## Change is Happening - What Can You Do?

So you voted last month, now what? California proudly said, "yes" to Proposition 68 to support parks, and San Jose said, "no" to Measure B and "yes" to Measure C. It's clear that Californians care about wildlife and open spaces, and we are working together towards making a positive impact on the environment. But our work isn't over yet. Under the current administration, crucial environmental protections such as the Endangered Species Act (ESA) and Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) have faced a continuous barrage of attacks. Multiple bills (H.R. 717 and H.R. 1274, for example) seek to weaken the ESA, while the recently proposed H.R. 4239 would eliminate penalties for "incidental" bird deaths under the MBTA. This article's word count is too limiting to enumerate the latest missteps of the Environmental Protection Agency. In such a harsh climate, many environmentalists are finding themselves at a loss for what to do. After all of the canvassing, calling, letter writing, and voting is said and done, we implore you to look no further than your own backyard (patio, balcony, stoop, you get the picture) to continue the fight for our environment.

In our ever-growing urban landscape, backyards and private outdoor spaces are becoming increasingly important habitat for birds and wildlife. "Birdscaping" helps provide food, habitat, water, and a place to nest and breed for both resident and migratory bird species. A properly designed birdscape will not only attract birds, but will also act as a haven for butterflies and honeybees. This is much more than a fun DIY project - turning your backyard or outdoor space into a native plant and wildlife sanctuary could create a natural oasis for local wildlife and inspire your human neighbors to do the same. - Plant native plants. Native plants are not only easier to care for, they also provide food and shelter to birds and beneficial insects. Search the National Audubon Society native plant database by using the search bar under "Bird-Friendly Backyards" at scvas.org/athome.
- Provide food and water with bird feeders and baths. Offer a variety of food to attract a more diverse bird community. Stop by the SCVAS Nature Shop to check out different types of seed. Birdbaths can be as simple as a plant saucer, but for a more attractive option we recommend checking out Los Gatos Birdwatcher.
- Install nestboxes and stop using pesticides. If cavity-nesting species frequent your yard or neighborhood, consider installing nestboxes to provide additional habitat. You will have the chance to provide homes to generations of birds and can contribute data to the Cavity Nesters Recovery Program more details at scvas. org/CNRP. These birds also act as a natural pest control, so you can avoid using harmful pesticides to control insects around your home.
- **Keep cats indoors and decorate windows.** Outdoor cats kill millions of birds each year. Keep your furry friends inside and both the cats and the birds will be safe. Window strikes are another preventable threat to birds using decals and keeping feeders away from windows will help birds stay away.

## Conservation Corner: What Our Environmental Advocacy Team is Working On...

#### Bye Bye Measure B!

As we write this we are celebrating a huge victory for San Jose and Coyote Valley. The proponents behind Measure B failed to fool voters with their \$6 million-dollar deceptive campaign, and the measure was voted down after a long battle that staked the community against deep-pocketed developers. At the same time, Measure C passed with a wide margin – protecting Coyote Valley from residential sprawl. This is truly a tale of David versus Goliath and, as is usually the case, David won! We wish to thank all of our supporters, hard working volunteers, and San Jose's leaders for uniting together on this important issue. We are ready to continue the fight to protect Coyote Valley's birds and wildlife, and we hope this was a lesson learned that San Jose's open space is not up for grabs.



## The Plight of Burrowing Owls

In the past decade, Burrowing Owl populations in the South Bay plummeted. Despite efforts to reverse the trend, surveys show that fewer than 25 pairs still breed in Santa Clara County, and that number continues to fall. If immediate action is not taken, it is likely that these charismatic critters will be extirpated from our landscape. SCVAS is working diligently with biologists, Burrowing Owl experts, government agencies, and local jurisdictions to implement emergency actions to save our last Burrowing Owls.

Our environmental advocates met with the Director of the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), Charlton Bonham, in early May, and presented him with survey results showing a rapid decline in Santa Clara County's population of breeding Burrowing Owls. We requested CDFW's help in facilitating emergency measures to save the owls. Mr. Bonham requested that the Santa Clara Valley Habitat Agency, local Burrowing Owl experts, and CDFW

- collaborate to identify the priority actions necessary to save the breeding population. Since then, we have been working with the Habitat Agency to help present their top priorities, including overwinter rearing, followed by the release of Burrowing Owls.
- In late May, the New York Times released an article focused on the conflict between feral cats and Burrowing Owls at Shoreline Park: nytimes.com/2018/05/26/technology/google-cats-owls.html. We are now collaborating with Google to find an acceptable solution for the cats. At the same time, we are also advocating with the City of Mountain View to install cat-proof fencing to protect owls at Shoreline Park. The conversations we are engaged in are challenging, and finding short- and long-term solutions that are suitable for all stakeholders involved may take time. We appreciate all of your support and understanding.

