, Devil's Postpile Entrance, and Saddlebag Ferry. A portion of your fees go directly to supporting SCVAS Educational Programs.

Field Notes

(October 2013-November 2013

Geese through Hawks

The first Greater White-fronted Geese of the season were two over Coyote Creek above Hwy 237 on 10 Oct (PDu). A juvenile was at Lake Cunningham 23 Oct to at least 15 Nov (JPa, KBu). Of the five swans on outer Pond A3W on 17 Nov (FV et al.), two were **Tundras** and were identified on 19 Nov (SEM) and 24 Nov (MJM). The first Eurasian Wigeon of the season was on Pond A14 in Alviso on 29 Sep (MJM, RGJ). Males have continued there into November (v.ob.) with two on 26 Oct (MH). A single male was at the South County Regional WasteWater Authority (SCRWA) treatment ponds in Gilroy on 2 Oct (MMR, MJM) and was there at least through 15 Oct (v.ob.). Another male was on Pond A3W on 31 Oct-21 Nov (RWR, BM). Blue-winged Teal were found again, two males at the SCRWA ponds on 15 Oct (WGB). The first Blue-wingeds of the season on Artesian (Mallard) Slough in Alviso were two males on 23 Oct (MJM) and these teal were found there through the period (v.ob.) including two males and two females on 29 Nov and two more males nearby over Pond A16 (both WGB). A female Blue-winged stopped by the Mountain View Forebay on 6 Nov (MDo). One of our less frequent duck hybrids, a male Cinnamon X Bluewinged Teal was in Artesian Slough on 29 Nov (WGB). Eight **Redhead** showed up in the Alviso ponds on 29 Sep (MJM, RGJ). The peak count there during the period was 54 on 20 Oct (MMR), much less than have been there in recent years. The first of the season Barrow's Goldeneye was a male at Shoreline Lake on 26 Nov (SEM, KO), perhaps it will stay around. Our only loon for the period was a Common Loon at Calero Reservoir on 2 Oct (PDu). As in a number of recent years, a **Pelagic Cormorant** showed up on the Alviso ponds on 18 Oct (WGB) and was seen there at least through 17 Nov (v.ob.). An American Bittern was found in the entrance channel of the Mountain View Forebay on 5 Oct (KDeM et al.) and has remained into November (v.ob.). Other wintering bitterns included one along the Guadalupe River

below Coleman on 14 Oct (JPa), a second along Alviso Slough on 3 Nov (MH), and the third over Triangle Marsh on 17 Nov (JBr, WBr). A single **White-faced Ibis** over the Alviso ponds on 11 Nov (JaL) and a second one foraging in the Mountain View Forebay on 13 Nov (JMD) may be birds attempting to winter. A **Broad-winged Hawk** soaring west of I-680 in San Jose on 8 Oct (JLo) was the second migrant this fall (and both over urban areas). A light morph juvenile **Swainson's Hawk** was seen over New Almaden on 13 Nov (JPa et al.). Both an adult and a juvenile

Alviso provided both a Yellow Rail and a juvenile Bartailed Godwit, both exceptional finds

Ferruginous Hawk have been seen in the Coyote Valley through the period (m.ob.). A juvenile at the end of Marsh Road on 11 Nov (WGB) was the only other report.

Rails through Terns

Astounding was a **Yellow Rail** grounded at the Alviso EEC on 22 Oct (GKe) and was well photographed in the parking lot there. This is only the third recent county record of this secretive rail. A **Sandhill Crane** made a brief visit to the Palo Alto FCB on 4 Oct (MMR et al.). A few **Snowy Plovers** have used the Alviso ponds during the period (v.ob.) with a high count of four on 5 Oct (MMR). The concentration of **Lesser Yellowlegs** in



