



# **Self-guided Trips for December**

Need help finding great birding spots and figuring out what to look for? Check out these self-guided field trips for December. The winter season is a great time to observe wintering ducks and geese at the bay or any of Santa Clara County's inland lakes and ponds. Or, head to the hills to enjoy the views and look for raptors at Sierra Vista and Rancho San Vicente. Try a leisurely walk along Calero Creek to look for woodpeckers and wintering songbirds. If you have a little more time, consider Merced National Wildlife Refuge to view the largest wintering concentration of Lesser Sandhill Cranes in the Pacific Flyway.