#### **Protecting Nesting Birds**

The Emily Renzel Marsh in Palo Alto includes an artificial freshwater wetland that has been used to polish effluents from the water treatment plant for over thirty years. It also creates a sanctuary for birds and other wildlife. In recent years, flow through the marsh has slowed to a stop as sediment and reeds have filled the pond. The City is now dredging and making repairs to the pond's berms to stop leaks and prevent freshwater from entering and harming the nearby saltwater slough. Although we were promised that the vegetation would not be disturbed until after the nesting season, we observed equipment depositing soil on top of the reeds and causing great distress to nesting birds. We immediately jumped into action and again asked the City of Palo Alto to stop removing or covering reeds with dirt until the nesting season was over. The City agreed. At this time, the pond is drying out. Some work is still being done around the pond, with the supervision of a qualified biologist monitoring to keep nesting birds from harm. Six nests (Killdeer, Black Phoebe, and Marsh Wrens) were identified and are being protected.

## Field Notes

## **Geese through Terns**

A solo Greater White-fronted Goose lingered at Vasona Lake CP through 15 May (JVs). The last Eurasian Wigeon report was on 24 Apr from Pond A2E (DA). Two Common Loons passed through on their way north, one stopping at Lexington Reservoir on 13 Apr (RPh) and another at Chesbro Reservoir from 15 – 17 Apr (PDu et al., m. ob.). Swainson's Hawks are again nesting in Coyote Valley, after returning in early April. One was in Coyote Valley by 3 Apr (MJM), and two were reported by 10 Apr (SPv). One has also been seen frequenting the south county near San Felipe Rd, beginning on 31 Mar (AJ) and continuing through 8 May (SPv). The same individual may be responsible for sightings over Gilroy High School on 17 Apr (JMn et al.), along Bloomfield Ave on 1 May (DLS), and over the Gilroy SCRWA on 11 May (WP, KON). Migrants included one south of Anderson Reservoir on 7 Apr (SCR), twenty over a ridge south of Mount Hamilton on 9 Apr (JSm), and one over Ed Levin CP on 15 Apr (RFu). Large groups on migration are common in the Central Valley but quite unusual here. Fifteen Swainson's Hawks were tallied on a single day in May of 2013, and looking for a higher count going back in the records takes one to the year 1927. The spring passage of phalaropes was marked by relatively low numbers in the south bay. The first Wilson's Phalarope was at Alviso on 21 Apr (LL) and the high count this spring was eleven on 5 May at the Sunnyvale WPCP (TB). Two **Red-necked Phalaropes** were on Alviso Salt Pond A14 on 20 Apr (WGB). and the high count was seven on 23 Apr in the impoundment east of Alviso Salt Pond A12 (GL). The Glaucous Gull present at Alviso Salt Pond A16 since early March remained through 29 Apr (MMR, MJM). The Caspian **Tern** colony on the islands at Alviso Salt Pond A16 organized itself without help from decoys or recorded calls this

year. A healthy count of 194 terns was made on 27 May (MJM, MMR, RJ). A **Black Tern** briefly foraged at Alviso Salt Pond A12 on 12 May (RL). They are missed more often than not during spring migration; most of our records are of birds on fall passage.

one to two were at Ed Levin CP on 18 and 20 Apr (RPh, ChJ), and one was south of Anderson Reservoir on 22 Apr (SCR). Olive-sided Flycatchers returned in mid-April; one was at Picchetti Ranch OSP on 14 Apr (GL, WP, KON, SPz, PL) and one was at

Sapsuckers through Kingbirds Adding to the tally of Yellow-bellied **Sapsuckers** reported this spring, one was found at the Heintz OSP in Los Gatos on 2 Apr (RWR). All three of the birds found this spring were immature sapsuckers. It's hard to know whether these were wintering birds or migrants given how easy it is to overlook sapsuckers. A Nighthawk seen briefly at the junction of Mines and Del Puerto Canyon Roads on 12 May could have been either a Lesser or Common Nighthawk (fide BMa). A **Black Swift** on migration was over Monte Bello OSP on 8 May (GHa). The first Vaux's Swift of the year was spotted over Shoreline Lake on 31 Mar (SPv et al.). Black-chinned **Hummingbirds** came back to feeders in Willow Glen on 15 Apr, when both a male and female were seen (BM). Calliope Hummingbirds passed through the county between 13 and 22 Apr, with one to two at the Stile Ranch Trail delighting photographers during that period (JPa, m. ob.). Another was at Blue Oak Ranch Preserve in the Diablo Range on 17 Apr (DR),

Loma Prieta on 15 Apr (AR, NL). This spring yielded a bounty of migrant Empidonax flycatchers. Single Hammond's Flycatchers were found at four locations. One was along Old Oak Glen Road between 10 and 17 Apr (MJM, m. ob.), one was at Rancho Cañada del Oro between 14 and 16 Apr (MDo et al.), one was in Stevens Creek CP at the Cooley Picnic Area on 18 Apr (PL, EvM), and two were south of Anderson Reservoir on 22 Apr (SCR). A Dusky Flycatcher was an excellent find on 24 Apr near Gilroy Hot Springs and Canada Roads (MJM). They are about equally likely in spring and fall. A Gray Flycatcher found along the Los Gatos Creek Trail near Meridian Ave on 4 May also stayed for only one day (LL). A pair of Cassin's Kingbirds returned to the eucalyptus trees along San Felipe Road on 3 Apr (MJM). This location in the south county has sightings dating back to 1998.