New Chicago Marsh at the end of Gold Street continued through 19 Oct (v.ob.) with a high count of 5 on 8 Oct (MMR). Single birds were also seen in Pond A16 on 23 Oct (MJM), Pond A15 on 26 Oct (MH), the Palo Alto Baylands on 7 Nov (JMa), and New Chicago Marsh on 16 Nov (MJM). During an SFBBO shorebird survey in the South Bay on 15 Nov, the party covering the Alviso ponds spotted a juvenile Bar-tailed Godwit in Pond A15 (MMR, MJM, LCr). This is only our third county record of this species that is famed for its migratory flights from the arctic to the South China Sea and then on to New Zealand. The bird shifted over to Pond A9 where it joined more than 37,000 shorebirds including 1,240 Marbled Godwits. Luckily, it remained through 18 Nov (m.ob.), although often a challenge to find amongst so many godwits and other large shorebirds. A late **Black** Turnstone was seen on Pond A15 on 5 Oct (MH). Red Knots continued to use Ponds A9 and A15 as a high-tide roost during the period. The high count was of 57 birds flying out of A9 as the tide dropped on 15 Nov (MMR, MJM, LCr, SCR). The Baird's Sandpiper passage was nearly nonexistent, saved only by a late juvenile in Pond A15 on 8 Oct (MMR). Somewhat better, the **Pectoral Sandpiper** passage petered out with two to six birds in the SCRWA treatment ponds in Gilroy on 2-10 Oct (MMR, MJM, RWR, FV) and a single bird in the Lockheed Martin marsh and ponds on 4 Oct (MMR et al.). **Elegant Terns** lingered during the period with a high count of 55 on Pond A11 on 3 Nov (MH) and the last one seen on 17 Nov (BM).

Roadrunners through Dippers

The only report of a **Greater Roadrunner** was one along Del Puerto
Road on 24 Oct (WGB). A **Short-eared Owl** was seen in the marsh along Coyote
Creek north of Pond A9 on 17 Nov (MDo,
KDo). The last of the **Vaux's Swift** passage
was of six birds over Monte Bello OSP
on 7 Oct (GHa). The HY male **Costa's Hummingbird** remained at Vasona CP
through the end of the period (m.ob.). It
has been there for at least three months
and three weeks, beating out a 1996 male
that stayed at a feeder in San Jose for at
least three months and a week, but falls
short of the female at a Morgan Hill feeder

that remained for about five months and a week in 2011 and 2012. A female Costa's was seen along Alum Rock Falls Road on 9 Oct (SCR). Lewis's Woodpeckers were reported from the San Antonio Valley through October (v.ob.) with a high count of seven on 24 Oct (WGB). A small movement of Lewis's into the western Diablo Range has been observed with one seen above Cherry Flat Reservoir on 9 Oct (SCR) and one or two at Joseph Grant CP on 27 Oct (JJo et al.) and 23 Nov (JTh). An adult male Yellow-bellied Sapsucker showed up in Ed Levin CP on 18 Oct (GZ), likely the same bird seen there last winter. It has been found there through the period (m.ob.). Single **Prairie Falcons** have been seen off Fortini Road on 13 Oct (JPa), in the Coyote Valley on 27 Oct (BM), and along the Calero Creek Trail on 29 Nov (JPa). Presumably these observations are of one bird. A Tropical Kingbird was found near the southeast corner of Pond A3W on 30 Oct (BM) and remained at least through 17 Nov (m.ob.) Our nine previous visitors each stayed between one and three days, but this bird remained in the area for nineteen days-pretty neat. Six Tree Swallows over Lake Cunningham on 20 Oct (JPa) are probably part of a wintering flock rather than late migrants. We have only a handful of winter records for Northern Rough-winged Swallows, so one over the Lockheed Martin channel on 17 Nov (JMD) was of interest. Two Blue-gray Gnatcatchers in St. Joseph's Hill OSP on 18 Oct (GKe) and four along the Calero Creek Trail on 7 Nov (JPa) may be attempting to overwinter. An American **Dipper** along Stevens Creek above Mt. Eden Road found on 7 Nov (RCP) was at a location used in past years. Two Golden-crowned Kingets were banded at the Coyote Creek Field Station (CCFS) on 6 and 19 Oct (JS). Other records included two to four birds at the Sunnyvale Baylands Park 14-17 Oct (PKe, RKe, v.ob.) and one in Gilroy (JMy, RPh et al.). The timing suggests a weak fall movement. Two **Sage Thrashers** were found during the period (assuming they were different birds). The first was at Calero CP on 5 Oct (JHi et al.). The second was about one and a half miles east on Laguna Avenue in Coyote Valley (as the thrasher flies) on 25-26 Oct (DNi, v.ob).