#### **Martins through Goldfinches**

There was one report of **Purple Martins** on migration away from their known summer haunts in the Santa

Cruz Mountains. Three were spotted south of Anderson Reservoir on 22 Apr together with swallows (SCR). The first **Swainson's Thrushes** of the spring were singles at Old Oak Glen Ave on 15 Apr (STu) and at the Coyote Creek Field Station (CCFS) on 29 Apr (DWn). **Nashville Warblers** transited the county between 14 Apr and 5 May.

Of the twelve locations reporting Nashvilles, only one was in the lowlands, a bird at CCFS on 21 Apr (DT). The earliest arrival on 14 Apr was at Picchetti Ranch OSP (GL, WP, SPz, DPe). The high count was eight south of Anderson Reservoir on 22 Apr (SCR). Single MacGillivray's Warblers were found at six locations between 16 Apr and 21 May. The first arrivals were at Blue Oak Ranch Reserve on 16 Apr (DR) and south of Anderson Reservoir on 5 May (SCR). The other MacGillivray's were all at lowland locations - along the Los Gatos Creek Trail near Meridian Ave on 7 May (RPh), at CCFS on 16 May (DWn, WH), at Penetencia Creek Park on 20 May (MSm), and at Santa Clara University on 20 and 21 May (JVs).

A Northern Parula, a spring vagrant from the east, was quite a treat at Mitchell Park from 22 May through 25 May (GZ, m. ob.). It was the eleventh recorded in the county, and only two have stayed for a longer period. The male announced himself with two different song types broadcast from the treetops. Another accomplished vocalist, the Yellow-breasted **Chat.** was heard at West Valley College on 8 and 9 May (JVs, RPh). A second was singing at the pond on Del Puerto Canyon Road at the eastern edge of the county on 13 May (BMa et al.). Flirting with the county line on the west side of the county at Loma Prieta, a Black-chinned Spar-

row visited Santa Clara County on 21 May (WP). A Clay-colored Sparrow found at Mission City Memorial Park in San Jose on 19 Apr was only the second spring record for the county (JVs). Its unique song was enjoyed by many during the duration of its stay through 23 Apr. White-throated Sparrows are typically gone by the end of the first week of May. The latest reports this year were of three at

Ulistac NA on 4 May (DN) and a remarkably late individual along the Los Gatos Creek Trail near Meridian Ave on 29 May (JPa). A calling Summer **Tanager** at Vasona Lake CP on 11 Apr was not found again (STe, JSm). The small marsh at Ulistac NA hosted a Yellow-headed Blackbird on 9 May (RJ). An Evening Grosbeak flying over Coyote Creek near Morgan Hill on 8 Apr was the last report for this winter (SCR). The last invasion of Evening Grosbeaks occurred in the winter of 2015-2016, followed by two winters with few grosbeaks in the area. 2015-2016 was also the last winter **Red Crossbills** invaded; one flying

over Monte Bello OSP on 30 May was one of the few recent sightings (GHa). Lawrence's Goldfinches were widespread. Notable counts included eight along San Felipe Road on 8 Apr (JVs), six at Palm Ave and Lantz Dr in Coyote Valley on 18 Apr (JPa), eleven at the northern border of Pacheco SP on 4 May (PDu), six at Monte Bello OSP on 6 May (JVs, KC), and six at J Grant CP on 6 May (BTh).

## SCVAS Birdathon 2018 - Final Results

Thank you to all of our incredible supporters who brought in **over \$37,000** for this year's Birdathon! 72 participants braved cold rain and hot sun to embark on birding journeys in support of SCVAS conservation and education programs. We had eighteen birding teams, including two Big Sit Teams, seven 4-hour teams, and nine 24-hour teams.

11 participants raised over \$1,000 each, with Linda Sue Johnson, Steven Patt, Renée Polizotto, David McIntyre, and Barry Langdon-Lassagne placing in the top 5 fundraisers, respectively. Team efforts were just as impressive - Bob Hirt's Rock Wrens raised over \$9,000 and won the 24-hour category for fundraising, while Vivek Khanzode's Fledglings team took the 4-hour category with over \$4,000 raised. In our Big Sit category, the Sitting Ducks led by Chuq von Rospach brought in over \$3,000.

It wasn't just about the donations - participants saw an impressive number of birds as well. In the 24-hour category, the Varied Twitchers, led by Mike Rogers, took the prize with 152 species seen in one day. In the 4-hour category, Vivek Khanzode's Fledglings team saw the most species (107), while the Sitting Ducks, led by Chuq von Rospach, won the Big Sit category with 50 species. The "Best Bird" seen throughout the competition was spotted by the Rock Wrens - an out-of-season Common Loon in full breeding plumage.