Phainopepla through Goldfinches

A female **Phainopepla** was near Spring Valley Pond in Ed Levin CP on 23 Nov (K&DB) and was seen again on 25 Nov (KO). Northern Waterthushes were found again at the Charleston Road marsh during October (v.ob.) with two seen on 6 Oct (BM). A Nashville Warbler was found at the Ulistac Natural Area on 14 Oct (MMR), the second this fall. Banding data from SFBBO (fide JS) significantly augmented our fall records for MacGillivray's Warblers. Individuals were banded at CCFS on 8 Sep, 11 Sep, 28 Sep, and the last on 5 Oct. Our only Blackpoll Warbler this fall was found at the Ulistac Natural Area on 11 Oct (PDu) and was seen over the next two days by many observers. The only Yellow-breasted Chat of the fall was a bird captured at CCFS on 2 Oct (JS). The Clay-colored Sparrow found along the Guadalupe River Trail in late September was seen once again on 2 Oct (JPa). A Vesper Sparrow was seen at the pullout on the top of the Lexington Reservoir Dam on 23 Oct (KA). One or two Swamp Sparrows were found along the marsh next to the runway at the Palo Alto Baylands on 1 Nov (MDo) and have remained through the month (m.ob.). The first two White-throated Sparrows of the season were found at the Ulistac Natural Area on 11 Oct (PDu) and the Sunnyvale Baylands Park the same day (GZ, PLaT). By the end of period, at least 13 Whitethroateds had been seen plus two more at feeders. 'Slate-colored' Juncos included one at a Los Gatos feeder on 27 Oct (MH) and a second at Sunnyvale Baylands Park on 26 Nov (SS). A Summer Tanager was calling along Stevens Creek below Hwy 101 on 3 Oct (MMR). A female or immature Blue Grosbeak was discovered at Ulistac Natural Area on 12 Oct (JPa, GZ, MJM, LCr) and remained at least one more day (m.ob.). A single female-type Yellowheaded Blackbird was seen in Coyote Valley on 10 Oct (JPa) and another bird was flying over Coyote Creek above Hwy 237 the same day (PDu). Goodly numbers of Great-tailed Grackles continued at Lake Cunningham through the period with a high count of 47 on 20 Oct (JPa). Five birds were along the Lockheed Martin channel and ponds on 11 Oct (WGB), but appear to have moved on. A single male Greattailed has been seen from Shoreline Lake to the Palo Alto Duck Pond on 5-28 Nov (m.ob.). AHY Baltimore Oriole was found along the Guadalupe River below Coleman Avenue on 25 Nov (JPa, AV) photographic documentation was obtained that day and on 26 Nov (EBa, DFi). The bird was last seen on 27 Nov (JPa, AV, KBu). This is the third Baltimore Oriole in 2013 (out of eight total for the county). A single Lawrence's Goldfinch was found at Monte Bello OSP on 8-22 Oct (GHa). At the opposite end of Monte Bello Ridge, three birds were found on 17 Nov (RCP). On the western side of the Diablo Range, a single bird was seen above Cherry Flat Reservoir on 9 Oct (SCR). Along Mines Road and in the San Antonio Valley, 5-23 birds were seen 21-24 Oct (RCi, WGB).
